

Big Fines Expected From PCC

SAN FRANCISCO (UP) — The Pacific Coast Conference set the stage today for heavy-scale fines for illegal recruiting activities with the lifting of the \$1000 maximum on penalties.

The conference voted yesterday, in the wake of a \$1000 fine against UCLA for unbecomingly proselytizing, to make future fines "appropriate" to the infraction.

"In the future, fines may be assessed in such amounts as the conference deems appropriate," H. P. (Dick) Everest of Washington, PCC spokesman, announced.

This apparently opens the way for more severe financial rapas at schools recruiting outside the conference code.

Today, the directors are expected to take up the matter of a "living wage" for athletes.

Yesterday, the organization outlined a six-point program that will offer to the NCAA on the handling of television for football games.

Mainly, the proposal asks for more regional control, more regional games and fewer national "Game of the Week" programs in the West.

"We feel that the conference involved should have the say on whether a game should be blacked out in any certain area," said Al Masters, Stanford graduate manager and PCC television chairman.

"We would like to see eight regional games telecast next year compared with the five we had this season."

"Under the rules last year, Southern California was not allowed to televise into Los Angeles its game with Minnesota being played in Minneapolis because Pomona was playing that day," Masters said.

Everest said there has been a change in sentiment among the smaller schools which used to think that television of major games would hurt their gate.

"The smaller schools used to be opposed to this but they aren't any more," said Everest. They have become adjusted to television.

The conference gave up after an exhaustive three-year study an attempt to have qualitative as well as quantitative standards for athletes.

UNFEASIBLE "The difficulties encountered as a result of varying academic procedures with respect to grades would make the establishment of a qualitative standard over the whole conference unworkable and unfeasible," said Everest.

What he implied was that a "C" average is much harder to maintain at some schools than at others.

In other business, the conference voted to crown a champion in football, basketball, basketball and track. There never has been an official champion in the past.

In the future, trophies will be given for team titles. Citations will also be given to athletes maintaining a "B" average; and plaques will be awarded to players making the All-Conference football team picked by the coaches.

Gilchrist Posts Win Over Paisley

Gilchrist made it two straight Tuesday nights as they romped over Paisley in a non-league basketball game played at Paisley by a 46-31 margin.

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Illinois Opens Year With Resounding Win

This figures to be a hectic college basketball season for Illinois Coach Harry Combes, the great warrior. It looks like he has a winner.

Nothing leaves Harry lumper than one of those rip-snortin' title races in the Big Ten and that's apparently right where he's headed after the way his Illini made their debut last night with a whopping 107-75 victory over Butler.

Illinois' big noise drowned out the continued success of top-ranked San Francisco and third-ranked North Carolina State as each lacked another game to winning streaks. The Dons, with All-America Bill Russell packing in 20 points in the 22 minutes he played, mauled outclassed San Francisco State 72-47 for their 20th consecutive victory. The Dons now put the string on the shelf until meeting Marquette Dec. 16.

N.C. State, meanwhile, bagged No. 15 in a row as Vic Molodet canned 26 in a 90-81 decision over Wake Forest. It was the Wolfpack's first Atlantic Coast Conference game of the season, but their third straight triumph of the new schedule.

Illinois, ranked eighth in the Associated Press poll, was a pre-season pick for the Big Ten title scrap along with defending champion Iowa and Indiana. But probably no one figured the Illini to break upon the scene with such a show of offensive punch. Capt. Paul Judson and Harv Schmidt each scored 22 points as the Illini rang

up their highest one-game total ever.

No other teams among the top 10 in the poll were active last night.

The Southern Conference got going en masse, with defending champ West Virginia spilling Furman 85-71. Washington & Lee's Five-Star Generals tagged Richmond 78-76 in a battle of contenders and George Washington, another "favorite," smacked William and Mary 81-75.

Washington & Lee's youngsters dumped in six free throws—three by 6-5 Marshall—in the last two minutes to snap a 72-73 tie to hand the Spiders their first setback. Sophomore Don Flora of W&L was high with 27 points.

All America Darrell Floyd hit 27 for previously unbeaten Furman but except for a close first half, West Virginia had things its way. Hot Rod Hundley counted 20 for the Mountaineers.

George Washington had a bit of a score in the second half but had room to spare against William & Mary with center Joe Holup scoring 36 points although being triple-teamed.

Elsewhere, Kansas State of the Big Seven made its debut with an 89-70 decision over Texas Tech as 6-8 Jack Parr scored 22, and Southern Methodist warmed up for its three-game invasion of the Big Ten (Iowa, Minnesota and Wisconsin) with a 65-42 victory over Texas Wesleyan.

Richard T. Young of Project City, California, forfeited \$100 bail in District Court for making a false statement to secure resident Oregon hunting license.
