The grocer was arrested after an investigation by County Juvenile Officer Francis Mathews and a complaint had been signed by the father of the boy who is alleged to have purchased the beer. The trial was expected to end late Tuesday.

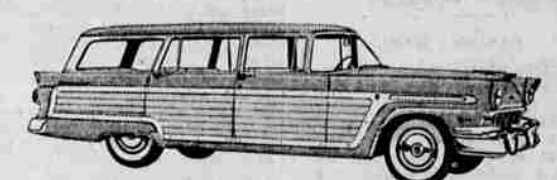
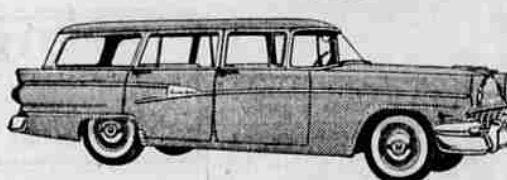
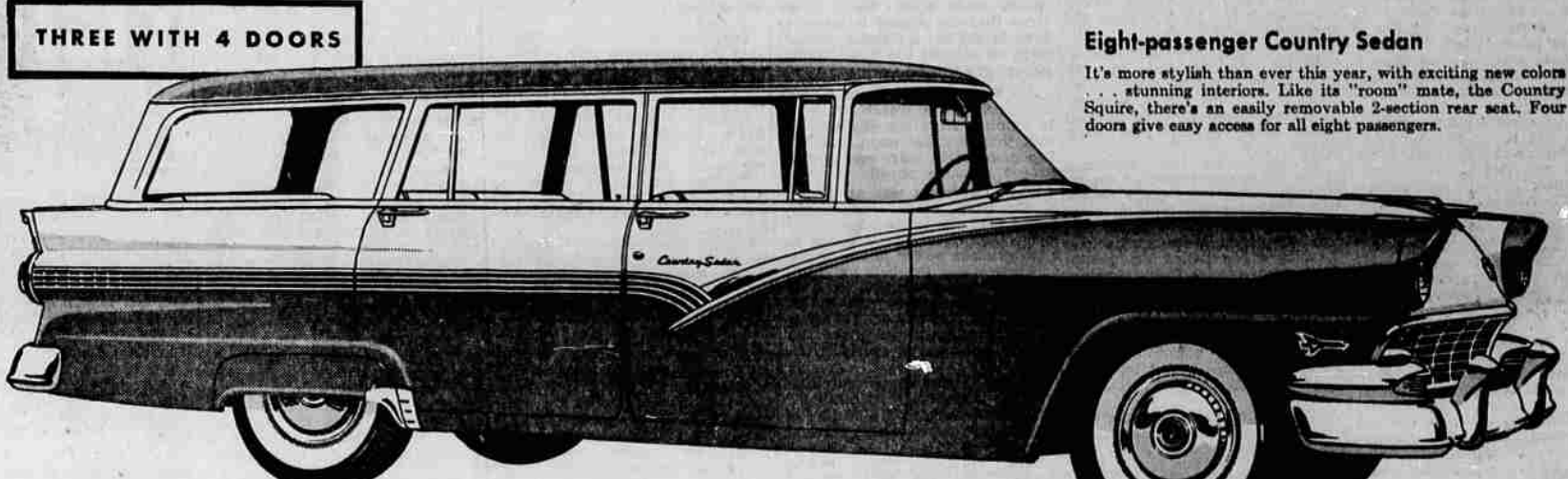
