AP Announces 1955 All-America Football Squad; Witte On 3rd Team

NEW YORK (AP)—Ohio State's Howard (Hopalong) Cassidy heads one of the most versatile backfields ever selected on the Associated Press 1955 All-America football team announced today.

Cassidy, a holdover choice along with Navy end Ron Beagle, is joined by Earl Morrall of Michigan State, Jim Swink of Texas Christian and Tommy McDonald of Oklahoma in the backfield. The Buckeyes gave their second straight Big Ten championship to Cassidy, winner of the Heisman Memorial Trophy, who was the clutch runner of the year despite the special defenses set for him each week. He also can pass.

Morrall, the nation's leading punter, ran the Spartans' intricate multiple offense with rare genius. He was equally proficient as a runner, passer, blocker and was terrific on defense.

McDonald, who with Swink gives the team two junior backs, is the breakaway runner who made the national champion Sooners an awesome ground power.

OBSCURITY
Swink was the most exciting runner of the campaign, springing from virtual obscurity into the role of the top scorer (125 points) and most dramatic distance gainer.

The remainder of the team lists Howard Schnellenberger of Kentucky at end with Beagle, Frank D'Agostino of Auburn and Paul Wiggin of Stanford at tackles, Jim Brown of UCLA and Pasquale (Pat) Bisceglia of Notre Dame at guards and Maryland's Bob Pellegrini at center.

The team, selected on the recommendations of AP regional boards on the basis of the full season, avoids preseason ballyhoo and high pressure publicity campaigns.

For that reason, players like Michigan end Ron Kramer, UCLA guard Hardiman Cureton, Notre Dame quarterback Paul Hornung, Auburn fullback Joe Childress and Mississippi State halfback Art Davis did not make the grade.

That's not a reflection on the future potential of these fine players, but an honest appraisal of comparative performances in the 1955 college season.

Veteran football observers tabbed Brown, a tremendous lineman, not only superior to Cureton but also the key to Rose Bowl-bound UCLA's fine season. On defense, he had no peers.

CONTRIBUTION
Bisceglia got the nod over Iowa's great Calvin Jones for the other guard position because of the amazing contribution the 25-year-old Navy veteran made to Irish success. It took a major effort to fashion a new forward wall this year for Notre Dame and the foundation was built on Bisceglia—defensive quarterback, right side linebacker and running guard on offense.

Pellegrini made the play of the year in the Terps' 7-0 triumph over UCLA. As Bruin fullback Doug Peters got to the Maryland goal line, Pellegrini wrenched the ball from him and recovered to start his team toward victory.

D'Agostino did a similar fine defensive job for Auburn as the main cog in a big, tough line. Wiggin was the one man who really held Cassidy in check as a runner this year.

Schnellenberger was an outstanding pass receiver and fine defender who always gave his best. He caught 20 passes for 287 yards and six touchdowns during the season. An exceptional blocker and crashing defender, Beagle grabbed 30 passes for an academy mark to account for 481 yards and four touchdowns.

The second team is composed of John Paluck, Pittsburgh, and Tom Maentz, Michigan, ends; Calvin Jones, Iowa and Bruce Bosley, West Virginia, tackles; Bo Bolinger, Oklahoma, and Scott Suber, Mississippi State, guards; Hugh Pitts, Texas Christian, center; and Bob Davenport, UCLA, Jon Arnett, Southern Cal, Gary Glick, Colorado A&M, and Don Schaefer, Notre Dame, backs.

Cassady Selected Top Back

NEW YORK (UP)—Howard (Hopalong) Cassidy, two-time All-America halfback who has been called "the best ever" by his coach, Woody Hayes of Ohio State, today was named college football's Back of the Year by the United Press.

The 172-pound Cassidy, who "runs, blocks, defends and thinks with the best," according to Hayes, received the most votes in the balloting for the annual All-America team this year and picked up 155 votes out of a possible 306 cast in the back of the year balloting. In addition, he also was chosen this week to receive the Heisman and Maxwell awards as the "Outstanding College Football Player" of 1955.

"You can compare this kid to the greatest ever and you wouldn't be over-estimating," Hayes said at a luncheon this week. "He's a great blocker, too, and on defense you just don't throw the ball unless you want him to intercept it."

Cassidy's nearest rival for Back of the Year honors was All-America halfback Jim Swink of Texas Christian University with 65 votes, while Notre Dame quarterback Paul Hornung was third with 19.

Earl Morrall, Michigan State quarterback, finished fourth in the balloting by sports writers and broadcasters with 16. Halfback Tom McDonald of unbeaten-united Oklahoma and quarterback George Welsh of Navy were tied for fifth with 12 votes each. Halfback Jon Arnett, All-America from Southern California, received 11 votes and halfback Ed Vereb of unbeaten-united Maryland drew six.

The 21-year-old Cassidy ended his collegiate career against Michigan at Ann Arbor, Mich., Nov. 19. In that game, he picked up 146 yards on 28 tries, scored his team's first touchdown and led Ohio State to a 17-0 triumph. In all, the brilliant, all-around star, who has been drafted by the Detroit Lions of the National Football League, scored 90 points this past season on 15 touchdowns.

Since then, 22-year-old Logart drawing one.

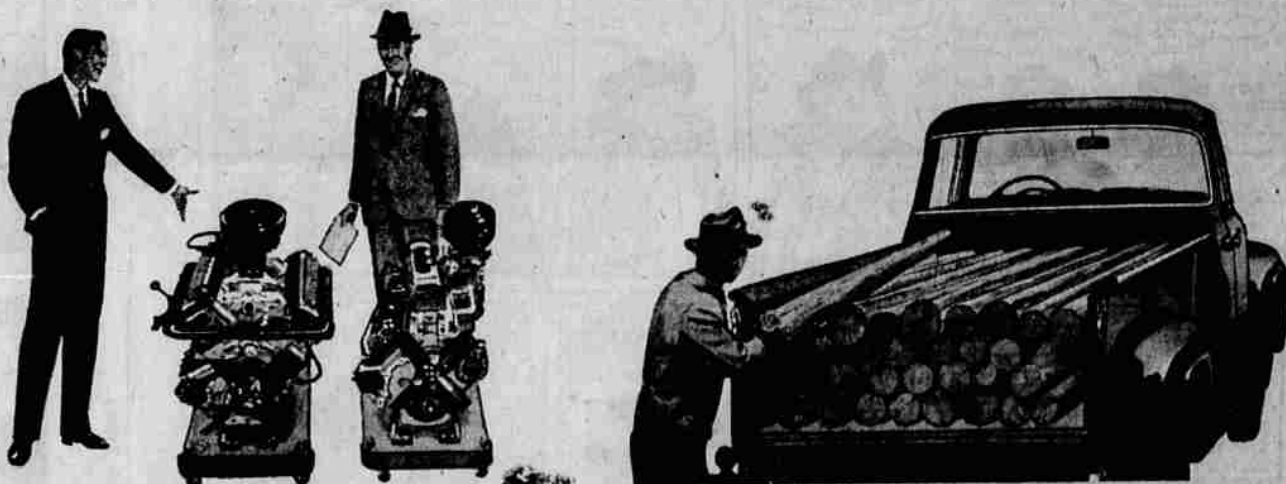

Four Dropped In Retriever Trial Action

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)—Thirty-two dogs from a starting field of 36 remained in competition Friday as the national championship stakes for retrievers went into its second day.

Early morning rain turned the fields to mud Thursday and kept the number of tests to two instead of the usual three.

Field trial chairman Herbert E. Fleishacker Jr. said the dogs will work over water Friday retrieving ducks. He said the eliminations are expected to increase sharply, particularly if a promise of fair weather holds true. The trials continue through Sunday.

The dogs eliminated Thursday were Butch's Bitterroot Smokey, owned by Joe Alberison of Boise, Idaho, and Manzanita Nimbus, owned by Edward R. Spaulding of Santa Barbara, Calif.

An estimated 1,000 persons are attending the trials which are sponsored by the National Retriever Field Trial Club.
