Wool Growers Told Of Progress

PORTLAND — The Oregon Wool Growers Assn. was told Saturday that feeding antibiotic drugs to lambs had resulted in widespread benefits.

P. G. Karner, Robbins, Calif. sheepman, said that the addition of Aureomycin to feed had turned 30,000 scrub lambs into choice quality market animals.

The death rate among these lambs was only 5 per cent, compared with the normal of 20 to 30 per cent in that class, Robbins said.

The association, which closed its annual meeting here Saturday, also urged an increase on duties for wool yarn and cloth imports.
