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U.S. Pauses To Observe Thanksgiving

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Americans at home and abroad paused today to count their blessings. They thronged to houses of worship, gathered before their fireplaces—and prepared to eat just a bit too much for comfort.

Then too there were parades, football games and special attention to the unfortunate.

At their Gettysburg, Pa., farm home President and Mrs. Eisenhower were a symbol of our traditional Thanksgiving celebration. With them to partake of a turkey dinner and some pleasant family talk were the Eisenhowers' son, Maj. John Eisenhower, their daughter-in-law and their three grandchildren.

And those in our armed forces

stationed throughout the world girded for a gobbler dinner and all the trimmings.

A quarter of a million GIs throughout Europe had their sights set on at least one pound of turkey each plus all the trimmings.

In England, The American Society in London held its annual Thanksgiving banquet, while religious services were scheduled for American servicemen in the United Kingdom.

U.S. Ambassador C. Douglas Dillon read the President's Thanksgiving Day proclamation at non-denominational services in Paris.

U.S. Ambassador Clare Boothe Luce read the proclamation at St. Paul's Protestant Church in Rome. It was a day off for most servicemen, with only skeleton forces remaining on duty.

In Korea, more than 30,000 American soldiers devoured a gourmet's dinner even though camped in bleak hills guarding the 2 1/2-year-old armistice.

Americans in the Netherlands, some 3,500 of them, celebrated the landing of our "Pilgrim Fathers" more than 300 years ago.

In Brussels, U.S. Ambassador Frederik M. Alger Jr. held a recep-

tion for the diplomatic corps and Belgian government officials. Vice President Richard M. Nixon, speaking for the President, took part in an hour-long radio program (NBC, Harvest of Thanksgiving), a broadcast produced in cooperation with the National Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.

Thanksgiving means a mass return to the "old homestead" and the resulting acceleration in travel by plane, train and auto. In Chicago, the National Safety Council urged motorists to make Thanksgiving an extra-safe day on the highways.

Philanthropic agencies throughout the nation combined to feed the ill, the forsaken and all those who have little thanks to give. In many prisons the bill-of-fare took on a holiday appeal.

In Newark, N.J., last night more than half a million persons jammed a blacked-out downtown section to watch a dazzling array of illuminated floats. The parade, sponsored by Bamberger's store, was telecast from coast to coast.

In New York city today was the annual Macy's Thanksgiving Day parade, with some 4,000 elaborately costumed marchers taking part.
