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Canadian Gas Import Plan Decision To Be Announced

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Federal Power Commission is expected to announce shortly whether it will approve a proposal to import Canadian natural gas for Pacific Northwest states.

If the commission has not acted favorably by Dec. 1 upon the application, contracts with individual Canadian producers are subject to cancellation.

Theoretically, this could result in the gas being diverted elsewhere with Pacific's project left high and dry.

Actually, however, with the Northwest area representing the

most readily available market, it probably would necessitate only negotiation of new contracts. Even this, however, could mean a possible price increase.

The commission itself went on record last month as recognizing the urgency of an early decision, albeit for a different reason.

In an order disposing with the customary initial decision of an FPC examiner, the commission noted that Pacific already has awarded contracts to cover the stretch south of Umatilla, Ore., of a line the company is building from the San Juan Basin of New Mex-

ico and Colorado to the Canadian border.

Approval of the Canadian importation will necessitate enlarging capacity of the line north of Umatilla.

"It is clearly in the public interest," the commission said in its order, "that these matters be decided before the commencement of construction by Pacific Northwest of the facilities north of Umatilla."

The commission also noted that its backlog of pending cases is such that "All efforts must be expended... to handle pending matters such as this case with the utmost dispatch."

Pacific proposes to import 300 million cubic feet of gas daily to be used to supplement sources tapped by the San Juan line now under construction.

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
