Parental Lack Case Heard

WEED — The first known case here of parents being arrested for not sending their children to school was heard in the Weed judicial court Monday afternoon.

Floyd and Jewel Kiser, man and wife, cited under the Education Code, pleaded guilty to the charge before Judge Kenneth Stone and each were sentenced to five days in the Weed jail and fined \$10 each the time to serve suspended. They were arrested Monday by Weed police on complaint signed by J. G. Edwards, attendance officer of the county superintendent of schools office at Yreka.

Elementary school officials at Weed alleged that the Kisers' four children, two boys and two girls, aged 12, 11, 9, and 7, had attended only 30 out of the first 90 days of school this term. Extended efforts made by the local school authorities to get the children in school were of no avail.

Kiser has been employed by the Long-Bell Lumber Company during his residence in Weed for the past year.

Merrill Hunters Bag Moose

MERRILL — Forty one below zero weather that came with the early November storm that swept the Northwest was experienced by two Merrill couples, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Walker and Mr. and Mrs. J. A. McDonald who were in Canada on a moose hunting trip.

The hunters, housed part of the time in a small cabin, slept in their clothes during the severest part of the storm to keep warm. Water in a hotel they visited froze in the pipes and it took four days to get a damaged radiator in one of their cars repaired.

While in Canada they visited former Merrill residents, Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Cole, now raising cattle at Horseshoe. Cole at one time operated the Shell service station in Merrill.

Red Leaders Visit Aquarium

BOMBAY, India (AP)—India's Russian visitors made the Bombay Aquarium their first stop on a busy tour today as a promised meeting with news correspondents was dropped suddenly from their schedule.

The Press Guild of India had arranged the news conference with Soviet Premier Bulganin and Communist Party Chief Nikita Khrushchev, now on a whirlwind tour through India after a state visit to Prime Minister Nehru.

The mass interview was first advanced from afternoon to early morning, then canceled and inspection of the fish was substituted. Government information officers had no explanation.

Bombay, scene of bloody Communist-spurred rioting Monday, was calm. Vast crowds lined the visitors' route, cheering and waving flags. The riots had no apparent connection with the Soviet leaders' visit, stemming from the Nehru government's proposal to make Bombay city an independent state and separate it from neighboring Marathi-speaking territory.

Medical Jobs Open In V.A.

Civil Service examinations have been announced for medical biology technician for filling positions paying from \$2,960 to \$4,525 in various specialized fields in federal agencies in Washington, D.C., and vicinity; and for dietetic intern for filling internships paying \$2,600 a year in Veterans Administration hospitals throughout the country.

Applicants for medical biology technician must have had appropriate experience in the biological sciences. Pertinent high school and college education may be substituted for part of the required experience. No written test is required. Applications will be accepted until further notice by the U.S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D.C.

Mr. Saylor suggests to those expecting to attend, "Get your reservation in now, if they are not already in the mail."

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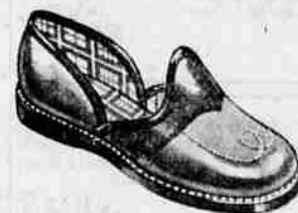
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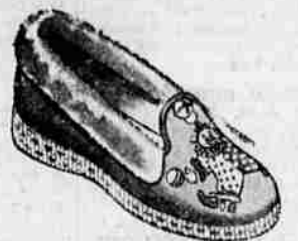
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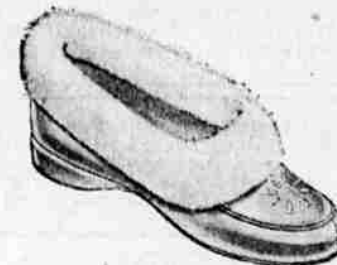

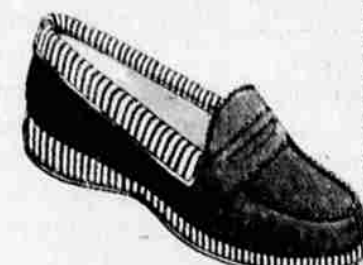

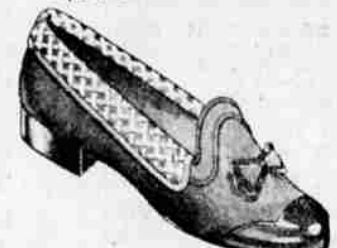
