Safety Code Hearing Told

A public hearing to consider the adoption of a safety code for electrical transmission and distribution systems and facilities will be held in Portland December 15. It was announced in Salem by the State Industrial Accident Commission.

The meeting will be held in room 36 of the state office building in Portland and will begin at 10 a.m. It has been called to determine public reaction to various provisions of the code before final adoption and publication.

SIAC officials said the proposed code is a compilation of the results of many meetings of a committee which was representative of the electrical industry of Oregon. It is expected to be of material assistance in establishing uniform practices necessary to a high degree of safety in electrical work.

Local Residents Win Contest

Two Klamath County residents were winners in the 16th annual Oregon Grange-White Sugar Canning contest. Cecil Brown of Fort Klamath won second prize in the tree fruit division and Betty Yancey, 4009 Homedale Road, Klamath Falls, took first prize in the juvenile division.

East Germans Hint Of New Bars Against Americans

BERLIN (UP)—The East German Communists hinted today they would bar Americans from East Berlin in defiance of four-power agreements guaranteeing free movement in the isolated city.

The Communist press reported "indignant" East Berliners were demanding action to prevent "attacks" by Americans on East

German soldiers and suggested that radio equipped American patrol cars were being used by "spies."

The massive propaganda campaign centered around the arrest Wednesday of two American soldiers and it was growing apparent the Reds might use the incident to justify the breaking of the Big Four agreements on Berlin.

American authorities expected the Soviets today to offer to trade the soldiers—captured at gunpoint and apparently beaten—for

a Soviet officer who asked political asylum in West Germany.

Thus far the Soviets have failed to answer American inquiries on the fate of the two soldiers; in the past the Soviets have returned captured Americans but only after trying to use them for bargaining purposes.

The East Germans, in announcing arrest of the two G.I.s, said they beat up a German cabaret actor, Werner Lierck, and that the Americans then faked injuries to themselves so they could report they were beaten by Communist police. One newspaper reported that one of the soldiers spat out blood after fighting a taxi driver who turned them in.

The newspaper Neues Deutschland, official organ of the Communist Party, reported that Lierck's friends had written a letter of protest saying "we are indignant over the incident."

The colleagues demanded that the East Berlin Executive Council and the "Peoples Police" take measures to block such incidents in the future. One such measure could be barring Americans from entering the Soviet sector of the city.

The demands were given weight because they appeared in the official Communist publication.

The United States, Britain and France have the right of free movement under an agreement

with Russia. But the Communists and the Soviet commandant have

asserted East Berlin no longer is the capital of the "sovereign" occupied and that East Berlin is East German state.

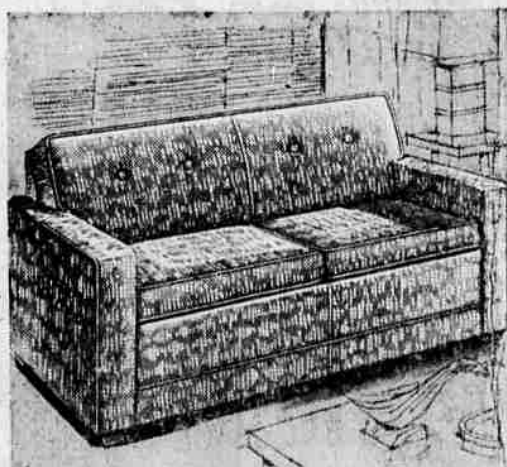

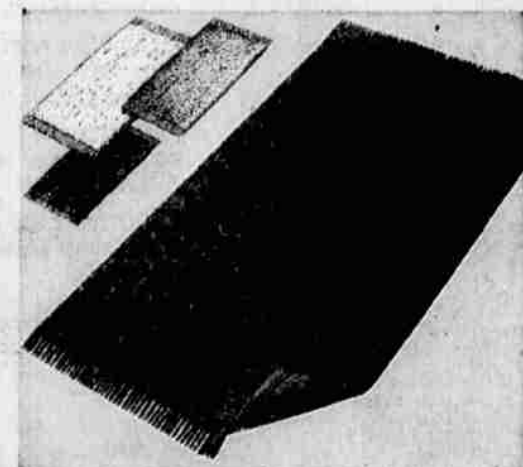
