Medford Land Sales Held

In an oral auction sale held by the Bureau of Land Management in Medford on November 17 two tracts of timber totalling an estimated 7,114,000 board feet were purchased for \$232,096.85.

Bate Lumber Company of Merlin, with an offer of \$138,673.85 was the highest of the 5 bidders who participated in the first sale. That tract, which contains an estimated 3,818,000 board feet, is located near Wilderville in Josephine County. The bid price for Douglas fir, the major species, in the tract was \$36.75 per thousand board feet.

In the second sale, Fir Milling and Planting Company of Ashland was successful bidder for a tract containing an estimated, 3,296,000 board feet of mixed pine and fir species located near Buck Lake in Klamath County. Three other bidders participated in the sale. Prices offered by Fir Milling and Planting Company in their final bid included \$38.00 per thousand for Douglas fir, \$50.00 for ponderosa pine, \$31.00 for sugar pine, and \$58.00 for white pine. The total bid was \$113,423.00.

KF Garbage Meeting Held

Representatives of the Klamath Disposal Company Friday afternoon said they would poll their commercial customers to find out if any changes in garbage collection hours should be made.

They made this statement after they heard some complaints about service hours at a special meeting called by city councilmen to discuss the garbage situation. Several hotel owners complained that collections were too early, causing a disturbance for sleeping guests. Owners of some businesses said that the present early morning collections forced them to leave refuse in the alleys overnight.

Also discussed was the ordinance passed on September 6 requiring commercial establishments to provide boxes to protect garbage cans and prevent garbage from being blown around and littering the streets.

The two main complaints presented were that the boxes were inadequate in size and that the boxes would be damaged by traffic in the alleys. The ordinance provides the dimensions for the boxes.

Councilmen recommended that protective iron poles might preserve the boxes from damage by trucks, especially in narrow alleys. Mayor Paul Landry said that enforcement of the ordinance, which has been delayed to permit time for installation of the boxes, would begin immediately. He also said that police officers would be directed to keep an eye out for persons who dump garbage in alleys.

A brief discussion of the extension of the franchise of the Klamath Disposal Company also took place. The Klamath Disposal Company had requested that the old franchise, which was for five years with an extension provision of five years, be cancelled and a new one be issued.

Councilmen present indicated that if this were done, the payments by the company would probably be increased.
