

Stevenson Seen To Enter Florida Primary In May

WASHINGTON (AP) — Adlai E. Stevenson's warm reception in Florida, heightened expectations today he may test his Southern strength in that state's May 29 presidential delegate primary.

Stevenson, only announced candidate thus far for the 1956 Demo-

cratic presidential nomination, is expected to be joined in Florida by most of his campaign aides for what may be an early decision on whether to bid for the state's 28 nominating votes.

Stevenson lost the state to President Eisenhower by nearly 100,000 votes in the 1952 general election. He did not participate in the primary that year.

If he runs there in next year's primary, he may face a direct challenge from Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee.

Kefauver is waiting until mid-December, after he has completed reports on juvenile delinquency and Dixon-Yates investigations, to make an expected announcement of his candidacy for the nomination.

Kefauver was lipped in Florida's preferential primary in 1952 by Sen. Russell (D-Ga.) but still got

5 of the 24 votes then allotted to the state. A new primary law provides for direct election of delegates but eliminates the separate preference vote.

Unless there are unexpected developments, Kefauver's entry would about complete the Democratic field for the primaries, with

the exception of "favorite son" candidates.

Chief of these is Gov. Averell Harriman of New York, who says he is available but won't fight for the nomination.

Stevenson has said he will enter the March 20 Minnesota primary and there were signs yesterday

that the campaign was getting under way there.

The Democratic presidential aspirant turned down an offer by Harold E. Stassen, former Minnesota governor and now President Eisenhower's disarmament adviser, for a debate on the farm

issue.

Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.) immediately jumped into the fray with an offer to take on Stassen, adding that he would "rent the hall."

Meanwhile, Gov. G. Menpen

Williams of Michigan kept up a running fire of criticism of Stevenson's statement in a Nov. 19 speech that "it is time for catching our breath . . . Moderation is the spirit of the times."

In reply to Stevenson's suggestion that maybe he hadn't even read the speech, Williams said he certainly had and differed with Stevenson on "specific programs and policies." He said, however, he has "no personal differences" with Stevenson.

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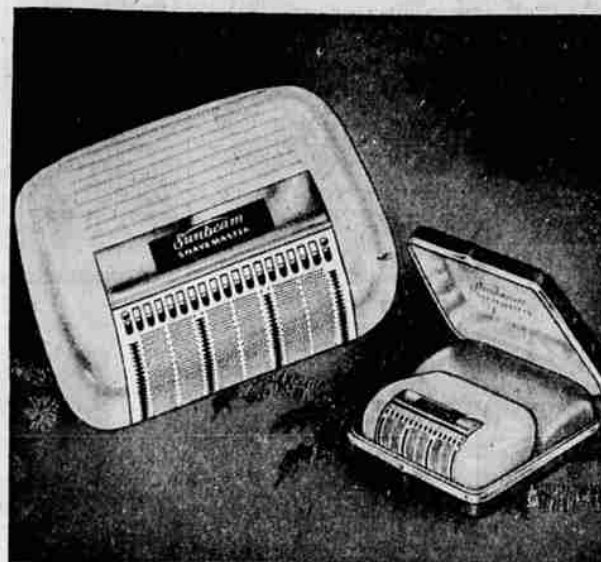
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
