California To Get Rain

SAN FRANCISCO (UP) — Two new storms headed for California today, promising more rain and snow for the Northern and Central parts of the state.

The first storm was a weak low pressure system that formed off the Oregon Coast. It was expected to cause local light rain and snow today.

The other storm was moving into the Gulf of Alaska and was expected to cause rain tomorrow from Salinas and Stockton north, with snow in the mountains.

The cold weather will continue, the weatherman said. That means highs in the 50's and lows in the 30's, with frosts in many inland areas.

Snow continued falling at low levels in the mountains. Soda Springs reported 15 inches. Blue Canyon 15, Donner Summit 17 and Echo Summit 30.

Chains were required on U.S. Highway 40 and 50 over the Sierra. Light single axle driven trucks prevented from traveling over Donner Summit on Highway 40 because it was too slippery.

Chains were also required on parts of the Feather River Highway and on U.S. 199 into Oregon. U.S. Highway 191 was open and normal.

Four other Sierra passes were closed to auto traffic for the winter.

Salem Man Will Head Young GOP

PORTLAND (UP) — The Young Republican Federation of Oregon closed its annual convention here Saturday by electing Jim Hatfield of Salem chairman.

He was unopposed. Others re-elected without opposition are: Ronald Johnson, Adams, assistant chairman; Dr. Vener Anderson, vice chairman at large; Ann West, Salem, secretary; and Robert Bachelder, Portland, treasurer.

David Belch defeated Kenneth K. Maher and Marjorie Wooten defeated Jane Arthur for the positions of national committeeman and committeewoman. All are from Portland.

Among resolutions approved by delegates were those calling for: Federal highway aid legislation to be financed by a combination of tax and excise taxes and borrowing; commending Rep. George (B. Ore) for his series of debates with Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore) on Coon's bill for "partnership" construction of John Day Dam; Oregon residents to urge the state's two U.S. senators (Morse and Neuberger) "to cease to obstruct development of power for the people of the Northwest"; more free trade; a swift end to colonialism; and continued support for the United Nations.

They tabled a resolution calling for a sales tax and opposed one calling for 90 per cent of parity for farm products.

Gov. Paul Patterson, principal speaker at Saturday night's banquet, said the Eisenhower administration had not yet found a way to permit farmers fully to share the nation's prosperity. He said the administration had "inherited" a bad farm situation from the Democrats.
