Vatican Reveals That Pope Pius Saw Vision Of Christ During Critical Illness

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Vatican announced Monday that Pope Pius XII saw a vision of Jesus Christ during the most critical moments of his grave illness last winter. The recovery of the desperately ill pontiff began soon after. The announcement was made by Luciano Casimiri, chief of the Vatican press office, upon authorization of the papal secretariat of state. The secretariat normally would make such statements only with the personal authorization of the Pope. Casimiri told newsmen that they could state that "responsible Vatican circles" confirm the report of the vision published last week in Oggi (Today), the largest Italian weekly magazine. The Oggi article said: "The secret about the episode was kept until now, and only the affectionate indiscretion of one of those knowing it enabled us to learn and tell of the marvelous episode, which undoubtedly will deeply move the Catholic faithful all over the world. 'The Holy Father is perfectly sure he saw Jesus — it was no dream; in that moment (on Dec. 2, 1954) he was fully awake and clear-minded. 'On the following day, when it seemed there were no hopes left, when the world's newspapers already had been circulating with forecasts of a forthcoming grave catastrophe, the ailing Pope started to improve in such a sudden manner that many people considered it a miracle.' Oggi said that on Dec. 2, 1954, when the ailing Pope's illness from a gastric disturbance reached a climax, the pontiff began reciting the prayer, 'Anima Christi (soul of Christ)'. When he came to the invocation 'in horae mortis mea, voca me (in the hour of my death, call me)', the Pope said 'the sweet person of Jesus Christ at his bedside. 'In that moment,' said the magazine, 'the Holy Father believed that the Teacher came to call him to himself, and, serenely answering to the call, he continued the prayer: 'Jube me venire ad te (order me to come to you), Jesus, however, did not come to take him, but to console him and give him the certainty that his hour had not yet come.'"

CAB Probes Wreckage Of Plane

SEATTLE (AP) — Civil Aeronautics Board investigators studied the burned remnants of a crashed airliner Monday seeking the full answer to what caused an accident that took 27 lives. Frank K. McKivern of the CAB Bureau of Safety Investigation said the probe of Friday's crash of a chartered Pan-Am Air Transport DC4 probably will take several weeks and will include a public hearing. The four-engine transport, loaded with 61s flying to their homes in the East for the holidays, crashed at two minutes after midnight Friday after taking off from Boeing Field here. Forty-seven of the 74 aboard survived. William J. McDougall, 40, Miami, Fla., the pilot, said Saturday the immediate cause of the crash was propeller failure. He said the propeller on the No. 4 engine (outside, right) failed to function properly when he ordered a routine reduction from "full takeoff" power after the plane had reached an altitude of about 1,000 feet and speed of 135 miles an hour. Attempts to "feather" the propeller (turn its edge to the wind) so power could be cut off from the engine were futile, McDougall declared. Instead, the propeller blades turned flat. This created a severe drag "like having a barn door out on your wing," and caused the plane to yaw, losing control and altitude. McDougall said this could have been caused by failure in the engine or failure of the propeller mechanism.

SEATTLE (AP) — The Muscular Dystrophy Assn., whose fund raising drive was checked last week by the United Fund as "unwarranted and unnecessary" was to get its "porchlight parade" under way here Monday night. Officials of the association said that the United Fund attack was unfair. They said that polo had been all but conquered by the March of Dimes drives and that they were working for a similar solution to their problems. The United Cerebral Palsy Assn., which also was criticized by the United Fund, has scheduled a fund raising drive soon. Officials said they had decided to undertake their own drive, instead of joining the United Fund, in order to educate the public to the problems of the disease. Directors of the United Fund said the two organizations should have joined the United Fund's money-raising drive and shared in its benefits.

SEATTLE (AP) — A plywood official announced Saturday that the AFL lumber workers and plywood, lumber and logging industries in five Western states have agreed on a new two-year contract. The official, Alfred J. Schweppe of Seattle, said the pact covers industry workers in Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho and Montana. He forecast quick certification of the new pact, which calls for a 5 to 15 cents an hour raise effective from this Dec. 1 to April 1, 1957. The present pay scale starts from a \$1.93 base. Employers said that although the current contract does not expire until next April 1 they agreed to the earlier effective date in order to establish labor peace and to avoid another strike like the three-month layoff in the summer of 1954. The AFL groups whose officials initiated the agreement Saturday represent 100,000 lumber workers in the five states. Schweppe is chairman of the Plywood and Door Manufacturers Industrial Committee. A m.o.g. those representing unions were: Earl Hartley, Seattle, president of the Puget Sound district council; Kenneth Davis, executive secretary of the northwestern council, and Ted Prusia, Eugene, Ore., executive secretary of the Willamette Valley district council.
