

Seven Die In North California

SAN FRANCISCO (UP) — The Highway Patrol reported today that at least seven persons were killed in traffic accidents in Northern California over the weekend.

Alvin Cobb, 5, San Francisco, was killed on Bayshore Highway last night as he crossed against the signal at the Visitation Ave. crossing during a rainstorm. The driver, Jack J. Capps, 31, Lakewood, said he did not see the child until he felt an impact and saw the child hurtling through the air, police Officer Rudy Haase reported. Capps was not cited.

A three-car collision on Pacheco Pass east of Gilroy killed two persons and injured four others late Saturday. The dead were identified as John Weber, 21, Milpitas, and his grandfather, William Doldge, 67, Fresno.

Mrs. Jean Vasquez, 22, San Lorenzo, a mother of three, was killed early Saturday when the car she was driving struck a light pole on the Eastshore Freeway near Oakland.

Elmer A. Inman, 67, Project City, and Mrs. Mildred A. McCathern, 49, Redding, were killed when their car collided with a truck at Project City.

John Stahnke, 31, San Francisco warehouseman, was killed late Friday night when he was thrown from a car in a collision with a car driven by William McKnight, 36, Westview in San Mateo County.

Husband Held For Assault

Harold (Charlie) Hill, 26-year-old Chiloquin logger, accused of cutting his wife's throat with a hunting knife, was charged with assault with a dangerous weapon Monday.

Hill was transferred from Klamath Valley Hospital to the county jail Sunday by Sheriff Murray Britton. He was under treatment for a self-inflicted bullet wound in the chest. The cutting and shooting occurred in Chiloquin Saturday.

Britton said Hill killed the family dog and tried suicide after knifing his wife, Rose Marie Hill, 31. Mrs. Hill is still in the hospital in a serious condition. Her throat was slashed from ear to ear.

The alleged knife wielder was slated for arraignment late Monday before District Judge D. E. Van Vactor.

Two Killed In Hunting Mishaps

KNIGHTSEN (UP) — Two men were killed in hunting accidents during the opening of pheasant season near here in Contra Costa County over the weekend.

Alvin C. Maybeck, 57, a Stockton rancher, accidentally shot himself yesterday with his own shotgun when he slipped crossing an irrigation ditch.

Aaron Schubert, 45, of Oakland, was killed by a blast from the gun of his son, Don, 15, as they were hunting together on Bethel Island Saturday.

George H. Wheeler, 33, of Orinda was wounded in the leg yesterday, while hunting in Yolo County with a friend, Calvert Bowles, 74, of Orinda.

Horseradish Harvest On

TULELAKE—Harvesting of the 100 acres of horseradish raised here this year for the first time on a commercial scale will continue until the ground freezes.

Burton Hoyle, manager of the Tulelake Field Station said today that digging will be continued as soon as the snow melts. Snowfall in the recent storm was much less than the Klamath Falls area.

Forty thousand pounds left the sorting sheds for Portland last week which brought 10 cents per pound field run. Yields are from three to four tons per acre but vary widely according to cultural methods used.

Yield in most fields was satisfactory, Hoyle said. The crop is being dug with two row potato diggers or potato bulkers. A crew of 20 men and women are sorting in three, eight-hour shifts at Jones' Cellar No. 4 at Newell.

Any part of the crop not harvested before the ground freezes can be harvested next spring without damaging the roots of the plant.

Snow and cold gave a touch of winter to scattered sections of the North Monday.

Heavy snow ranging from 2 to 8 inches fell in the northern half of New York State. The snow resulted in seven deaths in traffic accidents.

Another storm center was over Idaho Monday. Grangeville, Idaho, reported 10 inches of fresh snow in a 24-hour period.

Cold Canadian air dropped temperatures as much as 22 degrees in parts of the Dakotas and Northern Minnesota.

Heavy frost was reported during the night at Vicksburg, Miss., and Savannah, Ga.

Sales Keep On Booming

WASHINGTON (UP) — Booming sales are keeping goods from piling up in the nation's warehouses despite record production this year, the Commerce Department reported today.

The department said manufacturers' and retailers' inventories, an important barometer of business conditions, tended to level off in the period from July to September.

There had been a steady rise in inventories during the first six months of the year.

The department's monthly survey of current business said manufacturers had enough stock to last about 49 days on Sept. 30. This compared with about 56 days of stocks on hand at the same date a year ago.
