Typhoon Warnings Posted On Iwo Jima

TOKYO (AP) — Typhoon warnings were posted on Iwo Jima Friday night and the tiny American island braced for winds of at least 65 m.p.h. Pierce gales extended 250 miles in each direction from the center of Typhoon Patsy. The U.S. Air Force said the storm center, with winds up to 140 m.p.h., should pass 70 miles northwest of Iwo at midnight.
