

Forty-Three Acts Scheduled For Annual DAY Talent Fete

Forty-three acts, comprising every known form of the theater arts, have been accepted as entrants in the Disabled American Veterans Fifth Annual Talent Contest to be held Saturday evening at the Mills School auditorium.

The acts include dancers, musicians, singers, acrobatic numbers and instrumentalists, along with a variety of specialty acts which will appear at intermission.

GOP Leaders Map Campaign

CHICAGO (U)—Republican leaders are mapping a vigorous 1956 campaign for every precinct in the nation, buoyed by President Eisenhower's promise to do "everything in my power" to help.

Some GOP leaders think the President's assurances mean he will decide to run again.

Others believe he is determined to take as active a part as his health will permit.

New speculation arose over the President's 1956 role yesterday when he sent a message to a Chicago meeting of the Republican National Committee, saying:

"You have a splendid record to submit to the voters in 1956. I personally am proud of Republican achievements for the peace and the prosperity and the security of the American people. I shall do everything in my power next year to help you report the record accurately and fully to the country."

Members jumped to their feet with applause and cheers when Chairman Leonard W. Hall read the message.

Hall told the committee that the President "says he will lead."

He said later there is not "the slightest doubt in my mind" but that the President intends to take the most active part he can in the campaign.

Morton H. Hollingsworth, Illinois state chairman, and Harry Darby, committeeman from Kansas, said they think the President will campaign for his reelection.

Chessman Gets 'Row' Freedom

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Carol Chessman, convicted kidnaper-robber, turned author, will leave San Francisco for the first time in seven years next Thursday.

On Dec. 8, Chessman will appear before U.S. District Judge Louis E. Goodman to hear a date set for a rehearing of his case.

The U.S. Supreme Court on Oct. 17 ordered the rehearing. As a result, Goodman signed a writ of habeas corpus yesterday.

Last January, Goodman had rejected a petition from Chessman for such a writ. Chessman then carried his appeal to the Supreme Court, which ruled it contained enough merit to warrant a rehearing.

The basic question on which the high court ordered the rehearing concerned Chessman's argument that the transcript of his 1948 trial in Los Angeles was faulty prepared. He claimed it was based on notes made by the court reporter who died before they could be transcribed.

Goodman also issued a stay of execution yesterday after Chessman's attorney, George T. Davis, said Superior Judge Charles W. Fricke of Los Angeles could legally set another execution date. Fricke was the trial judge who originally sentenced Chessman to death.

Weed Court Reaps Violators Harvest

WEED—Seventy-eight traffic violations appeared on the police blotter for the month of November. In addition, there were three felony and 27 misdemeanor arrests. Seven vehicle accidents were investigated and 13 warning citations given. The department answered 384 calls during the month and the patrol car traveled a total of 3,940 miles.

The felony arrests included one for theft of an automobile and two for suspicion of burglary.

According to a spokesman for the motel, the guests losing the property were Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Summers of Martinez, California.

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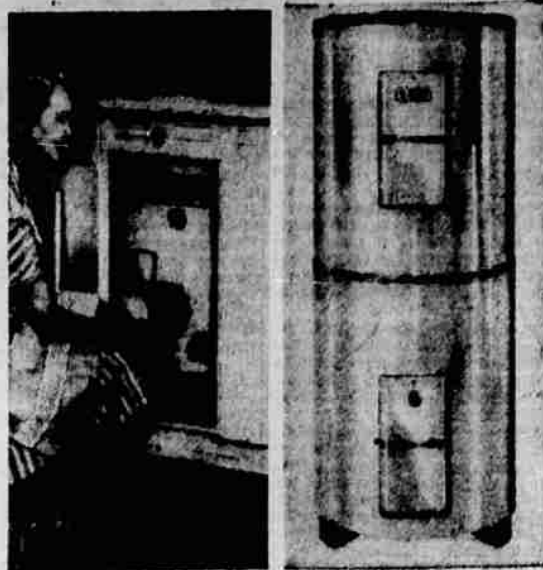
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Greenbackers Name Proehl

EDMONDS, Wash. (U)—The mantle of presidential nominee rested easily today on the unassuming shoulders of a country grocer. He tried it on in 1952 with the same results he expects next year.

Actually, Fred C. Proehl (pronounced Prayle) is more concerned with what he considers the sad state of this nation's monetary affairs than he is about being a serious presidential threat.

The 75-year-old nominee of the Greenback party was tapped for the honor without flurry or fuss. He was named in a quiet mail referendum conducted by the party and announced by John Zahnd, party chairman, at Indianapolis.

"We want to issue money to pay

for the services of government," he explains. "The amount to be issued should be limited to what actually is needed. If money gets too cheap, we would stop printing it."

He doesn't like the practice of the Federal Reserve Bank issuing currency because, he says, the system is controlled by banks and it gives too much power and profit to a small group.

Do You Live In Dark Ages Of Hot Water For Homes?

If hot-water questions have been troubling you, it is certain you live in the dark ages of hot-water heaters.

New, modern, automatic hot-water heaters are made to be forgotten. Of course, you may prefer to make your own choices about the temperature of the water. If so, you can have a heater with a dial. Turn the dial and the heater will produce water at the temperature you have chosen. But the thought you spend on that choice has to do with the water you use, not the heater.

If you have a modern appliance, it will go on turning out hot water indefinitely. You need never give it a thought.

In the dark ages, the heater had to have a special location and special space often was set aside for it. Today, that little table in the corner or in a row of appliances in bathroom, kitchen or laundry may well turn out to be the hot-water heater. Counter-top models are available, which use either gas or electric heat.

But there are many other shapes and sizes. You can find one to fit almost any location you choose for it. Experts suggest you pick a spot near the point where most hot water is used in your house. You can avoid having to run the water which has cooled in connecting pipes.

In the dark ages, you hid the hot-water heater. You can hide your modern heater, too, if you like. It is automatic and will work

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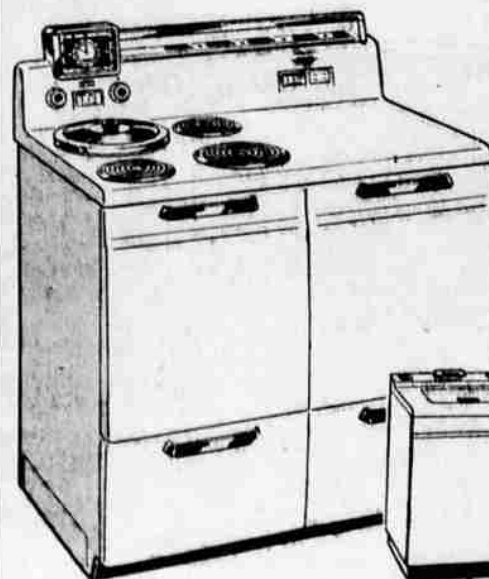
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
