



A REPLICA of the Jefferson Peace Medal was recently given by Clatsop County to the Klamath County Historical Society in recognition of the society's service as a patron of the sesquicentennial of the Lewis and Clark expedition, which took place in 1805. The replica, held by Claude Schaeffer, curator of the Klamath County Museum, was given to the museum by the society. The original medals were struck for Lewis and Clark to present to Indian chiefs as peace tokens. The picture Schaeffer is holding is a print of a painting by Charles Bodmer, a Swiss artist who accompanied Prince Maximilian on a trip up the Missouri River in 1833. It shows two Blackfoot chiefs, one of them wearing a Jefferson medal, and a Kootenai chief. The print will be on exhibition as a background for the replica.

Stranded Victim Of College Prank Not Sorry For Ordeal

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Being stranded in Miami by a college prank turned out to be not so bad for Rodger Ladenburger, 22, of the University of Kentucky.

He got kissed by two pretty girls, and then moved into the Kappa Sigma fraternity house until his problem of returning to Lexington, Ky., is solved.

Ladenburger was given a one-way ticket to Miami Friday night at Lexington. He boarded a plane and arrived here at 3 a.m. He had been told that in Miami he would meet the fraternity's national president who would discuss important business with him and would provide expense money and a return ticket to Kentucky.

Once here, the architectural and engineering senior asked at the airline information counter if there was any message for him. Yes, replied agent Vincent Deagan, he had an envelope. Ladenburger opened it—and it was quite a shock.

It was from the four Kentucky

fraternity brothers who had sent him here. The note told him there was no business to conduct, getting back to the university in time for 8:30 a.m. classes Monday "is strictly your own problem—have fun."

Ladenburger had \$4 in his pockets and no luggage. He discussed the problem with George Briggeman an airline agent.

The agent decided the Kappa Sigma fraternity at the University of Miami might have some suggestions. He called the K-S house. In no time several Kappa Sigs reached the scene. There were more phone calls, and more fraternity brothers arrived, some with their dates.

The Miami Kappa Sigma president, Jerry Dangler of Rochester, N.Y., took charge. Ladenburger would be a guest of the Miami chapter and would receive bed, board, a toothbrush and moral support until the return to Kentucky was worked out.

Police Probe Death Clues

MELBOURNE, Fla. (AP) — Police Saturday believed an ax or hatchet, probably the latter, was the weapon used to slay Patricia Van Eeghen, 26, and her daughter, Phyllis, 7, whose bodies were found Friday in a car parked across the street from a funeral home here.

The woman's husband, Philip Van Eeghen, 30, was questioned 11 hours Friday and remained in custody pending further interrogation. Sheriff H. T. Williams of Brevard County is in charge of the case.

Officers said Mrs. Van Eeghen's head was split open by three blows of a sharp instrument, probably a hatchet. The child died of bludgeoning with some blunt instrument, possibly the blunt side of a hatchet.

Van Eeghen's attorney, Richard Muldrew, said the authorities must place charges against the husband or release him by 8:30 a.m. Sunday, or he would seek a writ of habeas corpus.

The bodies of the woman and child were found a few hours after the husband reported them missing at 6:30 a.m.

The wife was slumped on the floor under the dashboard. The girl's body had been laid carefully in the trunk of the car.

Pentagon Ups Missile Plans

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon was reported Saturday to have centered control of its guided missile program in a new top-level agency to spur efforts to beat Russia in turning out long-range nuclear rockets.

This management committee, working directly under Deputy Defense Secretary Reuben Robinson, will decide, among other things, on the priority in immediate development between the intercontinental range and mid-range ballistic weapons.

The upsurge in the Defense Department's already heavily emphasized effort to produce long-range bombardment rockets, capable of carrying nuclear warheads, was touched off by new reports of swift and substantial progress by Russia.

Among top defense officials studying the closeness of the missile race with Russia there was a grim air of "we've got to get there first."

As part of the stepped up drive, the Pentagon has approved a pooling of Army and Navy programs for perfection of an intermediate range ballistic rocket.
