Boys Find Child's Body

CRANE, Ind. (AP)—Three boys tramping through a thicket yesterday stumbled on the body of Ronnie Weikamp, 54 days after the 3-year-old boy's disappearance sent 2,500 servicemen and civilians combing the huge Crane Naval Ammunition Depot for 30 hours.

The body of the tow-headed youngster was found 50 yards north of the depot, where the child's father Lawrence Weikamp works as an ammunition inspector.

"There's no question about the identification," Deimar Hasler, Greene County coroner, reported. He said an autopsy was being made to determine how the child died.

Capt. Robert Dillon, chief state police investigator, said a preliminary check brought out no reason to suppose foul play. He said it appeared the boy died of "starvation and exposure," but emphasized the investigation would have to be completed before more positive conclusions could be drawn.

When the child disappeared Oct. 11, a 4-year-old playmate told Mrs. Weikamp: "Ronnie went off into the stickers."

No trace of the boy was found. Police turned to the theory that he might have been kidnapped.

Big Storm Heads For Canada Now

Freezing cold slammed into the northern border region today to replace the weekend blizzard that played havoc with the central and northern plains area.

The storm, which dumped as much as 16 inches of snow over the prairie area, wheeled yesterday and turned toward Canada. The snowstorm, for the most part, left a thick blanket of snow Saturday in Nebraska, Kansas, the Dakotas, Minnesota and Wisconsin.

The resulting cold wave plunged temperatures well below zero across the northern border section while covering most of Minnesota, Strong, gusty winds accompanied the temperature drop.

While Fraser, Colo., President Eisenhower's favorite fishing spot, reported the morning's lowest reading at -20, Minnesota and North Dakota were almost as cold.

The warmest portion of the nation was Florida and the immediate Gulf Coast region with readings in the 60s and 70s.

The freezing line of the nation early today extended from northern Ohio southward to northern Arkansas, the Texas Panhandle and southern New Mexico before swinging around Nevada and into the Pacific Northwest.

Some light snow occurred in the lower Midwest region while rain was reported in southern New England and in portions of southern California.

Razor Wielder Brings Terror

CHICAGO (AP)—Five saloon patrons—"too scared" to resist—were taken on a wild ride west of Chicago by a young man who brandished a razor.

Before abducting the three men and two women in a stolen taxi cab early yesterday, Pat Dillon, 25, terrorized a South Side saloon and slashed two men who tried to resist him, police said.

Before releasing the last of his passengers, police said, he raped one of the women.

Authorities held Dillon, a native of Colorado Springs, Colo., without formal charge. They said he admitted the escapade.

Police Lt. James Keeley gave this version:

Dillon started to get quarrelsome in the saloon and the owner, Anthony Miskinis, 44, and a patron, John Doran, 26, tried to quiet him.

Dillon slashed Miskinis on the left arm and Doran on the right leg, then forced a customer to set up drinks for everyone.

Afterwards he went outside, commandeered at razor-point the taxicab of Mont Anderson, 48, and ordered Mrs. Shirley Naddy, 26; Riley Menier, 21; Robert Nelson, 37; Nelson's wife Marion, 33, and Anderson, to accompany him.

Anderson escaped near Warrensville, 25 miles west of Chicago. Dillon later released the Nelsons and Menier. Keeley said Mrs. Naddy was freed near Elgin, Ill., after Dillon raped her.

Dillon works in the shipping department of a Chicago appliance company. He was arrested at the home of a girl friend.
