Woman Given 10-Day Sentence

Barbara Fletcher, 26-year-old Spokane, Washington, nurse, arrested at the scene of a stabbing affray, was sentenced to 10 days in the county jail late Tuesday by District Judge D. E. Van Vactor. The nurse was taken into custody Monday night by Sheriff Murray Britton and State Policeman Dick Fimmel after Frank Ealey, 46-year-old construction worker, was found near death in a house at 651 Highway 97.

Britton said Ealey had been stabbed in the chest and an artery was severed. He suffered great loss of blood. The wounded man was taken to Klamath Valley Hospital in a Kaler ambulance. District Attorney Richard Beesley said Wednesday morning he is still investigating the Fletcher woman's possible connection with the stabbing. When she appeared before Judge Van Vactor and entered a plea of guilty to the drunkenness charge, the nurse said she was so intoxicated she had no recollection of what transpired in the house on Highway-97.

Klamath Forger Caught In Nevada

Jerry Lee Maxwell, 28-year-old ex-convict, described by Sheriff Murray Britton as a "fast man with a fountain pen," was arrested late Tuesday in Reno, Nevada, on a Klamath County warrant charging him with forgery.

According to the sheriff, Maxwell was the author of more than \$1,000 in bogus checks passed in Klamath Falls business establishments. An alleged accomplice of Maxwell's, Harry Walter Lewis, pleaded guilty before Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg to a bogus check charge. He will be sentenced Monday.

Deputy Sheriff Dale Mattoon, who traced Maxwell to Reno, said the reputed forger is a "three-time loser." He served terms in Texas State Prison, Oregon State Prison and San Quentin. He also is wanted for cashing a \$1,000 worthless check in Lakeview. Deputy Sheriff Dell Summers left for Reno Tuesday to take Maxwell into custody.
