Eartha Kitt Plans Change; To Star In TV Omnibus Show

 HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—Sleeping, perfume-nighdlifers who crowd into the Mocambo these night to cheer Eartha Kitt don't know it, but it's probably the last time they'll see the catlike singer in a nightclub.
 Eartha's lonely voice and sexy lyrics have made her a top nightclub star. But the tiny singer confesses she's giving up smoke-filled cabarets for a different life.
 The girl who croons "C'est Si Bon" will forget singing to dance and act in her first "nonracial" role as "Salome" on CBS-TV's "Omnibus" Dec. 18, the first time a Negro has had the part.
 Like most show folk, Eartha also is writing a book about her Cinderella life. And she wants to concentrate on doing more dramatic roles on the stage and TV.
 "I don't want to become stagnant," she explained today. "It's better not to stand still. You have to make progress."
 Eartha moved about her apartment, a doll-like figure in a blue Japanese kimono. When she talks she gestures with her hands.
 "My main concern is getting the book out," she went on. "Then I want to communicate with myself for a while. You can run around for so long, playing many characters, you can lose your true personality. I'm tired of being a gypsy—I have bought the legendary house on 92nd Street in New York and will live there."
 "The book has taken me three years for I'm a very moody person," she frowned. "I only write when I feel like it."
 Eartha's book will tell the story of the poor, sharoctopper's daughter in South Carolina who became a star of the Katherine Dunham dance troupe, the darling of Paris as a singer and a Broadway star in "New Faces" and "Mrs. Patrice."
 "Years ago I dreamed of starring on Broadway and a friend told me I never would in these times. Now here I am—co-starring with Michael Redgrave on TV," she said. "If my dreams can come true, why can't other dreams come true?"

Orville Hamilton Makes S-D Day Plans For Klamath

The first day of December will be observed throughout the nation as S-D Day. That's the "Safe Driving" day when every community in the United States, including Klamath Falls will do its best to go 24 hours without a traffic death.
 When asked what each driver could do to help keep S-D Day accident free, Chief Orville Hamilton said, "A safe driver drives defensively. Now, the average car owner may never have heard of defensive driving, but it's a well known term to those professional drivers who rack up thousands of miles of accident free driving each year.
 "The defensive driver acts as though he is always under attack. His enemies are careless motorists, careless pedestrians and unsafe traffic conditions. The defensive driver makes allowance for these highway culprits. He avoids accidents by anticipating and allowing for the hazards created by the unsafe acts of others and by adverse traffic and weather conditions."
 Chief Hamilton asked every driver in Klamath Falls to check himself to see whether he is driving defensively. The defensive driver can answer "yes" to all the following questions:
 Do you drive so that you are never surprised by the actions of other motorists or pedestrians?
 At intersections do you make sure no one is approaching from your right or left even though you may have the right-of-way?
 Do you constantly check your rear-view mirror to see what's happening behind you?
 Do you watch out for pedestrians even though they may be crossing against the light?
 Do you keep a sharp eye out for oncoming cars that might suddenly make left turns in front of you?
 On slippery pavement do you check your braking to see how much traction you have in case you must make an emergency stop?
 In short, you are a defensive driver when you drive for the other fellow as well as for yourself. On S-D Day and every other day of the year be your brother's keeper by driving safely and doing your part to stop accidents, Chief Hamilton said.
