

Japan Reelects Prime Minister

TOKYO (UP)—Ichiro Hatoyama was reelected prime minister of Japan by parliament today and promptly formed a new government with the Japanese conservative political forces united behind him.

The 72-year-old Hatoyama won the post over Socialist Party leader Mossaburo Suzuki by a vote of 288 to 150 in the House of Representatives, and by 149 to 64 in the upper House of Councilors, it was

the third time Hatoyama has been named prime minister since his political comeback a year ago. Hatoyama promptly announced the formation of a cabinet made up of leaders of the Liberal-Democratic Party, born only a week ago by the merger of the Liberal and Democratic parties. The cabinet included 10 former Democrats and seven former Liberals.

Mamoru Shigemitsu, 68, the one-legged diplomat who signed Japan's surrender aboard the USS Missouri in 1945, was retained as deputy premier and foreign minister. He was one of six holdovers from Hatoyama's former government.

The prime minister said he would continue his foreign policy of "peace" and strive to improve domestic conditions. He said he also hoped, among other things, to revise Japan's postwar constitution.

"I believe firmly the time has come for our nation to become a truly independent nation," Hatoyama said.

Court To Rule On Security

WASHINGTON (UP)—The Supreme Court has agreed to decide whether President Eisenhower overstepped his authority two years ago in extending the security program to all government employees.

Kenrick M. Cole, ousted New York food and drug inspector, brought a case to the high court contending that the Mr. Eisenhower was bound by a 1950 law to authorize security dismissals only for workers in positions which have a bearing on national defense. The court will rule on Cole's case later this term.

Cole argued that there was no justification for labeling him a security risk when he was fired since he was not in a position to reveal secrets or influence policy. The government argued that terms of the law were broad enough to give the President power to blanket all government workers under the program.

Mild Weather In Prospect

It was colder in sections of the Northwest today but fairly mild November weather appeared in prospect for most other parts of the country.

The cold air sent temperatures down as much as 23 degrees in the northern Rockies and the Great Basin region. Readings generally were in the 20s and 30s with lower marks in some areas, including Butte, Mont., which reported 8 above, a drop of 21 degrees. It was warmer over the Mississippi Valley with biggest rises in temperatures in northern Minnesota and parts of Louisiana and Mississippi. Readings ranged from the mid 20s in Minnesota to around 60 along the Louisiana coast. Not much change in weather conditions was reported in other areas. Light snow or flurries fell along the northern border from New England westward through the upper Lakes region, Minnesota, the Northern Plains and the northern Rockies.

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Fighter-Bomber Passes Tests

EDWARDS, Calif. (UP)—Republic Aviation Corp. has announced the successful flight testing of the new super-sonic F105A fighter-bomber. It was developed to fill the need for a supersonic fighter-bomber capable of delivering nuclear weapons as well as heavier loads of conventional bombs and rockets at extremely high speeds over a long range.

The initial flight was Oct. 22 and 12 others have been made since, the company said. Performance details are classified secret.

The F105A has short, thin, swept-back wings, a long cylindrical fuselage and wing root intake ducts permitting radar equipment to be installed in the nose.

Ben Youssef Races Clock

RABAT, Morocco (UP)—Sultan Sidi Mohammed Ben Youssef raced against the clock—and the threat of anarchy—today to set up a strong national government that could end the eruption of violence that has cost some 20 lives since his restoration.

The Sultan hoped to complete formation of Morocco's first modern government by sundown, before nationalist agitators could stir Moroccans into fresh rioting. At least 20 persons were killed and 80 wounded in clashes between opposing factions in the restive North African territory.

Premier-designate Si Fatmi Ben Slimane and the three-man throne council established by the French before Ben Youssef's return resigned Monday night to clear the way for the new government.

The new government's first task will be to negotiate a revision of the 1912 treaty of Fez with France. The treaty established Morocco as a French protectorate.

The government may also seek renegotiation of the agreement made by France with the United States for the lease of Air Force bases.

Ben Youssef and French Resident-General Andre Dubois hope that once a new government has been established, the clashes between the sultan's followers and those who supported "interim" Sultan Sidi Mohammed Ben Moulay Arafat may be ended.

The violence erupted Saturday when the caliph of Fez, who supported Arafat, was stabbed to death inside the imperial palace by an enraged mob.

Post Office Eases Package Ruling

WASHINGTON (UP)—Just in time for Christmas, the Post Office Department is relaxing its rules to permit inclusion of personal messages in packages and second-class mail. But you still have to pay the extra postage.

Heretofore putting a letter inside a package made the sender liable to as much as a \$100 fine. The new arrangement is effective Monday.

All that's necessary is to note on the outside of the package that a letter is enclosed and put an additional stamp on the package.

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
