

Stevenson Hears Starting Gun; Off And Running

CHICAGO (AP)—Adlai E. Stevenson was away and running today in a nine-month race for the Democratic presidential nomination.

In one of the earliest starts in modern political annals, the 55-year-old former governor of Illinois jumped the gun on potential rivals with an official announcement yesterday that he is again a candidate for the nomination he won in 1952.

At a news conference today, he was expected to name James Finnegan, secretary of state for Pennsylvania, as his campaign manager, and Hy Raskin, former dep-

Leader Gives Cold War Prediction

WASHINGTON (AP)—"The failure of the Geneva conference has brought the cold war back," a top-level administration leader said today.

He said that "in the light of this, the administration is re-examining its programs, and is prepared to make any changes that are necessary."

The policy maker, declining to be quoted by name, said that budget-balancing aims would be subordinated to "necessities" of the developing new situation.

He said that cuts in foreign aid spending are "not now contemplated. . . . There may be some shifts, and changes in emphasis, in the foreign aid program, but there won't be much difference" between this year's and next year's outlays.

"The administration's policies are flexible, and they will be shifted as needed," he added.

The administration leader, unqualifiedly termed "a failure" by the Big Four foreign ministers' meeting ending today at Geneva.

He said "the tense situation in the Middle East" is further concrete evidence that "the cold war is back."

What this will mean in terms of the administration's aim to balance the budget this year and keep it balanced is not yet clear, the official indicated.

In September, John B. Hollister, head of the International Cooperation Administration, which administers foreign aid, told reporters after a trip to Europe that the situation had improved so much there that some cutdown in foreign economic aid outlays could begin immediately, and be carried over into next year.

Now, it appeared from the administration policy maker's views based on Russia's intransigent attitude at Geneva and developments in the Middle East, any savings on economic aid may have to be spent on increased military assistance abroad.

Current programs for the year ending next June 30 contemplate spending of \$1,750,000,000 for economic aid abroad and \$2,150,000,000 for military aid.

The Defense Department has already indicated that defense outlays are on the way up.

Defense spending programs, like all others, the administration leader indicated, will be reviewed in the light of the new situation.

But even with increased outlays, the administration could still balance the budget if tax receipts increased sufficiently.

India Begins New Dam Construction

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Workmen will begin pouring concrete tomorrow for India's Bhakra Dam, the giant project which may be the world's highest dam when it is finished in 1961 or '62.

Pouring of concrete is scheduled to continue nonstop for four years until the dam stands more than 700 feet—possibly 750 feet—above the bed of the Sutlej River. Hoover Dam in the United States now is the world's highest at 726 feet.

Bhakra Dam is the key in a power project. It is in the Himalayan foothills 225 miles north of New Delhi.

India is footing the total bill. American engineers, led by Harvey Ransom of Alhambra, Calif., have been employed by the Indian government as advisers. Some 30 to 40 Americans have assisted in the preliminary construction and planning the past three years.

SHORT MARRIAGE

Dulles May Go To Far East

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles, returning from Geneva tomorrow, is expected to start arranging promptly a trip to the Far East.

Its primary purpose, it was learned today, would be to attend a third meeting of the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization Ministerial Council. The date would come sometime during January, February or March.

Dulles might also visit Japan, South Korea, South Viet Nam or the Nationalist China headquarters on Formosa. He is reported to have told a Vietnamese diplomat at Geneva this week he expected to visit his country very soon.

Dulles already has been to two sessions of the SEATO council, which is the top consultative group of the eight-nation pact: at Manila, Philippines, when it organized in September 1954, and at Bangkok, Thailand, last February.

A site will have to be selected for the early-1956 meeting.

The eight pact members—United States, Britain, France, Philippines, Pakistan, Thailand, Australia and New Zealand—would work this out through diplomatic

Graham To Be Arraigned Thursday On Murder Charge

DENVER (AP)—John Gilbert Graham, 23, will be arraigned on a murder charge tomorrow in the dynamiting of a United Air Lines plane. The blast killed Graham's mother and 43 other passengers.

The state moved swiftly to prosecute late yesterday after U.S. Atty. Donald Kelley turned the case over to Denver's Dist. Atty. Bert Keating for filing of murder charges.

A murder complaint against Graham was signed by W. A. Patterson of Chicago, president of the air lines. Keating said he would ask death in the gas chamber.

The complaint specifically charges Graham with murdering his mother Mrs. Daisy E. King, 54, who lived with him in Denver. He insured her life for \$37,500 after escorting her to start the fatal flight Nov. 1.

The bomb, hidden in Mrs. King's luggage, exploded near Longmont, Colo., ripping to pieces the DC-6B mainliner shortly after it had taken off from the Denver airport.

Guards placed Graham under extra security precautions in Denver County Jail. He is held without bond. Warden Gordon Dolliver said an unidentified man threatened by telephone a mob would storm the jail to take Graham out.

From outward appearances, guards said, Graham showed no remorse or emotion over his confession.

Dolliver said the prisoner lounged on his bunk or occasionally paced the narrow cell.

The Rocky Mountain News said in a copyrighted article a chance remark about a unique Christmas gift led to the arrest of Graham by the FBI.

The newspaper said neighbors told the FBI Friday, eight days after the Nov. 1 crash, that Graham told them he was heartbroken because he had hidden the gift, a jewelry-making tool, in her luggage rather than presenting it in person.

The FBI went into action as soon as it learned Graham had opened his mother's packed suitcases to insert the surprise gift, the News said.

Roy Moore, assistant agent in charge of the FBI's two-state Denver division who spearheaded the investigation, refused to confirm or deny the story.

Mrs. King made costume jewelry for her family and friends and had wished for the unique tool for some time, the newspaper said. She was flying to Anchorage, Alaska, to visit a daughter.

It was announced in Chicago survivors of 13 passengers who died in the crash will be paid a total of \$655,000 by Continental Casualty Co. It was understood that the payments by Associated Aviation Underwriters of New

York and Mutual Benefit Assn. of Omaha, which also sell insurance in coin-operated airport machines, would be considerably less.

OIL DRILLING
HOLLYWOOD (AP)—A movie studio which let an oil company drill on its back lot is netting more than \$1,000 daily.

Universal Consolidated Oil Co. says it has completed seven producing wells on the 20th Century-Fox lot. The wells produce 3,000 barrels of oil a day, worth \$7,890, and six million cubic feet of natural gas, worth about \$1,000.

The studio's cut under an 11-2-3 per cent royalty deal is \$1,031 a day.

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
