Noted Criminologist Enters Abbott Case; 53rd Witness

OAKLAND, Calif. (UP) — The prosecution called a noted criminologist to the stand today in an attempt to prove through science that Burton W. Abbott kidnapped and murdered Stephanie Bryson.

The criminologist was Dr. Paul L. Kirk of the University of California, who has devoted a quarter of a century to solving crime with his microscope. He is the 53rd witness in the case.

Dist. Atty. J. Frank Connelley said the prosecution might rest immediately after Kirk finishes testifying.

Through Kirk's testimony, Connelley said he hoped to put the "exclamation point" on his case against the 27-year-old accounting student accused of luring Stephanie to her death.

Kirk took the stand yesterday, but spent most of his time in long preliminary questioning to establish his qualifications as an expert.

What he did not say about the Bryan case centered on three objects: A lump of clay taken from Stephanie's crude grave in the Trinity County mountains; her panties, found knotted around her head; and a piece of cleansing tissue found in a pack rat's nest nearby.

Kirk said the clay bore a plain imprint of Stephanie's wrist.

sweater. He verified this fact by stretching a piece of the sweater to magnify the pattern.

"Most clay would not take such a sharp impression," he said. "It would have to be very wet."

He also testified that a "great deal of claylike soil was embedded in the sweater."

These two facts indicated to him, that the ground was extremely wet when Stephanie was buried in a crude grave near Abbott's mountain cabin.

Previous witnesses have testified that it rained heavily in the area during the last week of April, then cleared for the season. Stephanie disappeared from Berkeley on April 28. Her body was found July 20.

Kirk said an examination of Stephanie's panties showed the presence of a "number of short dark hairs that were typical eyelashes and eyebrows."

"They were in the area essentially opposite from the knot," he said. "Most of them were eyebrow and eyelash hairs, but some few were typical of head hairs."

He did not dwell on this further, but the implication was that the panties had been used as a blindfold.

He identified the paper tissue found in the rat's nest as Kleenex, and said he found a bloodstain on

it. He could not tell whether it was from human or animal blood. The prosecution asked if Kirk had examined other pieces of Kleenex in connection with the case.

Kirk replied he had found "large amounts" in Abbott's car and a few pieces in his jacket.

Earlier, Stephanie's mother, Mrs. Mary Bryan, was recalled to the stand for the sad task of identifying Stephanie's clothing, recovered with her body from her grave, and some of her possessions, found in Abbott's house.

Her voice faltered once or twice, but generally she kept her self-possession. She looked at Abbott only once. He kept his eyes averted during most of her testimony. The defense did not cross examine her.

TOUR

TOKYO (UP) — U. S. Army Secretary Brucker toured Japanese and American Army installations near Tokyo Tuesday. Brucker said the United States "will not hesitate to give continued aid and support" to the Japanese army. He will fly to Korea Wednesday.

CYPRUS FUTURE

NEW DELHI (UP) — Prime Minister Nehru said Wednesday the people of Cyprus should be left to settle their future by self-determination. He told Parliament India believed the matter should be solved by a conference rather than through the United Nations.

Students Riot In Georgia

ATHENS, Ga. (UP) — Police and troopers used tear gas to break up a yelling throng of more than 1,500 University of Georgia male students during a campus demonstration early today.

State highway patrolmen arrested two students and discharged tear gas among the swirling horde of demonstrators who blocked traffic, threw rocks at patrol cars and hung effigies of a university dean.

This was a fifth campus demonstration to be staged in the state since Gov. Marvin Griffin proposed that Georgia Tech be forbidden to play in the Sugar Bowl game Jan. 2 because of rival Pittsburgh's Negro full back.

The target this time was not Griffin, as in Tech's rowdy march on the state capitol and the governor's mansion, but Dean of Men William Tate, because he is disciplining students for their part in a "sympathy" rally by Georgia students two nights ago.

The State Board of Regents, governing both institutions, voted after Tech's riotous protest to permit the Sugar Bowl game. The board is still debating precise terms for enforcing the state's segregation traditions in future athletic contests.

The regents ordered strict segregation in contests played within the state with some tolerance of racial mingling according to the "ground rules" of the localities involved in out-of-state games.

The regents' opinions appear to favor letting the athletic officials of Georgia and Georgia Tech schedule future games without direct interference so long as they follow that general policy.

Regent Charles Bloch said late Tuesday he wanted to reconsider a proposal he made for setting up a "screening" of all prospective bowl games by the regents to safeguard the board's policy toward mixed athletics.

GUAM (UP) — A Japanese patrol boat Wednesday rescued 19 crew members of the Japanese fishing boat Yahata Maru which went around on a reef 60 miles northwest of here Monday.

Ex-Premier Expects Call

PARIS (UP) — Pierre Mendes-France, backed by the strongest political party in France, called a large-scale press conference today with the self-assurance of a man who expected to be premier again.

He had scheduled the conference for Tuesday but postponed it until the Socialist Party, France's largest in Parliament, pledged itself to ally with Mendes-France and his left-of-center group in the forthcoming elections.

The conference, in the Radical Socialist Party headquarters in the Place Valois, was his first big one since he was voted out of office in February. Some 250 French and foreign newsmen were invited.

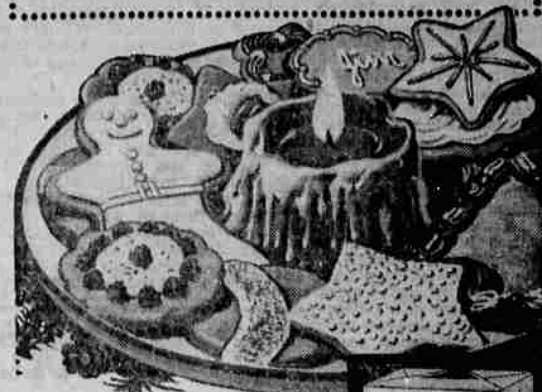
The dynamic Mendes-France, who was called "Mr. France" by his supporters during the 222 days he held office, was expected to outline his political campaign by which he hopes to defeat Premier Edgar Faure, his one-time close friend who became his bitterest political enemy.

The Socialist Party's National Council agreed to allow Socialist candidates to ally themselves with Mendes-France and his left-of-center groups in the Jan. 2 elections. The left-wing group is made up of the small but influential Union of Socialist and Democratic Resistance (USDR), the Social Republicans (former Gaullists) and the Mendes-France faction of the Radicals.

Earlier the Socialists voted not to allow union with the Communists and they worded their agreement so carefully it allowed only

an alliance with Mendes' followers. Though not especially pro-Mendes-France, the Socialists are bitter against Faure, and against the Catholic MRP, the Popular Republican Movement.

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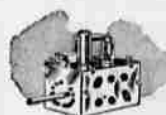
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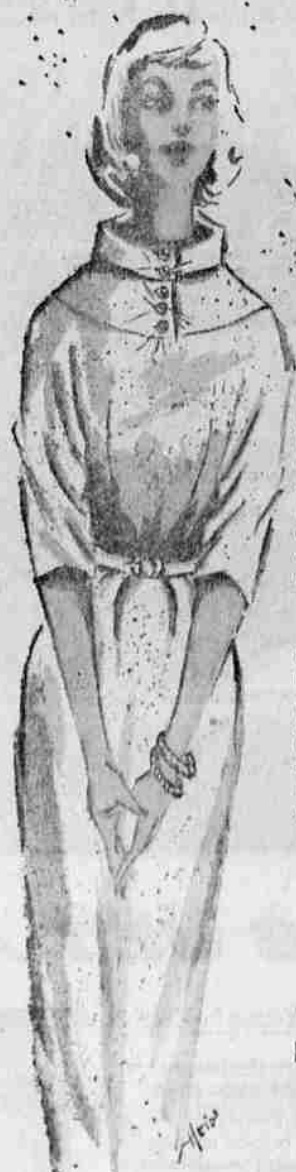
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
