Police Probe Fire Deaths

ALLENTOWN, Pa.—Police today investigated the possibility of foul play in the death of two young brothers in a fire-razed shack which had been used as a clubhouse by teenagers.

Firemen who were called to quell the blaze in the padlocked shack yesterday discovered the burned bodies of William Stengele, 8, and his brother David, 6. They were identified by their mother Mrs. Adele Stengele, 26, from bits of clothing found in the ruins.

Coroner Clayton O. P. Werley withheld a certificate stating the cause of death pending an autopsy today at Allentown Hospital.

Mrs. Stengele first missed her children when they failed to return from school for lunch with their brother Dale, 7. She learned of the tragedy while searching the neighborhood.

Her husband Roland, 27, a laborer at the Bethlehem Steel Corp. plant in nearby Bethlehem, was at work.

A woman noticed the shack was on fire and called firemen. They put out the blaze by dumping the structure on its side into a creek running along side of it. That's when they discovered the bodies. Police found a red smear on a stone wall near the shack. It was being analyzed to determine if it was human blood.

Four of the teenagers who used the shack were questioned by police. One reported that he and his companions locked the door Sunday night shortly after dark before leaving for the night.

When firemen reached the scene yesterday, the one door on the shack was secured by three closed padlocks, all on the outside. Police said the children might have gotten in by crawling through a loose section.

Man Confesses Kidnap-Death

SAN FRANCISCO—Arthur Ross Brown, arrested here for crimes reaching from the corn belt to the Pacific, was held under \$100,000 bail today after the FBI said he confessed the kidnap-murder of wealthy Mrs. Wilma Allen of Kansas City Aug. 4.

Technically, Brown is held on a charge of transporting a stolen automobile across state lines. He was arrested yesterday while sleeping in an automobile stolen in Omaha. He had two loaded weapons in the seat beside him. The FBI had been hunting him since Aug. 31 for the shooting of Sheriff Willard H. Marshall at Sheridan, Wyo. The sheriff was questioning Brown about a burglary there.

The FBI said that Brown while being questioned about that shooting yesterday, suddenly burst out: "Where I'm really wanted is in Kansas City," and then described the kidnaping and slaying of Mrs. Allen, 34, wife of William R. Allen Jr., a wealthy Kansas City automobile dealer.

Mrs. Allen was kidnapped while shopping in south Kansas City. Her nude body with the hands tied behind the back was found three days later in a cow pasture south of Kansas City.

Percy Wyly II, FBI special agent in charge in Kansas City, said Brown told agents he had not raped Mrs. Allen; that robbery was his motive. The coroner's report said tests were inconclusive as to the possibility of rape.

An FBI agent reported Brown admitted (1) forcing his way into Mrs. Allen's convertible at the point of a revolver; (2) forcing her to drive out of town; (3) shooting her twice through the head; (4) stripping her of her jewelry and taking her purse and (5) tossing the body out in the field. Brown, 30, a native of San Francisco, "has been a mental case since he was 14," said his mother Mrs. Mary Brown.

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Three Bodies Discovered In Fish Boat

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP)—The bodies of three commercial fishermen, encased in ice, were found in the battered hull of the 55-foot seiner Westerner on lonely Saturna Island Monday.

The hull of the Canadian-owned craft, overturned and with its bottom torn out, was discovered on the island by two brothers, Jim and Bill Money, as they drove along a road overlooking the desolate beach.

"We could see the bodies through the ice formed around their sleeping cabin," the brothers said.

Four men were known to have been aboard the Westerner when it set sail from Vancouver, including owner-skipper Marian Goverchin, 54. The fourth man was believed to have drowned.

Also aboard the Westerner when it left here were Bob Suica, about 60, and Joe Martinic and Ed Jones, all of Vancouver.

The Royal Canadian Air Force sent a rescue unit to the island, 40 miles south of here, after discovery of the boat. The RCAF unit freed the three bodies from the ice after five hours of hacking and chopping at the frozen sea spray. The engine was still in gear and the ignition was turned on,

indicating the boat was still running when the tragedy occurred," Jim Money said.

The rigging and deck were full of ice. It looked as though the boat just got so topheavy it keeled over, then righted itself again.

Jim Money expressed the opinion the fourth man probably was in the engine room and was either washed over or jumped when the vessel turned turtle.

The Westerner, which usually carries a crew of six, was beam trawling on the trip. It apparently

was caught by a storm and was heading for safety when it struck some rocks.

Saturna Island lies in the strait some 10 miles northwest of Orcas Island, Wash., and 40 miles southwest of here.

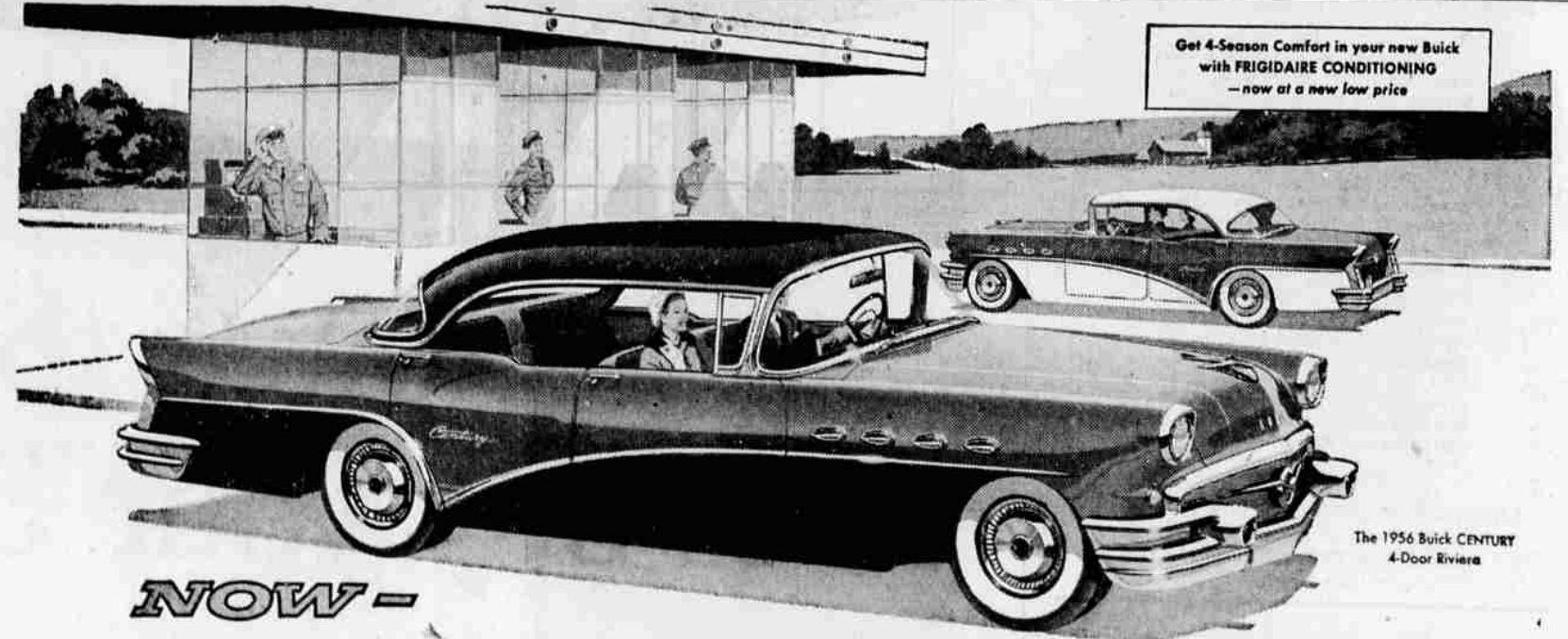
