

### Hollywood's Gayest Siren Turns Serious For New Role

HOLLYWOOD (UP)—A day of reckoning arrives now and then in Hollywood, and today it's Rita Moreno's. The town's gayest bachelor girl has snared her first big dramatic role so she's sworn off men and is settling down.

Until now the fiery Puerto Rican was a regular item in the gossip columns. But today she's hard at work in her first "non-pepper pot, serious role" as the beautiful Typhoon in the movie version of "The King and I."

This big break in one of the top musicals of 1956 caused Rita to turn in her mamba dresses and officially resign from the night life circuit.

"I'm so fed up with wrestling with wolves," sighed the tiny brunette. "At this stage of the game I want to work like a beast. I'm tired of going out with new guys. You have to go through the same routine every time."

### Retail Car Dealers Complain Of Pressures In Auto Probe

 WASHINGTON (UP)—Spokesmen for the nation's 40,000 retail car dealers, complaining of "pressures," today renewed their plea

for a freer hand in dealing with auto manufacturers.

A score of dealers, members of the National Automobile Dealers Assn. (NADA), were invited to return for further testimony before a Senate Antitrust and Monopoly subcommittee.

Frederick J. Bell, NADA president, contended yesterday that what he called "one-sided" contracts deny dealers rights as "independent businessmen" and give

the Detroit auto executives virtual control over the investment of every dollar.

The subcommittee is engaged in what Sen. O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.) terms a study of the economic influence that huge General Motors Corp. exercises in the auto industry.

Bell said GM profits annually range from 15 to 20 per cent while the retail dealer average slumped from a peak of 6 per cent in 1954 to less than 1 per cent last year.

### George Doubts Policy Accord

WASHINGTON (UP)—Sen. George (D-Ga.) said today he doubts any effective agreement can be made between Republicans and Democrats to block off 1956 campaign discussion of critical foreign policy issues.

"I don't think you can keep people from talking," he said. "You can't keep any candidate from expressing his opinion. I doubt that it would be practical to try to declare any phase of foreign policy off bounds in the campaign."

Secretary of State Dulles told a news conference yesterday he does not exclude the possibility of a later agreement between the two major parties — similar to informal understandings he said had worked very well in 1944 and 1948 — to keep out of the campaign vital issues bearing on security.

But he said any such agreement would be difficult before the Democratic presidential nominee is selected next August.

**Reds Active In Argentine**

BUENOS AIRES (UP)—Argentina's Communists are stirring into renewed activity, but the government vows they don't have a chance to subvert this nation in the wake of Juan Peron's dictatorship.

"The United States may rest assured communism will not be a problem," says Carlos Muniz, undersecretary of interior.

During his decade of rule Peron kept all opposition under tight control. His police jailed Communists. But the Communists survived. Although in last year's congressional elections they claimed only 101,726 votes, that represented a 42 per cent increase over their claims for the 1951 elections.

Powerful democratic forces are at work in Argentina today, Muniz says the best assurance that communism hasn't a chance is the type of men now running Argentina's government. He says Provisional President Pedro Eugenio Aramburu and his collaborators are prepared to act swiftly and decisively against "extremist" threats from either left or right.
