

Bowl Berths Awaiting Wolverine, 'LA Wins

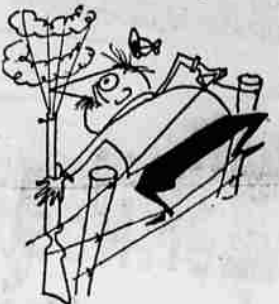

Michigan and UCLA will clinch Bowl berths by winning their conference games this Saturday, the football odds-men predicted today.
Both victories would carry the champions into the national championship game, which will be played in the Big Ten stadium in the Big Ten city of Ann Arbor, Mich. An Ohio State victory would give the Buckeyes the national title — but would put Michigan in the Rose Bowl since the state is ineligible.

Maryland Warned by Tatum

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (UP)—Maryland Coach Jim Tatum warned his players today that they should take their eyes off the Big Ten Bowl long enough to avoid being over a booby trap named George Washington University.
The undefeated Terps were scheduled Tuesday as the Atlantic Coast Conference representative in the Miami Bowl clash, where they will meet mighty Oklahoma. Tatum announced the selection before Tuesday's practice session. He was greeted by gleeful roars, a reaction which Tatum expected. "I wasn't entirely pleased to receive with one more game yet to play."

The thrice-beaten Colonials are Maryland's final obstacle to an unbeaten season and are rated a four-point underdog. But Tatum said that "George Washington has one of the finest first teams in the country and will be out to get us."
Big Jim pointed out that G.W. held powerful West Virginia to a 13-7 score, gave Florida a tough battle and lost to Richmond last week. "Only because they were looking ahead to the Maryland game," he said.
Tatum may have been indulging in a little gate-boasting propaganda, but no one could argue that his Terps now regard Saturday's game as a mere scrimmage for the all-important date with Oklahoma New Year's Day in Miami. Maryland hasn't forgotten that the Sooners knocked off a Terrapin team that was top-ranked in the nation two years ago—in that same Orange Bowl. Now it's Oklahoma holding the top spot and Maryland waiting in ambush.
"It's hard to get the kids up for G.W.," Tatum conceded. "The only incentive they have is to wind up the year unbeaten. All they're thinking about is getting even with Oklahoma."
Tatum didn't say so, but that's probably all he's thinking about, too. Oklahoma's Orange Bowl victory was harder for Tatum to swallow than fish-flavored mineral oil. It was only 7-0, but Maryland blew a glittering chance in the first quarter when the Sooners stopped them one yard away from a score. And some of the Terps players blamed Oklahoma's lone touchdown — a 27-yard run — was made possible by some blocking that bordered on the clipping variety.
"I won't predict we'll beat Maryland," Sherman said, "but I can tell you this—the boys are 'up' for this game."

College Gridiron Briefs

SEATTLE, Wash. (UP)—Coach Johnny Chaberg sent his University of Washington Huskies out on the frozen practice field today because "we may have to play under rugged conditions on Saturday, so we might as well get used to them."

Chaberg announced one major change for the game with the Clugars of Washington State. He moved Earl Monius to left guard and filled the right guard spot with Whitey Core. Monius is filling in for Ed Sheron who was injured in the UCLA game.

EUGENE, Ore. (UP)—A fired-up squad of University of Oregon Ducks held a rugged practice session yesterday in preparation for Saturday's game against Oregon State—which they hope to win for "Cas."

Coach Len Casanova, hanged in effigy Monday, was under observation at a local hospital for acute appendicitis. Captain Lon Stiner said the team was behind the coach and that members were "mightily disgusted to hear about that effigy business."

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UP)—Coach Tommy Prothro has his Oregon State Beavers working hard behind locked gates for the first time this year as they prepared for Saturday's traditional struggle with the University of Oregon Ducks.

First string fullback Arlo Wenzel, benched since the Washington game, was back in uniform and should make the Duck contest. Tailback Joe Francis' injured shoulder showed improvement and he was expected to be in top form for the big one.

MOSCOW, Idaho (UP)—Unless there's a change in the weather, the University of Idaho Vandals will have to worry about how to keep the football from freezing when they meet Montana here Saturday.

Coach Skip Stahley had four inches of snow scraped off the practice field yesterday and sent his squad out, but the five-degree temperature was too much and practice resumed indoors.

BERKELEY, Calif. (UP)—The University of California Bears should be in good shape for Saturday's traditional "Big Game" against the Stanford Indians, according to Coach Lynn Waldorf, who said only left tackle Bob Oliver is on the doubtful list.
Left half Johnny Wilson has a cold, but is expected to be on tap for Saturday's game, and Herb Jackson, who missed out last weekend, should be back at his left half spot.

STANFORD, Calif. (UP)—The Stanford Indians worked hard on plays yesterday which they hope will give them their first "big game" victory over California since 1946—and Coach Chuck Taylor was well pleased with the workout.

Taylor said there might be some offensive changes in strategy by Saturday, but the injury situation was good. Tackle Paul Wiggin, who suffered a hip pointer in the Oregon game, has returned to practice.

LOS ANGELES (UP)—UCLA Coach Henry (Red) Sanders indicated he may stage an aerial game against Southern California Saturday despite the loss of his star passer, Ronnie Knox, who suffered a broken leg against Washington.

Sanders moved Edison Griffin, a sophomore, up from the junior varsity to the fourth string tail back spot yesterday and had him throwing along with Sam Brown, Doug Bradley and Gerry McDugall.

LOS ANGELES (UP)—Southern California Coach Jess Hill stressed passing today as he prepared his Trojans for the UCLA game, putting his three quarterbacks through lengthy passing drills.
At the same time, Hill staged drills in dummy practice both on offense and defense against UCLA formations.

Packer Pushing Colt Back

PHILADELPHIA (UP)—Full-back Howie Ferguson of the Green Bay Packers, a man they didn't want in the National Football League, used two big weekends to challenge Alan (The Horse) Ameche for the rushing lead in the pro league today.

Handsome Howie, finally emerging as a star after two teams had put him up for waivers during a three-season NFL career, rushed for 69 yards last weekend and 120 the week before. That boosted him to second place only 74 yards behind the Baltimore Colts' rookie with four games to go.

Ameche, limited to 40 yards last Sunday and 32 the week before, set the pace with 707 yards. Ferguson was second with 633 and defending champion Joe Perry of the San Francisco Forty-Niners was third with 541.

The 6-foot, 2-inch, Scotch-Irish 210-pound Ferguson played four years of service ball on the West Coast and was signed by the Los Angeles Rams in 1952. They waived on him in September. The Packers signed him in 1953, waived him out the following September, and then recalled him.

It stands to reason it's his best year. He carried for 134 yards in 52 rushes in his rookie year in 1953, and was 25th in rushing last year with 376 yards in 83 carries for a 3.3-yard average.

Otto Graham of the Cleveland Browns, despite two rugged weekends, set the pace in passing with a 9.14-yard average, with Ed Brown of the Chicago Bears hanging on to second place. Brown, who was fourth two weeks ago, posted an 8.6 average.

Veteran end Tom Fears of the Rams caught nine passes last weekend and jumped from seventh place to the top in pass receptions. The former UCLA expert has a total of 36 receptions. Defending co-champions Pete Pihos of the Philadelphia Eagles and Harlan Hill of the Bears, along with Billy Wilson of the 40-ers, are tied for second place with 35 each.

Donk Walker of the Detroit Lions scored 13 points, took over the individual scoring lead with 69, followed by Vic Janowicz of the Washington Redskins, the leader for six weeks, and George Blanda of the Bears. Janowicz was held to one conversion in Washington's win Sunday.

Other leaders were Norm Van Brocklin of the Rams in punting; Ron Drzewiecki of the Bears in punt returns; Al Carmichael of the Packers in kickoff returns, and Willard Sherman of the Rams in interceptions.
