Civil Service Positions Open

The U.S. Civil Service Commission has announced the following examinations: economist, for filling positions paying from \$5,440 to \$11,610 in various federal agencies; medical technician and medical X-ray technician, for filling positions paying from \$2,960 to \$4,525 a year in various agencies; and bindery woman for positions paying \$1.51 an hour in the government printing office. All positions to be filled are in the Washington, D.C. area.

No written test is required for any of these examinations; to qualify, applicants must have had appropriate experience in the field work for which they apply. For the economist positions pertinent college study may be substituted for part of the required experience.

Applications for economist, medical X-ray technician must be filed with the U.S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D.C. Applications for bindery woman must be filed with the executive secretary, Board of U.S. Civil Service Examiners, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D.C. Applications will be accepted until further notice.

National Grange Delegates Consider Two-Price Plan

CLEVELAND (AP)—Delegates to the 89th annual convention of the National Grange today were considering a six-point program that would permit farmers to compete at any price in the world market while accepting a parity price at home.

Under the two-price plan farmers would compete in the world market freely, accepting only "our fair share of the world market."

At home they would comply with parity based on the high cost of machinery, labor, taxes, land and the like. They could raise only their normal quota for domestic markets but any amount grown above that could be sold at the farmer's risk, in competition anywhere.

Delegates started discussion of the program yesterday after hearing a talk by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson in which he said nobody should make a political football out of the farm problem.

The secretary said he would "never knowingly advocate or support any policy or program which I believe is not in the best interests of our farmers and fair to all our people—regardless of political pressure."

Benson told the delegates that a 400-million-dollar-a-year soil bank idea is being worked out in Washington that would permit farmers to use fallow land for grazing or for such fertility-building crops as soy beans.

He said the plan calls for the government to pay the farmer if he did not harvest any cash crop from the land. This might be in new legislation being shaped now, Benson added.

Delegates said they favored the soil bank plan if it included cutting production to match needs more nearly and building of soil resources as a "defense against hunger."

In addition to the two-price plan, the program under consideration

today called for elimination of price supports as rapidly as possible; research committees to study how to cut costs, improve products and find better ways to market each commodity; an aggressive export plan to keep America's historical share of the world market; a soil conservation program to build up a fertility reserve, and a program of research towards sell-

ing more, improving packaging and finding what products are more salable.

The 10-day convention will adjourn tomorrow.
