Survey Cooperation Urged Of Hunters, Fishermen

All sportsmen of Oregon are urged by the game commission to cooperate with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in their nationwide economic survey of hunting and fishing.

On January 7 the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, using a national survey organization, the Crossley Surveys, Inc., will begin gathering statistics through personal interviews to measure on a nationwide basis hunting and fishing in terms of persons taking part and the time and money spent.

The survey will report on hunting and fishing during 1955 to determine the number of persons by age and sex who hunted and fished for sport, plus the amount of time and money spent on these sports by each hunter and fisherman.

Some of the questions that the survey is expected to answer include: What is the impact of hunting and fishing on the travel industry, service stations, restaurants, hotels, and retail stores? What will be the demand for various kinds of equipment? What are the chances for new jobs surrounding hunting and fishing? How much land and water will be needed for hunting and fishing?

Perhaps the most important question of all which the survey intends to answer is: How important to the national economy are hunting and fishing and how big a demand for them should we expect in the future?

Conservation departments, sportsmen's groups, segments of American business, and interested individuals have always maintained that the wildlife resources are of paramount importance to the nation's economy and welfare.

"Meat values alone," stated Phil Schneider, director, Oregon Game Commission, "show that during 1954 Oregon's wildlife resources provided more than \$9,000,000 worth of game birds, animals, and fish to the tables of Oregon citizens."

"And," Schneider continued, "this does not include the tremendous sums spent by sportsmen for guns, fishing tackle, equipment, and other expenditures in pursuit of these game birds, animals, and fish."

"The information gathered by the Crossley people will provide undisputed proof of just how important our wildlife resources are to the states and the nation," Schneider said. "It behooves all hunters and fishermen interviewed to cooperate wholeheartedly in the survey."

Oregon State Health Chief Urges Use Of Salk Vaccine

Dr. Seth M. Kerron, Klamath County health officer, received the following important message from the parents of Oregon from Dr. Harold M. Erickson, Oregon state health officer, regarding the use of Salk polio vaccine in the state. Dr. Erickson's statement follows:

"The prediction was made recently that 1955 would be the last polio epidemic year in Oregon's history, thanks to the very great success of the Salk vaccine this year. As you may know, not a single case of paralytic polio has occurred in an Oregon child this year who has received two or more shots of the vaccine."

"Despite this success, I must tell you frankly that we can no longer be overly optimistic about effecting marked reductions in Oregon's polio incidence next year. This is the situation today:

"1. Federal authorities have released about 130,000 shots of Salk vaccine for commercial distribution in Oregon. This can be obtained at nominal cost through any private physician in the state for any child up to the age of 15 or for any pregnant woman."

"2. At this moment about 25,000 shots of the vaccine are still on duggists' shelves, and another 50,000 shots have not even been ordered from the manufacturer."

"3. Because of this lack of interest by Oregon parents, the U.S. Public Health Service has requested that we release about 49,000 shots from our present allotments, and 10,000 shots from forthcoming allotments, so that children in other states may receive this protection."

"4. Because Salk vaccine can only be stored for a short time, we shall be forced to ship our supplies to these other areas unless Oregon parents respond within the next few days."

"5. Unless Oregon children can begin their shots soon, they may not be fully protected against polio by the peak of the 1956 season. About eight months are required to give all three shots in the manner recommended for maximum protection."

"The Salk vaccine program is purely voluntary. We are giving you these facts so that you may decide for yourself whether your child shall receive this protection. If you wish more information, or want your child to receive the vaccine, please call your private physician for an appointment at your earliest possible convenience."

'Two Blind Mice' Schedules Opening Here December 8

"Two Blind Mice," a play about two delightful old ladies who continue to run a governmental bureau in Washington four years after Congress abolished the organization, will open at the Oretch Theater on Thursday evening, December 8, as a presentation of the Oretch Players.

Roselle Wilkinson will portray the reporter's ex-wife whom he recaptures, and other roles will be acted by Earl Reynolds, Gerald Sievright, Lyle Whitsett, Frank Luquer, Muri Woods and Earl Mellen.

The Oretch Players production of "Two Blind Mice" has been staged by Betty Cole, and the setting, which represents what was once the drawing room of a George-town mansion, has been designed by the students.
