

# Grange Delegates Accuse Government Of Bad Policy

CLEVELAND (AP)—While a farm emergency exists at home, the government is blocking competitive sale of surplus crops overseas by encouraging old customers to raise their own farm products, the nation's oldest farm organization charged today.

Such government practices are "second-class citizens" out of the little and middle-sized American farmers, whose income has dropped to prewar levels, it was stated in a report adopted last night by delegates to the national Grange convention.

The Grange has a membership of 850,000 in 37 states. Its 89th annual convention closes today.

"American agriculture is in a state of emergency," the report said. It added:

"Neither 90 per cent, nor 75 per cent, nor 60 per cent price support levels provide any assurance against the buildup of surplus stocks of major export crops as long as government policies block the competitive sale of those crops on the world market.

"As one branch of the government is sponsoring lower price supports and advocating curtailment of production, another branch of the government is restricting foreign sales and endorsing huge expenditures to expand the agricultural output of foreign nations that once were our customers.

"Those foreign nations are now competing with us and underselling us."

Delegates were told that 9 per cent of the nation's farmers produce 81 per cent of farm commodities that move commercially.

Some 1 1/2 million farmers earn less than \$1,000 a year, while on a somewhat higher scale are 3,300,000 family farmers.

The report said their incomes have been sliding down in order to foster agriculture in other countries, at the same time that the nation's wages, corporation earnings, retailing, processing, communications companies and other parts of the economy are experiencing record prosperity.

Congress and the administration were urged to provide for export sales at competitive prices; to recoup a fair share of world markets, to establish stronger soil conservation measures, to set up commodity-by-commodity programs to match production with demands, and to adjust trade programs.

Other recommendations included selling surpluses abroad on an installment plan and swapping them for strategic raw materials, and building research programs to find markets for farm products in industry.

Approved by the Grange were resolutions favoring social security for farms, expansion of federal highway programs, catastrophe insurance with government backing; a strong United Nations, uniform traffic laws in all states, and gradual reduction of armaments.

The Grangers voted disapproval of any threat to abolish the rural electrification administration and frowned on toll television, a federal sales tax, socialized medicine, the serving of liquor on airplanes, daylight saving time and peacetime military training.

# Traffic Accidents Claim 121 During Thanksgiving Day

Americans around the world celebrated a thankful and peaceful Thanksgiving Day.

They concentrated on holiday meals, content with a nation at peace. The weather, cold but clear, cooperated in most areas.

Traffic accidents, one week to the day before the nation's S-D day, marred the celebration in many areas.

A United Press survey showed that holiday traffic accidents killed 121 persons. Nine others died in fires and 15 in miscellaneous mishaps for a total of 145.

In Michigan, which led all states with 20 traffic deaths, five persons died in one two-car crash and four in another. At Mesquite, Tex., a 15-year-old boy was killed when a piano he was helping to move fell on him.

President Eisenhower set the theme for the nation's observance. He spent a quiet day at his Gettysburg, Pa., farm home, concentrating on his three grandchildren. He carved a 40-pound turkey.

U. S. troops around the world may not have had the children,

but they had the food. Turkey with all the trimmings was the menu.

In Korea, some 50,000 GI's spent a happy if homesick day just outside the Bamboo Curtain. Only a handful of troops had to eat in the bunkers.

President Syngman Rhee of Korea told U. S. servicemen "the people of Korea thank you for your sacrifices."

At Columbus, Miss., V. F. King, had something special to be thankful for — his life. Police said King was "sitting on the tracks" when he bumped off a freight train. He was not hurt seriously.

Firemen at Engine Co. 120 at Chicago also had food trouble. While answering an alarm, they discovered someone had stolen most of their holiday turkey.

At Anderson, Ind., the Ridley Carmacks gave thanks that their 50-year-old "lovers' spat" was over. The couple was married Wednesday.

The Benjamin Hartleys, both 96, celebrated their 80th wedding anniversary at Bagle, Idaho. They are believed to be the nation's longest-married couple.

# Soviets Claim Spy Captured

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet State Security Committee announced today a Russian allegedly trained as a spy in West Germany had surrendered under the amnesty act and was sentenced to five years in exile.

The government newspaper Izvestia identified the man as Adam Medvedevich Novikov, 30. It said he was taken in Germany by the Nazis to work in 1942, came under the influence of anti-Soviet propaganda and refused to return to the Soviet Union after the war.

Izvestia said he was sent to Morocco as a displaced person and was drawn into an anti-Soviet organization which turned him over to a foreign intelligence service in West Germany. After taking espionage training, the account continued, he was dropped by parachute into White Russia.

The newspaper said Novikov surrendered under the amnesty act of Sept. 17 and turned over radio equipment, weapons and false documents he had been given by the intelligence service.

The intelligence service was not identified nor was Novikov's place of exile specified.
