Oregon Political Activity Reported Light This Week

Oregon political activity in the week Nov. 27-Dec. 3 was light. Three Republican leaders—Wendell Wyatt, the state chairman; Jess Gard, national committee man; and Mrs. Marshall Cornett, Klamath Falls national committee woman—were at the Republican conference in Chicago. Wyatt returned optimistic that President Eisenhower would run again and so did Mrs. Cornett. Gard, who went East from the meeting, was not available for local comment.

Mrs. Cornett said there will be 111 admission tickets available for Oregon Republicans at the national convention in San Francisco—but fewer assistant sergeant-at-arms badges will be available.

The Oregon State Horticultural Society meeting at Corvallis took a stand on an issue that has been political as well as economic. It endorsed a sales tax to lessen the tax burden on real property.

Charles of "politics" were heard after the congressional timber hearing moved on. The same charges were being fired lightly

in advance of the Monday-Tuesday meeting in Portland of the House Water Resources subcommittee on the Hoover Report.

Joseph E. Harvey, Republican who lost his reelection bid to the state Legislature in 1954 after six consecutive terms there, said he was not going to try again next year. It's too costly, he said, adding many good legislators stay there only because they hope the people someday will increase the pay so the financial loss will be less severe. (There is a pay-doubling measure ready for the ballot next November.)

A debate at Willamette University between State Sen. John Merriam, Republican, and Howard Morgan, Democratic state chairman, produced no fireworks. Merriam supported the actions of the Republican majority in the last Legislature. Morgan did not.

Rep. Harris Ellsworth, first elected to the 78th Congress (the current one is the 84th), said at Roseburg he will seek reelection. Although it had been generally thought he would, this was his first formal statement of it.

Sen. Neuberger said in the course of the week that he had heard reports from postoffice workers they were on a speed-up system. He said he had asked for a report on that.

Sen. Morse, speaking at Pendleton to the Oregon Assn. of Soil Conservation districts, said the speed with which conservation farming is adopted will be an important factor in determining whether this country can produce enough food in future years for its growing population. "Our food surpluses should be treated as blessings," he said, and he spoke critically of the Republican attitude on soil conservation.

At the close of the week the executive committee of the Republican State Central Committee and the state College League Young Republicans were both meeting in Portland.

Guest conductor for the festival was W. H. Hannah, formerly supervisor of music at Vancouver High School and currently retired. Schools sending contingents to join KUHs were Lakeview, Alturas, Henley, Malin, and Tulelake. An honor chorus, comprised of 95 students from the six schools in unison, and a 112-member combined band, composed the musical program.

Guest performers for the program were Klamath Union High's orchestra, under the baton of Don McKenzie.

Andrew Loney Jr., director of music at Klamath Union High, supervised the festival.

Annual Band Festival Held

Two hundred students, selected for their prowess in various fields of music and representing six high schools, performed in Klamath Union High School's Pelican Court Saturday night. The performance which included choral numbers and band selections constituted this year's Southeastern Oregon and Northern California Band and Conference Festival.

Moore Plans For Grand Jury

SANTA CRUZ (UP)—Santa Cruz County Dist. Atty. Charles L. Moore today was studying the Grand Jury transcript of proceedings against him in preparation for a Superior Court appearance next Thursday.

Moore has been charged in a formal Grand Jury accusation of willful and corrupt misconduct in office, and faces another indictment in a jury trial before Superior Judge James Ateridge.

Judge Ateridge yesterday granted the 38-year-old district attorney a continuance until Thursday so that he and his attorney, Melvin Belli of San Francisco, could study the 167-page transcript.

The transcript, released to the press yesterday, showed Moore had apologized to the Grand Jury for a previous statement charging jury foreman Carlisle Hodgett and two jurors had "connections with vice" in the county.

Attorney Raps Water Policy

SACRAMENTO (UP)—A water attorney subpoenaed — and got — records on Pardee Dam that he said would show the East Bay Municipal Utility District stored Mokelumne River water to the "detrimment of downstream irrigators."

Gilbert L. Jones, attorney for the Woodbridge Irrigation District, said EBMUD stored water in Pardee Dam "ostensibly for municipal use." Then they would dump it down the river through power plants in the winter "to the detriment of irrigation," Jones said. Jones asked the records be subpoenaed would bear out his charge. He hastily pointed out a figure which indicated there was 183,000 acre feet of water in Pardee Dam at the end of September, about 85 per cent of capacity.

"They stored it this summer when we were crying for water," Jones said. During the winter season, when power is in greater demand, but the irrigators no longer need the water, EBMUD probably would dump it down the river, he said.

Jones' charge came during cross examination of Francis Blanchard, EBMUD planning manager.

EBMUD, the North San Joaquin Water Conservation District and Calaveras County Water District are competing for used water in the Mokelumne River.

Former Jap Boxer Killed By Car

SEATTLE (AP)—James Y. Sakamoto, 52, blind former boxer and founder of a Japanese-American newspaper, died Saturday after he was struck by an automobile.

Sakamoto was hit while crossing a street on his way to work at the St. Vincent de Paul Salvage Bureau. The driver of the car, Jay F. Robinson, 50, told police he did not see Sakamoto in the early morning darkness.

Once a promising featherweight boxer, Sakamoto was forced from the ring by blindness in the mid-1920s. In 1928 he founded the Japanese-American Courier here, an all-English language newspaper for American-born Japanese.

Sakamoto also helped organize the Japanese-American Citizens' League here in 1930. He was a star athlete in high school. Sakamoto's death raised to 77 the King County toll of traffic deaths for this year and to 28 the number killed in Seattle.

LEUKEMIA
TOKYO (AP)—A 50-year-old farmer, who was a mile away from downtown Hiroshima when the atom bomb fell on that city 10 years ago, died today of leukemia of the bone marrow.

Japanese press reports claimed Kichiroku Ekkyo was the 18th Hiroshima resident to die this year from the effects of atomic radiation.
