

Fish And Wildlife Theme Set For Walton Convention

Fish and Wildlife will be the general theme of the 3rd Annual Convention of the Oregon Division, Isaac Walton League of America, in Bend November 25-27, with Dr. O. Lloyd Meehan, assistant to the chief, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Washington, D.C., as featured speaker at the annual banquet Saturday night. In announcing the scheduled appearance of Dr. Meehan, convention chairman William Niskanen of Bend noted several fish and wildlife problems in Oregon will come before the more than 200 delegates to the convention.

Featured for the first day will be a panel discussion of salmon problems in connection with various hydroelectric projects proposed to be built, as well as the coastal stream closure bill. The Walton League refused to back the initiative measure to close the coastal streams south of the Columbia River to commercial netting at the last election. The measure, commonly known as the "S.O.S." bill, did not pass, but recently another, slightly different bill was filed with the secretary of state.

Also scheduled for Friday, November 25, is an address by Joseph Penfold of Denver, national conservation director for the league. At noon Friday, the league's annual conservation awards, in the form of gold "Beavers" will be made to outstanding individuals of the state.

Saturday will see more than 14 local chapters of the league from throughout the state receive national citations, presented by Oregon Membership Chairman Dr. Alfred Krefz of Portland.

Also scheduled for Saturday is election of officers and the all-important report of the resolutions committee. Gary D. Ewing, Portland attorney, is chairman of the resolutions committee. Resolutions to be debated include one calling for amendment of the Federal Power Act to prohibit the Federal Power Commission from granting licenses for hydroelectric dams when state authorities refuse a license. This legislation is being urged as a result of a recent supreme court decision in the Pelton Dam case.

The state of Oregon refused to grant a license to the Portland General Electric Company to build a dam at Pelton on the Deschutes River. PGE subsequently appealed and the supreme court ruled in favor of the PGE, maintaining its right to grant a license because both ends of the dam as proposed would rest on federal lands. Other resolutions will call for

early building of the John Day Dam on the Columbia River and for more adequate appropriations to the U. S. Forest Service for recreation and wildlife.

The convention will conclude on Sunday with reports of the various committees and a luncheon honoring chapter officers. Karl Onthank of Eugene, president of the Federation of Western Outdoor Clubs, will give an address, "Recreation, Oregon's Number One Industry by 1965?" at noon on Saturday.

Also featured on Saturday will be a panel discussion of "Livestock, Wildlife, or Both?" Featured will be John Withers, president, Oregon Wool Growers Assn.; John McKean, Oregon Game Commission; Garland Meador, president, Oregon Cattlemen's Assn.; Donald Robins, Burns IWLA; Dr. Walter O. Hanson, U. S. Forest Service; and Cecil Sly, Prineville IWLA president.

Pilot Denies Engine Failed

SEATTLE (AP) — A pilot who survived the crash of a chartered airplane here Nov. 18 said Wednesday that engine difficulties the plane had at Billings, Mont., five days earlier had no bearing on the Seattle accident.

William J. McDougall, 40, Miami, Fla., pilot of the ill-fated Peninsular Air Transport Co. DC4, said in an interview:

"I did not have engine failure at Billings. And it was not engine failure that made us crash; it was propeller failure."

Twenty-seven of the 74 aboard were killed outright. A 28th victim, Cpl. John S. Thomas, 19, of Philadelphia, died Wednesday of third degree burns.

McDougall commented on a Civil Aeronautics Board report the same DC4 had engine trouble at Billings during a stopover on a flight to McChord Air Force Base, Wash., with 58 soldiers.

The pilot said in that flight the starting mechanism on the No. 4 engine broke after the plane had landed at Billings for a refueling stop. He made an "air start" by windmilling the propeller aloft,

Dye Scores Dystrophy Fund Campaign

Rex Dye, executive secretary of the Klamath County United Fund, Wednesday expressed his discouragement of fund collection initiated this week in Klamath Falls by the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

Dye said he did not question the worthiness of the cause, but he felt the method of collection is against the wishes of Klamath County residents who three years ago voted for a United Fund.

Dye said the containers placed in Klamath Falls business houses came as a "complete surprise" to the fund board. He explained that the fund and its local budget committee maintains an open door policy which welcomes the application of any worthy local or national drive desiring to be included in United Fund. This year several national organizations applied and were given consideration in budget hearings.

"The United Fund," Dye said, "does not attempt to control such drives . . . that authority rests with the city governing body; however, the Klamath County United Fund Constitution does state that the organization shall investigate any such drives and advise the general public of their findings."

"The public," he continued, "should be aware of United Fund policy since it is an expression of the wishes of the public voiced at several public hearings . . . that one United Drive be held annually for health, youth and welfare organizations."

Dye added that to the United Fund Board's knowledge, there is no local muscular dystrophy group with a voice in the handling of funds collected.

The greatest strength in a united effort such as our United Fund is the fact that all participating agencies, work, worthiness, and budgets are completely examined and passed on by a group of local volunteer people. This is Klamath County's best protection against unsound organizations taking money from our area.

The containers were distributed in Klamath Falls business houses by city firemen in keeping with

action by firemen all over the nation, according to Fire Chief Roy Rowe.

Dye commented that he has noticed from the Portland papers that the citizens in that area are also taking issue with muscular dystrophy's action. It appears that for two consecutive years the Portland United Fund has extended an invitation to this association, and the group has not accepted this invitation to become a part of their United Fund.

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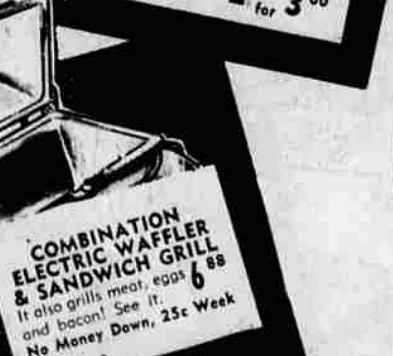
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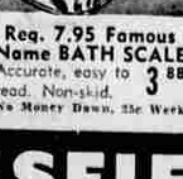
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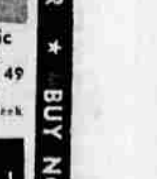
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
