



Storm Grows Over Idea That Georgia Scorns Non Segregated Teams

ATLANTA (AP) — The Board of Regents meet today to act on Gov. Marvin Griffin's request that athletic teams of the university system of Georgia be prohibited from playing opponents who do not maintain segregation.

Robert O. Arnold, chairman, indicated last night the 15-member board might turn down the governor's suggestion.

The proposal already has caused a storm of controversy and rioting by Georgia Tech students. They feared their team might not be permitted to play Pittsburgh in the Sugar Bowl at New Orleans Jan. 2. Pitt has a Negro on the squad.

Approval of Griffin's request might also damage the status of Tech and the University of Georgia as national football powers. And it could upset Tech's 1955-56 basketball schedule.

Arnold, who has declared himself against the athletic policy suggested by Griffin, said:

"I've talked to a good many board members and I'm very hopeful the whole issue will be resolved and the situation will quiet down to normal."

Griffin himself said that "the matter is now squarely up to the Board of Regents and rests solely in their hands. I have nothing to add to my communication to the chairman. I stand on that."

Former Gov. Herman E. Tamm, made an outspoken proponent of segregation, declined comment.

"That's his (Griffin's) business and I never mess with another man's business," he said.

Tech students rioted through downtown Atlanta early Saturday, stormed the state capitol, burned effigies of Griffin and paraded to the governor's mansion.

Saturday night students at Mercer University in Macon, Ga., demonstrated and hanged the governor in effigy.

Early yesterday an effigy of Griffin was found hanging from a tree near the faculty club on the University of Oregon campus at Eugene, Ore.

At Baton Rouge, La., the Southern Gentlemen's organization, a secret pro-segregation society, urged Gov. Robert Kennon and Sugar Bowl officials to prevent race mixing in the sports classic.

George Harris, 21-year-old president of the Georgia Tech student body, apologized to Pittsburgh for what he termed Griffin's "unwarranted action" and said, "We are looking forward to seeing your entire team and student body at the Sugar Bowl."

At Pittsburgh, Bobby Grier, Negro reserve fullback, said, "I'm just sorry the whole thing came up."

"I never ran into this kind of thing before, either at home or on the team," said the senior, a 25-year-old business administration student. "I'm awfully sorry it has happened."

Pitt tackle Jim McCusker snapped:

"The whole team's mad. Nobody's going to have trouble getting us for this game."

Ground Attack Pays Off For Rams Sunday As They Down Baltimore By 20-14

LOS ANGELES (UP) — The Los Angeles Rams displayed a grinding ground attack yesterday to turn back the Baltimore Colts, 20-14, and hang onto first place in the Western Division by a half game over the Chicago Bears.

Les Richter, whose talented foot won the Eagles game last week, again added the deciding points by kicking his 11th and 12th field goals of the season.

Despite Richter's performance the Rams' drive would have won but for the bull-like rushing of fullback Paul (Tank) Younger and the passing of quarterback Norm Van Brocklin. The Rams defense also proved a deciding factor as it bottled up Alan (The Horse) Ameche most of the game which was played on a rain-soaked turf.

The Rams host Green Bay while the Bears take on the Philadelphia Eagles next Sunday in games that will decide the division title. The Rams need only a tie or a win to clinch the 1955 crown.

More than 90,000 fans braved cool drizzle and bitterly raw winds to watch the Rams rack up a 10-9 halftime lead and then outlast a fierce Colt rally in the final period. Younger powered his way for two touchdowns in the first and final periods. He scored on a one-yard line plunge and then pushed aside the Colts for 11 yards for the second touchdown.

The Colts came to life in the final period with quarterback George Shaw, who followed Van Brocklin from the University of Oregon, filling the airwaves with passes to set up the two six-pointers. Ameche, who netted only 63 yards in 12 carries, fired up the Colts with his four yard run for the first touchdown and then Shaw went for eight and the final Colt score.

The Rams defense stiffened under the soggy field when with only 30 seconds to play the Colts had possession of the ball following a successful onside kick. The Rams, however, batted down a long Shaw pass and a second Colt gained only 17 yards as the final gun sounded.

Richter's two field goals came in the second and third periods from the 10 and 20-yard markers respectively after Van Brocklin had been halted. He also provided both points after touchdowns.

Younger and rookie halfback Ron Walker carried the ball 49 times for 270 yards to spark the Rams on the ground. Van Brocklin attempted 21 passes and completed 13 for 145 yards while Shaw's 22 attempts resulted in 15 completions for 144 yards.

Veteran Skeet Quinlan ably supported Younger and Walker. Quinlan snagged eight Van Brocklin passes for 90 yards.

The spirit of the Rams showed in putting the Colts in the hole throughout the game came as a surprise because of the loss of ends Elroy (Crazy Legs) Hirsch and Bob Boyd with injuries suffered in previous games.

Basketball Gets Into High Gear In Northwest League

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Basketball shifts into high gear in the Pacific Northwest this week with major college teams hosting invaders from the Rockies and the Southwest.

Oregon, boasting a victory over Oregon State, the 1955 Pacific Coast Conference champion, and Washington State start the week Monday night with games against non-league foes.

The University of Colorado Buffaloes, 63-53 winners over Oregon State Saturday night, move to Eugene to tackle the Webfoots Monday night. Washington State will entertain Whitworth.

Baylor University of Waco, Texas, invades the Northwest starting Wednesday night, playing Oregon State at Corvallis, and moves to Seattle for games with the Washington Huskies, who lost two to Stanford last week, Friday and Saturday nights.

In other games, Santa Clara plays at Seattle University Thursday and Friday nights. Idaho hosts Montana University Friday night and Utah State Saturday night. Oregon plays at Brigham Young Friday and Saturday nights. Wyoming will be at Oregon State the same nights, and Washington State will entertain Utah State Friday night and Gonzaga Saturday night.

Colorado beat Oregon State at the first throw line Saturday night. The Buffaloes, the nation's No. 3 team last year, made only 18 field goals against OSC's 24, but outscored the Beavers 27-5 on the free throw line. OSC's sophomore forward, Dave Gambee, was high scorer with 22. Colorado led at the half 32-25.

Free throws also decided the

Washington-Stanford clash at Palo Alto. The Indians, 72-55 victors Friday night, connected on charity tosses Saturday night to beat the visiting Huskies 73-68. The referee called a total of 40 personal fouls in the wild contest. Washington took nearly twice as many shots from the floor as Stanford but hit for only 25 per cent of them.

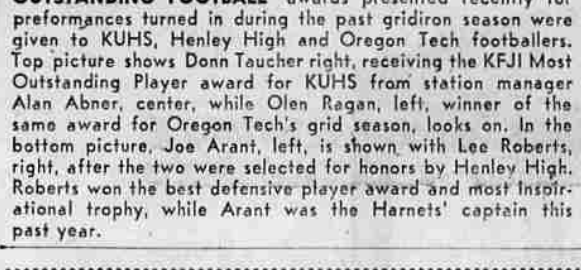
Pacific University grabbed off third spot in the 4-team tourney by chipping the College of Puget Sound, 63-61.

"I was a green kid and Robinson was a great fighter back in 1950 when he got me in the 12th round," said Olson as he entered the final week of drills for defense of his crown in Chicago Stadium.

"But even then my style bothered him for 10 rounds. And when we met two years later I really gave him trouble before he took a split 15-round decision. We both know each other's styles and what to expect in this third fight."

"I look for Ray to try to knock me out early. Although reports are that he is in wonderful condition, the man still is 35 and must realize that he can't stand up under the pressure I'll give him through 15 rounds."

"I only hope that he tries to blitz me from the start. If he comes in to me, that will suit me fine. I know I'll go after him."

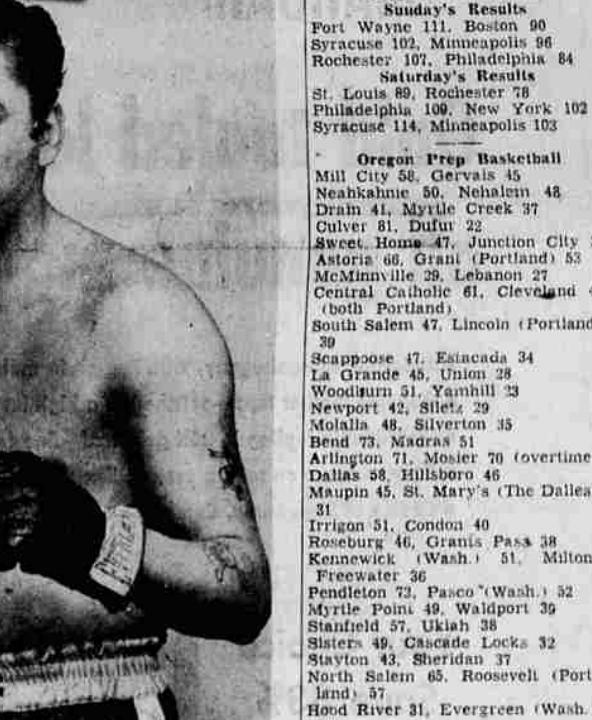
Olson shrugs off his third-round knockout by light heavyweight champion Archie Moore in last June's title bout as "a thing of the past—and something I'd just as soon forget."

Santa Anita Races To Be Televised

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Four \$100,000 feature races at Santa Anita racetrack will be televised on 19 stations in the West during the CBS network announced Sunday.

The races are the Santa Anita Maturity Jan. 28, the Handicap Feb. 25, the Derby March 3, and the San Juan Capistrano Handicap March 10.

The network said the half-hour telecasts will be carried live in Portland and Medford, Ore., and Seattle and Yakima, Wash., as well as California.

Athletes Earning Boost Surveyed

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The Pacific Coast Conference may raise the ceiling on athletes' earnings. Faculty representatives of the nine members, opening a four-day meeting, pointed out Monday that living costs have risen sharply.

The athlete's scale, adopted several years ago, is \$150 an hour for campus work, but not to exceed \$75 in any month. He also may receive tuition and fees.

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
