Groundwork Laid By GOP

CHICAGO (AP) — Groundwork for the 1956 GOP convention and a round of speeches by Eisenhower administration officials were program items at the Republican National Committee opened a two-day session today.

Chairman Leonard W. Hall said in a statement outlining the schedule that the theme of the meeting was "the solid accomplishments of peace and prosperity" by Republicans.

Hall brought a personal message from President Eisenhower for delivery to the national committee at its full-session tomorrow morning.

Although a series of pep talks are scheduled, starting with an address by United States Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., tonight at the chairman's dinner, political talk on a scale that marked the Democratic National Committee meeting less than two weeks ago was not expected.

A majority of committee members want President Eisenhower to run again. They were cheered by Hall's report after a 45-minute visit with the chief executive at Gettysburg, Pa., Monday that he believes Eisenhower will seek a second term "if he feels he is able." Hall's report was coupled with a glowing picture of the President's recovery from his heart seizure.

The national committee was expected to approve a convention call allotting delegate quotas to each state. A preliminary, unofficial computation prepared last March indicated that the 1956 convention at San Francisco will be made up of about 1,300 delegates, 94 more than in 1952.

Employer committees of the Pine Industrial Relations Committee, Inc. and representatives of the Willamette Valley, Central Oregon, and Northern California district councils, AFL met in an informal session in Klamath Falls today.

The meeting was informative and exploratory as to a plan of mutual consent approach to future wage problems.

C. L. Irving and Early Hartley, spokesman for employers and unions, respectively, said "the approach deserves thorough study."

Another session has been arranged for December 8 in Klamath Falls, Irving said employers who had their own meetings in advance of the joint conference had also scheduled another meeting for December 7, also in Klamath Falls.

In addition to Hartley, J. B. Bingham, Redding, California and M. E. Salo, Bend and Ted Fruin, Eugene, represented the district councils of the sawmill union.

National Safety Council Lists 10-Month Fatalities

CHICAGO (AP) — Nearly 31,000 Americans were killed on highways in the first 10 months of this year—a 7 per cent increase over the same period in 1954.

The National Safety Council hopes the high traffic death toll will drive home to all motorists the necessity of driving carefully tomorrow, Safe Driving Day, and every day.

The council released its tabulation of traffic deaths for October and the first 10 months of 1955 today to underscore the need for S-D Day, a 24-hour period sponsored by President Eisenhower's Committee for Traffic Safety when Americans are asked to make an extra effort to drive and walk safely.

Tomorrow's event will be the second observance of S-D Day. Traffic experts figured the first S-D Day, last Dec. 15, cut down accidents somewhat. Fifty-one persons were fatally injured on the highways that day.

The safety council issued these figures on the eve of S-D Day: From Jan. 1 through Oct. 31, 1955, 30,980 persons were killed in traffic accidents. This is an average of 101 deaths a day. But since it includes persons killed on holidays, when more motorists are on the highways, and those who die from injuries after accidents, a count on any one day like tomorrow probably would not approach that 101 figure.

The traffic death toll for October was 3,920—up 12 per cent over October 1954 and the largest toll for any one month since the record high month of December 1941.

Ned H. Dearborn, safety council president, connected these figures with the necessity for S-D Day. "If anyone thinks S-D Day is just a lot of shouting about nothing, stop and think about these figures," he said. "S-D Day is a one-day effort to wake people up. The auto is here to stay, but I have my doubts about a lot of drivers if they keep up this flagrant lack of responsibility on the highways."

SUDAN AGREEMENT

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — A British Embassy spokesman confirmed Wednesday Egypt and Britain have reached agreement on preliminary steps for Sudan self-determination. He said only legal technicalities are to be worked out by the experts and a formal agreement is expected to be signed in Cairo within 48 hours.

INVITATION

KARACHI, Pakistan (AP) — Pakistan Prime Minister Mohammad Ali has accepted an invitation from Chinese Premier Chou En-lai to visit Red China sometime in April. It was announced Wednesday.

The council said there was slight consolation in the fact that travel is increasing even more than deaths. Deaths per 100 million miles of travel dropped to six for the first nine months of the year, a new low.

Tomorrow police departments and civic organizations across the country will make a special effort to hold down the number of traffic accidents in their communities. Banners urging motorists to drive carefully already are hanging across many streets.

The Associated Press will tabulate traffic deaths in every state.

An AP spot survey on Thursday, Nov. 17, showed 68 traffic fatalities. The three leading cities in each population group at the end of the first ten months of 1955, ranked according to the number of traffic

deaths per 10,000 registered vehicles, included: 500,000 to 750,000 — Seattle, 1.9; Dallas, and Minneapolis, 1.8 each; 350,000 to 500,000 — Portland, Ore., Kansas City, Mo., and Indianapolis, Ind., 2.0 each.

10,000 to 25,000 — Klamath Falls, Ore., Kingsport, Tenn., and Napa, Calif., 9.0 each.

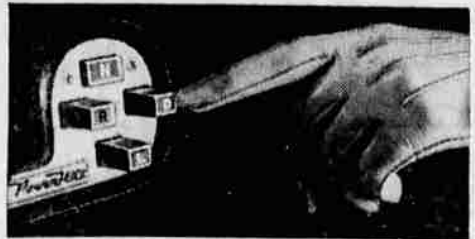
