Sheep Contest Blanks Ready

Entry blanks for commercial ewe flock owners to enroll in the 1956 Oregon sheep production contest should be obtained soon from county extension agents, according to contest chairman C. M. Hubbard, Junction City sheep breeder.

The contest, starting its second year, is sponsored by the Oregon Purebred Sheep Breeders' association and Oregon State College extension service to promote better flock and land management.

Winners of the 1955 contest will be named December 12 at the purebred breeders' annual meeting at McMinnville. Cash awards will go to three persons growing the highest income per ewe in each of two divisions—flocks of 100 ewes or less, and flocks of more than 100.

Carl Whipple, Turner, association president, says a discussion is scheduled of profit-making methods used by contest winners in pasture management, sheep breeding and feeding, use of equipment, and other management practices.

The association invites all Oregon farm flock owners to attend the meeting which starts at 1:15 p.m. at the fairgrounds in McMinnville.

Other members of the contest committee, comprised of county extension agents and breeders, are agents S. A. Jackson, Corvallis; association secretary, O. E. Miller, Albany; Ben Newell, Salem; and J. Roland Parker, Roseburg, and breeders Floyd Fox, Silverton; Ronald Hogg, Salem; Clarence Bernard, McMinnville; and Al Oliver, Corvallis.

The cars are to be built at the Roseville, Los Angeles and Colton shops of the Pacific Fruit Express Company—jointly owned by Southern Pacific and Union Pacific rail-

roads—world's largest operator of refrigerator cars, Plummer said. First cars on this order should be ready for service by December of 1956, with completion of the program set for July, 1957.

Plummer also stated that PFE has authorized conversion of 175 of the present ice-bunker super cars to mechanical refrigeration at a cost of \$1,700,000. Conversion will start in March, 1956, and the cars should all be in service by June.

This is the largest order of PFE cars in the last five years. Plummer pointed out. The 200 new mechanically refrigerated cars, with those which are to be converted, will raise the company total of such cars to 712. The additional standard cars will bring PFE's total refrigerator fleet to 35,000.

Plummer added, providing more modern equipment for protection of the large volume of perishable shipments from Western and Southwestern areas to Eastern markets. Since the end of World War II, PFE has added 10,500 other refrigerator cars to its rolling stock at a cost of more than \$88 million.

The super-giant 50-foot cars, longer than conventional ice-refrigerated cars and equipped with much thicker insulation, are designed specifically to transport frozen foods with equipment equal to the finest commercial automatic freezers.

Each of the mechanical cars, it was explained, has two independent compressor-evaporator refrigeration systems, powered by one diesel-electric power plant in a

compartment at one end of the car. Air, chilled by this system, is forced through ducts throughout the ceiling, down inside the hollow walls, and back through a space provided under the floor.

Exterior heat is excluded by ten and one-half inches of insulation in the roof of the car and seven inches of insulation in the roof of the car and seven inches of insulation in the sides, ends and floor. Defrosting by electric heaters is automatic.

In addition, structural changes have been planned for the new standard cars. They will have wider doors, air-circulating fans, convertible bulkheads and heavier underframes than previous models.
