Parties Merge In Japan
 TOKYO (UP)—A powerful new Conservative Party was forged today with the merger of the dissolved Democratic and Liberal parties, giving Japan its first two-party system since World War II. The left and right-wing Socialists merged into a single party last month.

The new Conservative grouping will hold a heavy parliamentary majority. Prime Minister Ichiro Hatoyama, who headed the Democratic party, will remain as head of government until next spring under the merger deal with the Liberals. But actual management of the party will be in the hands of a joint committee of four, led by Hatoyama and former Liberal President Takekura Ogata.

Under the agreement, Hatoyama will step down next spring to pave the way for election of a permanent party president and prime minister. Ogata presumably will be chosen.

The Democratic and Liberal parties were formally dissolved Monday night. The formal merger of the two conservative groups came today. Some 2,000 members and supporters of the two parties met in the Chuo University Auditorium to inaugurate the "Liberal-Democratic" party.

Officials of the new party said it controlled 298 seats in the 467-member House of Representatives and 115 in the 250-member upper House of Councilors. In the upper house, it can count on the support of the 47 members of the Green Breeze party.

The new party is pledged to uphold "peace and democracy."

Ike Readjusts To Routine; Plans Afternoon Conference

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (AP)—President Eisenhower eased back into the routine of his high office today and his "home town" adjusted with hardly a ripple to his presence.

He scheduled a meeting in mid-afternoon with his chief assistant Sherman Adams, who planned to fly here with official business stemming from a Cabinet meeting in Washington.

Eisenhower is using his country home on the outskirts of town as his office. His new quarters in the Gettysburg post office aren't quite ready.

Tomorrow he will see Secretary of Commerce Weeks, only member of the Cabinet who wasn't able to confer with him at Denver.

In the big, rebuilt house on the farm, Eisenhower is using a ground floor study as a bedroom—presumably to avoid unnecessary stair-climbing while he continues his recovery from a heart attack.

Arab Hero Recipe Given

CAIRO (AP)—An Arab leader can become a national hero by dealing with the Communist bloc these days. If he cooperates with the West, he risks his prestige—even his neck.

That is the conclusion Arab politicians have drawn from Prime Minister Gamal Abdel Nasser's purchase of arms from Czechoslovakia. Scarcely a word of criticism has come from the Arab world and it is felt to be the most popular thing Nasser has done.

When Iraq joined the Western-sponsored Baghdad pact early this year, a campaign of press attacks and protest demonstrations followed throughout the Middle East.

This seeming popularity for the Communist bloc has developed in an area where Communists are rare. Not a single legitimate Communist party exists in the Arab world. Egypt gives convicted Communists 15 years in prison.

Arabs consider Nasser's purchase primarily as a declaration of independence. The Arabs hope that Nasser can get away with it gives the entire Arab world the feeling of being master of its own destiny.

Getting rid of "Western imperialism" has been a prime desire of Arab patriots since the rise of modern Arab nationalism in the 20th century. Arabs have had a tendency to blame all their woes on Western control of their governments.

Bob Hope Applies For Moscow Visa

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Bob Hope wants to go to Moscow and try to laugh the Iron Curtain away.

The comedian made a formal application Monday to visit Russia for the purpose of filming a television show there with Russian stars. The application, seeking a visas for ten people, was delivered to the Russian Embassy in Washington. The U. S. State Department has already cleared Hope.

"I understand there are some very good comics in Moscow," Hope said. "There have been cultural exchanges of farmers and journalists between the two countries. Why not an exchange of comics?"

House Of Shoes Gets Remodeling

Remodeling being done at Jess House's House of Shoes in the Town and Country Shopping Center this week is adding another 800 square feet to the sales and display space of Klamath Falls' newest shoe store.

House explained that in less than two weeks after the store's official opening on October 27, it was obvious that more space was needed.

Sen. Jackson Claims Ike Won't Run

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.) predicted today that President Eisenhower won't run next year as a "part-time president" or be elected if he does.

Sen. Flanders (R-Vt.) said in a separate interview, however, he is "prayerfully hopeful" that Eisenhower will recover sufficiently from his heart attack to seek a second term.

A number of Republicans have said they think the burdens of the presidency can be cut down enough so that Eisenhower, despite his heart attack, could fill the office for a second term.

If the President does run, Flanders said he thinks the public will be satisfied that Eisenhower feels "he can do all the things that a president needs to do."

"I think the voters will feel that he will be justified in giving more attention to major problems and less to ordinary, routine burdens of the presidency," he said.

Jackson said he thinks Eisenhower is "too conscientious to offer his services on a part-time basis when he knows that the responsibilities of the office are such that full-time service is required."

Jackson said he looks for a "substantial contest" for the Democratic presidential nomination at next year's party convention. He indicated he believes the nominee will be Adlai E. Stevenson, Gov. of Illinois and former U.S. Senator.

Stevenson is expected to enter the race for the Democratic nomination with a formal announcement in Chicago later today. His brief announcement will be followed by a news conference.

Radars Picket Towed To Port

NEW YORK (AP)—The Navy radar warning ship Searcher, powerless but still afloat after a raging oil fire Sunday, has been towed into port, bearing the bodies of two men who died in the blaze.

The two had been sealed alive in the flaming engine room, officers and crewmen reported Monday night after the Searcher docked at the Brooklyn Navy Yard.

"We could hear them screaming and moaning for help but we couldn't reach them," one crewman told reporters. A third man died of fire injuries in a Navy hospital ashore.

The engine room had been closed off to keep the blistering fire from spreading. The Searcher's 33-year-old skipper, Lt. Cmdr. James A. Paulick, said he did not personally order the room sealed, but added that "it was one of those things that was obvious to whoever was down there."
