## All Users Subject To River Pact

This direct is being published by the Herald and News in a series of installments, of which this is the first.

The Oregon-California Klamath River Compact, which is the basis of the Klamath River Compact, is being published by the Oregon Klamath River Commission.

Article XI. General Provisions—A. Each state and all persons using or claiming any right to the waters of the Upper Klamath Basin under the authority of either state shall be subject to this compact.

Article XII. Ratification—A. The compact shall become binding when ratified by each of the signatory states and it has been consented to by the Congress of the United States, and federal legislation has been enacted subjecting the appropriate federal agencies and their designees to Articles III, VII, X and XI.

Article XIII. Termination—The compact may be terminated at any time by the legislative consent of both states, and upon such termination, all rights then established hereunder or recognized hereby shall continue to be recognized as valid by the states, notwithstanding the termination of other provisions of the compact.

## Hudson, Monroe Cartooned In New Broadway Hit Play

HOLLYWOOD (UP)—One of the new celebrities in Hollywood is an agent who has the distinction of being immortalized in a Broadway play.

"Will Success Spoil Rock Hunter?" Rock Hudson and Marilyn Monroe are caricatured, as is a top studio executive (also satirized in the movie, "The Big Knife").

But the most noticed character in the play is a powerful agent named Irving LaSalle who is supposed to be the devil in disguise. His real-life counterpart is Irving Lazar, one of the most important behind-the-scenes figures of the movie colony who, since the play, has enjoyed a new sort of fame.

Lazar runs the largest one-man literary agency in the country. His notable clients include Moss Hart, Cole Porter, Noel Coward, Ira Gershwin, Harold Arlen, George Kaufman and, of course, the "Rock Hunter" author, George Axelrod.

"I did a couple of things for George—more dough, better on-planes, and so on—that gave him the idea an agent is a powerful, impressive, omnipotent person," Lazar explained today.

"It always was a gag between us, I would tell him there was nothing I couldn't do for him," Lazar said. "He wrote me into his play, 'no contest.' And the way I somewhat patronizingly refer to my clients as 'dear boys.'"

Some celebrities are horrified at being caricatured, but Lazar was "amused" when he attended the play's recent Broadway opening.

"I thought it might be embarrassing, but everyone hollered 'congratulations' at me—even the critics," he laughed. "It was as if I were in the play myself."

## West Coast Building Off

SEATTLE (AP)—A sharp drop-off in building in October along the Pacific Coast, although the 10-month totals this year are well ahead of a year ago, was reported Thursday by Pacific Architect and Builder, trade publication.

Figures announced in the November issue were the dollar volume of building permits issued by 116 agencies in the states of Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho and Montana.

In October, for the first time this year, the total dollar volume fell below the comparable month a year ago to \$184,347,008. It was also the lowest figure for any month of 1955.

On the other hand, the area's total dollar volume for the whole year has reached \$2,179,414,014, some 18 per cent higher than a year ago, the paper reported.

Idaho had the highest rate of increase for the 10 months, a 34 per cent jump to \$20,546,734. California, with \$1,739,381,301, was up 20 per cent; Oregon, with \$17,344,143, was up 13 per cent; and Washington, with \$276,241,916, was up 7 per cent.

## Formation Of New Japanese Party May Lead To Stability

TOKYO (AP)—The formation of Japan's first united conservative party may be the first big step in the island empire's quest for economic stability.

The merger this week of the Democrats and Liberals into the Liberal-Democratic party makes possible a solid majority government with the continuity of policy and planning needed to rebuild Japan's shattered trade fortunes.

Trade is the only means by which an industrious land of too many people and too few resources can earn the purchasing power to buy necessities abroad.

The gap between what Japan must buy and what it can pay for is still great—between 300 and 600 million dollars a year, a deficit covered by purchases of U.S. service forces stationed here.

Industrialists, businessmen and government leaders know that the U. S. forces will not always be here and the day is in sight when Japan must carry the full load.

Industrialists and businessmen have been among the most active backers of the conservative merger, achieved after seven months of struggle.

The new Liberal-Democrats have 300 seats in the dominant 467-seat lower house of the Diet—almost twice the 154 of the Socialists. It is the greatest majority held by a single party in postwar Japan.

Yet trouble lies ahead for the new alignment. The first test may come when Ichiro Hatoyama, Japan's aging, 72-year-old prime minister steps down in April.

Already there have been vague hints the mantle will not fall on the shoulders of Taketora Ogata, who headed the Liberal party, without a battle. As part of the merger, a fight for Ogata is supposed to succeed Hatoyama.

A second test will come when the party's strength is tried in an election. This will offer voters a clear-cut choice between left and right of center parties and determine whether the slow Socialist gains of the past three years will continue.

But in the long run, the greatest test of all will be the party's success or failure in solving the problems of trade.

Many feel the conservatives must seek out markets in Southeast Asia, an almost unlimited storehouse of the raw materials needed for Japan's industries.

## Russian Arms Sales Increase

WASHINGTON (UP)—Russia is going ahead with an campaign of funneling arms into the Middle East despite U.S. warnings and it may lead to a new war, diplomatic reports said today.

Informed sources said Secretary of State John Foster Dulles tried but failed to win from Soviet Foreign Minister Vyacheslav M. Molotov a commitment to stop future arms shipments into the explosive Middle East.

Informed sources said Molotov made no promises to stop the shipments. Instead, the poker-faced old diplomat told Dulles the Czech deal was purely commercial with no political motivation and that he did not expect it to lead to trouble.

The Arab world continued its intensive campaign to bar Israel from getting arms or security guarantee from the United States. Syrian Ambassador Farid Zeldine warned the United States Thursday that an American security guarantee to Israel could lead to war in the Middle East.

Israel is seeking both weapons and a formal security guarantee from the United States on grounds they are needed to safeguard her from her Arab enemies.

The United States is reluctant to agree to the security arrangement. It feels Israel is adequately protected now by the 1950 U.S.-British-French declaration which pledges action to prevent threatened border violations.

The United States however, is considering a list of arms Israel wants to buy at bargain prices. If the United States decides the sale is wise, it could make it easy for Israel to finance the transaction.
