

Leadership Program Given To Klamath 4-H Association

Rosalie Mueller, a member of the Oregon State 4-H staff, outlined the 4-H junior leadership program to members of the Klamath County 4-H Leaders Association Monday night at the fairgrounds.

The program, relatively new in the state, is planned to give club

members 14 years and older, experiences in leadership by helping them to become junior leaders. To qualify, junior leaders must have had two or more years in club work; must be enrolled in a 4-H project or actively participating in a junior leader group; must have been accepted by the club, the leader and the county extension agent and must agree to participate in training programs.

Junior leaders, she said, have an opportunity to participate in some 20 leadership projects.

The state 4-H executive concluded with suggestions on junior leadership programs applicable to the county. Only about a dozen 4-H's in the county are participating in the junior leadership program at the present time, according to the association president, Dale Fleming.

During the meeting, a nominating committee was appointed, consisting of Mrs. John Heyden, chairman; Mrs. Ted Alberts and Jack Ratliff. The committee will report at the next meeting, December 12, in the Merrill Recreation Hall.

President Fleming submitted his resignation as executive officer and announced the post will be filled by Earl Wilson, first vice president, from Malin. Fleming said he is entering military service this week.

Hamilton Cites Accident Rules

The danger of well-meaning but unqualified persons moving injured motorists from the scene of an accident was cited today by Chief of Police Orville Hamilton.

In numerous instances, the chief said, motorists who happened upon an accident scene have moved injured victims to nearby hospitals with the idea they were being of help. But Hamilton said, the moving of the victim often endangers his life even further.

Ambulance service is prompt, and experienced attendants can quickly recognize the type and seriousness of injuries involved. Persons with a broken neck or serious back injury, when handled properly by qualified persons and given proper treatment, very often survive automobile accidents.

"Unless you are a physician," Hamilton said, "it is best not to move an injured person unless the victim's injuries are definitely of a minor nature."

The National Police Traffic Safety Institute, of which Hamilton is a member, has recently released some general rules to follow if you happen on an accident scene. They are as follows:

1—If you are the first person at the scene of an accident call an ambulance.

2—Then telephone the state police, if the accident is on the open highway, or the city authorities if the accident is within the city.

3—Give your name, the location of the accident and the number of injured persons. If you did not previously call an ambulance advise the law enforcement officer whom you are talking. Tell him the exact location of the accident and he will summon the nearest ambulance for you.

4—Do not move the accident victims. If a blanket is available, cover the more seriously injured to prevent shock.

5—Don't leave the scene if you are a witness to the accident. The investigating officer may want to get a statement from you.

6—Remember to keep your head at all times. Your presence of mind may save a life.

Hamilton suggested that all local motorists memorize these rules so they will know what to do and how they can be of the most assistance in the event of an accident.

Snow Delays Lemurian Plan

YREKA—Business leaders of the Yreka and Mt. Shasta areas, together with members of the John W. Chamberlin Lemurian expedition, because of the heavy fall of snow Sunday morning, postponed a trip to Panther Meadows to view the proposed site of the Mt. Shasta chair lift.

The exploratory party had planned to leave the group after luncheon had been served, and proceed to the north slope of the mountain, where a cave, the opening of which had been observed from the air recently, was to have been visited.

About two weeks ago, the advance party of the expedition reported finding a trail of giant footprints which aroused the interest of scientists. The explorers followed the trail from the 11,000 to the 12,500 foot level, but abandoned

the search with the approach of darkness.

Chamberlin, leader of the party, stated that the men had no explanation to offer at this time. He said that the tracks had been made recently.

Persons interested in the expedition, who have been delving into documents of antiquity, have come up with some interesting findings which will be submitted soon to eminent anthropologists, Chamberlin said.

Fund Raising Drive Begins

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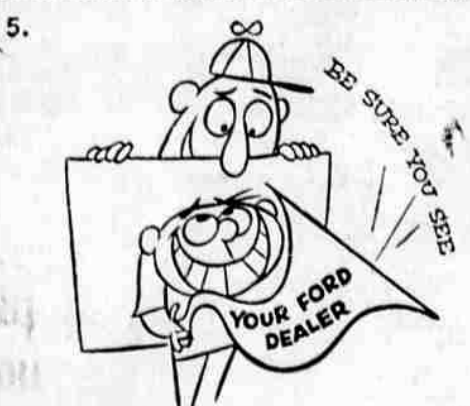
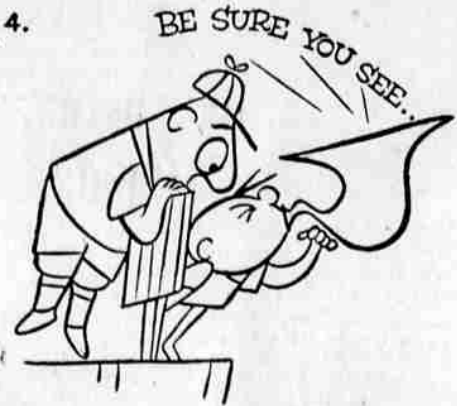
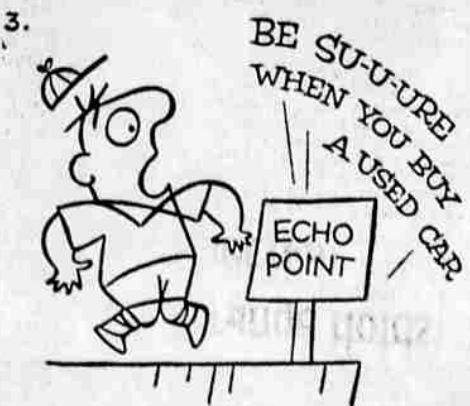
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
