# City Slum Areas May Lead To Bankruptcy, Cole Says

MIAMI, Fla. (UP) — Federal housing chief Albert M. Cole warned today that American cities face bankruptcy in 1965 unless they move quickly to wipe out slums and rundown areas. Cole said the rapid increase in population and new families expected after 1960 will create greater demands on municipal tax resources. These additional demands "will become insupportable if the present heavy costs of slums, blight and obsolescence are allowed to go on," he said. Cole pointed out that the population probably will jump to more than 190 million by 1965, almost all the increase being registered in urban areas. Cole said the problem of "urban renewal can be successfully accomplished only on an area-wide basis."

# Truman Quips In California

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — Former President Harry S. Truman says one of the most important jobs of an American president is to "keep the peace of the world" and that people of this nation should "pray for peace" in the atomic age. "Atomic warfare can wipe out the civilization of the world," he said last night in addressing an audience of 740 who paid \$100 each for a dinner to raise funds for the Truman library being constructed at Independence, Mo. "Pray for the peace of the world," he said. "We can't afford to have another war in this age. There wouldn't be any civilization left." Any future atomic war will not be fought in trenches but behind the lines, he said. He warned against public hysteria. He said there have been eras of hysteria in the nation, mentioning anti-Masonic, anti-Catholic and Ku Klux Klan movements. "Just recently we had fits over Communism," he said. "But there are not enough Communists in the United States to put in your eye." He was applauded frequently by the audience of Democrats and Republicans. Although he had discussed political matters at a press conference earlier in the day, his dinner speech was mainly nonpolitical. He raised peals of laughter when he commented: "I'm not a lawyer, I'm a politician and I'm proud of it, and expect to be one until I die." And another quip: "I consider a statesman a dead politician."

# GSA Plans Extensive Real Estate Selling Campaign

With surplus real estate valued at over \$35,000,000 available for disposal in the Northwest and Alaska, the Federal Government's General Services Administration plans to bring these properties to the attention of as many prospective buyers as possible. To help obtain the best possible bids on its surplus real estate, GSA's Regional Director, O. C. Braden, today announced that an aggressive selling campaign will be undertaken with the assistance of the Seattle Advertising firm of Frederick E. Baker & Associates. Region 10 of General Services Administration includes the states of Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, and the Territory of Alaska. Surplus government real estate embraces all types of property, including valuable industrial and commercial sites, shipyards, farms, residences, airports, army installations and others. A recent unique sale by GSA was a jail house in Anchorage, Alaska. A lighthouse will be included in the sale of a Puget Sound property to be offered in the near future. The "for sale" sign also is being posted on three forts. Representatives of the advertising agency declare that its preliminary studies indicate that many of the surplus properties are potential industrial sites. These locations will be brought to the attention of industries seeking to locate in the region. Chambers of commerce, industrial commissions and other community organizations interested will be alerted to the properties to be sold in their areas. C. E. O'Connell, Chief of GSA's Real Property Disposal Division declared: "Sale of our surplus property for the highest possible price will not only mean a better sale for the government but will help promote the economy of the area in which the property is located." In encouraging widest participation in bidding on government surplus real estate, the ease of submitting bids under new simplified procedures is stressed. Persons who wish to be advised of sales of government surplus real estate are urged to write: General Services Administration, Federal Office Building, 902 First Avenue, Seattle 4, Washington. The type of property and area in which interested should be indicated.

# Farm Real Estate Said 'Paradox'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Agriculture Department said Tuesday the farm financial situation reflects a paradox of declining prices and income on the one hand and increasing agricultural assets on the other. A report prepared for the department's 33rd annual farm outlook conference said farm income has dropped about 10 per cent this year. A further decline is forecast for 1956. Yet, the report said, the value of the farm real estate—the major agricultural asset—increased 3 per cent during the first half of the year. Frederick V. Waugh, director of the department's Economics Division, said this increase in farm land values obviously reflected farm "optimism" in the longer-term outlook for agriculture. The conference, being attended by nearly 400 extension service economists from the various states and by department officials, is discussing economic trends in agriculture. At Monday's opening meeting, Waugh said he believed farm income would dip further in 1956. He said he doubted any changes Congress might make in federal farm aid programs would affect farm income "very decisively" next year. In discussing the upturn in farm land values despite reduced farm prices and income, the department report said a desire on the part of farmers to enlarge their acreage was one factor in what it called "this unusual farm real estate situation."

# Winnie To See 81st Birthday

LONDON (AP) — Sir Winston Churchill observes his 81st birthday tomorrow. In the seven months since he bowed to age and resigned as prime minister, Churchill has made only one appearance in the House of Commons, where he spent more than half a century. That was to be sworn in after the 1951 election as a Conservative backbencher—an ordinary member of Parliament. But outside the glare of world attention, the veteran statesman has kept busy. He spent two months this fall vacationing on the French Riviera. Much of his time there was devoted to writing and painting. "Now in the peaceful solitude of his country home, Churchill dictates and polishes a few more pages of his book on the history of the English-speaking people. It is scheduled to be published next year. If the whim strikes, he settles down before an easel to put a few more touches of bold color on a canvas. Dressed in a floppy hat and the stony suit he made famous, he walks along the paths of his estate in Kent with Rufus, his poodle, dancing excitedly at his side. Since retiring, Churchill — "I am a friend of animals" — has expanded his interest in race horses by buying a stud farm. To him his mares, stallions and foals are "mother horses, father horses and baby horses." Among his rare public appearances now are those at the race-track. Churchill is said to keep in close touch with current events, but his mood seems to be that of a man who feels he has a right to relax and in a detached sort of way watch history unfold. He gives the impression of deliberately trying to avoid any appearance of having a say in state policy—a right that might normally fall to him as a respected elder statesman.

# Growers To Seek Damage Relief

PORTLAND (AP) — Oregon growers of truck, nursery and fruit crops are considering applying for federal disaster loans as a result of damage suffered in the November freeze. Officials of the Farm Home Administration said Monday they already had held preliminary discussions with some grower groups. If the region is designated a disaster area, growers would be able to obtain one-year government emergency loans at 3 per cent interest to cover next year's operating costs. Meanwhile, a spokesman for the Northwest Nurseries Assn., reported that freeze damage to walnuts was not as heavy as expected.

# Autopsy Planned In Gas Fatality

PORTLAND (AP) — The body of Mathilda Schweiger, 61, was found beside the stove in her gas-filled kitchen Monday. Deputy Coroner Ross Howard said the flame on the gas burner had apparently been extinguished by a tea kettle that boiled over. Death probably occurred Saturday or Sunday, Howard said. An autopsy is planned.
