

U of O Group Hears Viewpoints Of Educators at Dinner-Rally

Dr. Victor P. Morris and Leo A. Harris, speakers at the University of Oregon mothers, fathers and alumni dinner-rally Tuesday night at the Winema Hotel, stressed the importance of continued parent-child interest through the student's college years.

Dr. Morris, dean of Oregon's school of business administration, and director of athletics Harris were brought here by the local Oregon Mother's Club to delineate the new trends in educational policies and to discuss the obligations of the school and parent to the student.

With some 30 years spent on the Eugene campus as a student, graduate student and faculty member — (when he wasn't at some other seat of learning to earn another degree), Dr. Morris has "lived" through many trends.

He said that the development of greater fields of research opened up by wider and faster channels of communication has, in those years, completely changed the education picture.

Of today's college exams he quoted in an anecdote "the questions are the same old questions — but the answers are new." "And," he added, "the answers that got A's for some of you old grads would get you a 'Dunk' on the same set of questions today."

Dean Morris has demonstrated many times his deep interest in the student "as an individual" — with personal problems requiring particular and distinct consideration.

He said "while its physical attributes are essential to the University of Oregon, the institution itself is in reality 5,000 students, plus an excellent faculty, plus actively interested fathers, mothers and alumni."

"The main task of the university is its service to your sons and daughters. This service is three fold.

"First, to give as complete and

effective an education as possible to students who must take places in a complex and changing world, where much knowledge and information becomes more and more essential for effective living.

"Second, to give every possible opportunity and assistance in the development of qualities of leadership.

"Third, to supply such wise guidance as may be available in making the highly important decisions of life — decisions often made during the four years in college. Two of them directly effect the entire future — the choice of a life work — and the choice of one's companion in the establishment of a home and as a partner in community activities.

"You parents should all realize that the education of young men and women is a continuous process involving both the home and the school.

"No parent should expect the school to take over completely the task of training. The changes involved in the college years are of such lasting significance — the home should more than ever, continue its interest and influence."

Leo Harris spoke briefly before he showed a comprehensive collection colored slides — including administrative buildings, housing facilities and athletic arenas. The movies covered various athletic and sports events and of special interest was last year's Homecoming game at Corvallis.

John Houston, active member of the Oregon Alumni Association, emceed the program and introduced the speakers.

Mrs. A. Ivan Thompson, president of the Klamath Falls Oregon Mother's Club, introduced the dinner committee members, who decorated the tables, made the Oregon Duck identification cutouts, mailed invitations, etc.

The response at the kick-off dinner was so enthusiastic that another get-together is being considered for the near future.

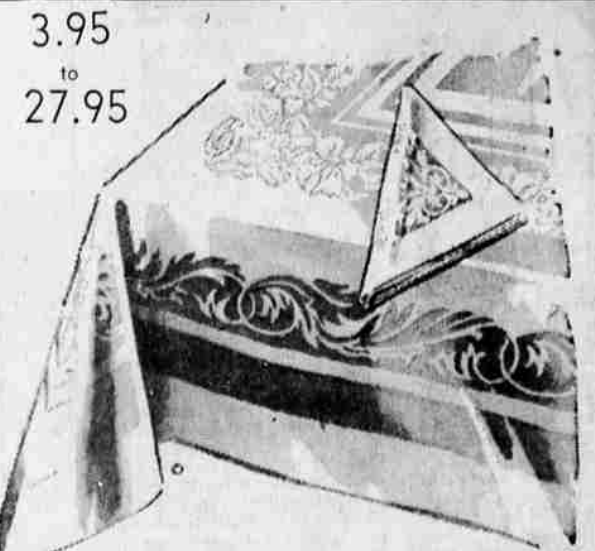


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Ideas IN PAINT and WALLPAPER

Tired of looking at the same old room? Give them a brand new lease on life with fresh, new color styling. Choose colors that express the smart mood of today! If you're timid about combining a number of shades, start with a monochromatic scheme (walls, trim, floors and ceiling all done in the same shade) then introduce variety by using wallpaper in an unexpected manner.

Note how effectively wallpaper has been used on the fireplace wall in the accompanying sketch. Charcoal grey background color in the wallpaper provides a dramatic contrast for the citron yellow walls and carpet. Citron and pink, with touches of green throughout the room, were picked up from the floral colors in the wallpaper to cut the room in gay, young, sophisticated mood.



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
