### Jeff Donnell 'Remarried' To TV Star George Gobel

HOLLYWOOD (UP)—Jeff Donnell is happily "married" again to George Gobel on his television show—thanks to the fans who helped her get her job back.  
When the Gobel show opened for the fall season, many viewers were disappointed to see that Gobel's wife, Alice, played by Jeff, had vanished. In her place was a mother who twitted and herded the little comedian past the TV cameras. The response was violent and immediate.  
In Hollywood a club was formed to get the mother off the show and bring back Alice. Letters from anxious Alice-lovers poured into NBC. Two weeks later Jeff returned to the show.  
"I'm very happy to be back," Jeff said today. "At first I felt badly about not being on the show—I felt so married to George! Every place I went people asked me, when are you going back on the show?"  
Jeff had no idea she was written out of the program until late August. Producer-writer Hal Kanter decided George's stint would turn into another husband-wife comedy unless he changed the format.  
"Besides, having a different actress play Alice each program would give them more opportunities for guest stars," Jeff said. "I understood that. So when my agent phoned to tell me to look for another job, I wasn't hurt or angry." Before she was "fired," Jeff also separated from husband Aldo Ray, but she insists their troubles have nothing to do with the Gobel show.  
"But about that time I was blue and didn't feel good about anything," she said. "Then I got a phone call to come back to work. When I drove into the parking lot at NBC, the boy said, 'Welcome back, Alice.' That made me feel good."

### Woman Killed In Chicago

CHICAGO (UP)—Police today backtracked through the private life of a divorced mother of six in an attempt to find a clue to the strange case of her trussed body in a muddy South Side alley.  
They want to find out what happened to Mrs. Edith Jamieson between the time she left her job at a loop bank at 4:20 a.m. and 7:20 a.m. yesterday when her body was discovered in the alley.  
Police said examination disclosed she was neither raped nor robbed in the apparently motiveless slaying.  
Police questioned four men who were acquainted with Mrs. Jamieson, a divorcee and a grandmother, but obtained no tangible clues. Police are searching for a cab driver, who they said, was believed to have regularly met Mrs. Jamieson at a streetcar intersection in the early mornings after she left work and driven her home free.  
Police are convinced she was strangled one place and her body was brought to the alley, about a block from her South Side home at 5016 S. Rockwell St. They said that although the alley was muddy, Mrs. Jamieson's clothing was relatively clean and there were no signs of a struggle in the alley.  
Mrs. Jamieson's former husband, David, 45, is a paraplegic confined to a wheelchair. Police said Jamieson, who suffered a mild heart attack a month ago, was in a hospital Tuesday night.

### Overseas GIs Give Thanks

WITH U. S. 24TH DIVISION, Korea up — Thousands of U. S. soldiers guarding the 2 1/2 year old armistice are thankful today for new solid buildings in which they will spend the winter more comfortably than Americans ever have before in the mountains of Korea.  
Next to day and night combat exercises, the biggest thing for some 30,000 troops of the 7th and 24th Infantry Divisions has been the program of Gen. I. D. White, 8th army commander, to get them out of tents before severe cold starts.  
"Almost every company is doubling as a construction outfit, working against time to erect the 24-man quonset sets before snow falls."  
The Army says more than 75 per cent of the men already are out of tents.  
"My men are excited at the prospect of solid buildings with real cots and mattresses," said Capt. Eugene F. Fox of Alton, Mo., commander of B Company of the 21st Regiment. His men have been sleeping in sleeping bags in tents.  
Men in the field must walk to outdoor showers and lavatories and their electricity is limited. But they are elated at the warmth in their new homes provided by oil stoves.  
"Living in this place and living in our old tents is like heaven and hell. Here we live, there it was, well—rough," said Sgt. O. C. Raoul Labbe of 582 Zion St. Hartford, Conn.  
A community center is planned for each regiment. It will include a big post exchange, snack bar, library, service club with a piano, movie theater with a wide screen, bowling alley and a gym big enough for two basketball games and calisthenics.
