BONN, Germany (AP) — Dr. Otto John, the notorious German turncoat security chief, has returned to the West.
The West German government announced Tuesday that the debonair "man of a thousand secrets" who deserted to Communist East Germany 18 months ago surrendered to West German security police.

Landry Cites Urgent KF Sewer Needs

An expenditure of approximately \$250,000 for additional sewerage facilities will be a "must" in the near future for Klamath Falls, Mayor Paul Landry told the City Council Monday night.
The mayor made this statement after the council decided to annex the Sunland subdivision near the housing project which was urged in a petition presented by E. M. Chilcote and 32 other residents of the area.
The council also was asked for information concerning its plans for sewer expansion by Walter Hayes, representative of persons planning to develop a housing area in McLoughlin Heights.

Eight Killed In Plane Crash

TETUAN, Spanish Morocco (AP) — Spanish border guards say eight airmen aboard a U. S. military transport plane were killed when the craft hit a 5,000-foot peak in the rugged Rif Mountains and exploded.
The plane was a four-engine C-54 of the U. S. Air Force's 1200 Air Transport Group, based at Kelly Field, San Antonio, Tex. The transport crashed Sunday night in the Gornora district, near the border between French and Spanish Morocco.
Flying from Wheelus Field in Tripoli to Casablanca, it was believed en route to the United States.
Spanish authorities reported the accident to U. S. Air Force officials at Rabat, French Morocco, yesterday. The Spaniards said the eight bodies were being sent to the Sidi Slimane air base near Rabat, French Morocco.
Spanish technicians who examined the wreckage said the plane's altimeter must have been out of order.

River Contract Delay Asked

YREKA, Calif. (AP) — The Shasta County Board of Supervisors Monday night asked delay in approval of a contract for construction of Klamath River hydroelectric dams by the California Oregon Power Co.
At a hearing of the water subcommittee of the Assembly Committee on Conservation, Planning and Public Works, the Shasta Board urged that the Federal Bureau of Reclamation hold up signing of the power contract.
The supervisors asked that a regulatory dam on the Klamath be authorized before the power company could proceed. They asked also assurance that Klamath River water supply be assured in the Shasta Valley and in the lower Klamath region.

China Blasts Membership Deal In UN

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — Nationalist China Tuesday blasted the U. N. membership package deal as "illegal and immoral" and appealed to the Security Council to reject it.
The Chinese Nationalist delegate, Dr. T. T. Tsiang, also sought to overturn an agreement between Russia and the Western powers on voting procedure for the admission of 18 new members to the world organization.
Tsiang spoke as the 11-nation Security Council headed toward a vote.

Without Debate

Without further debate, the council overrode Tsiang's objections and approved the voting plan previously accepted by Russia and the Western powers, the vote was 8 to 1 (China) with the United States and Belgium abstaining.
The council then voted 8-2 to adjourn until 3 p. m. when voting was scheduled to begin.

More Frigid Weather Seen

December's unseasonable cold weather continued Tuesday with prospects of fresh blasts of snow and arctic air.
Blizzard conditions were in prospect for the Dakotas and parts of Minnesota.
Below freezing weather extended southward into the central Gulf States. It was warmer Tuesday morning in some Midwest cities than in Raleigh, N.C., and Birmingham, Ala., which reported temperatures of 22 and 25 degrees, respectively.
Heavy snow fell in South Dakota during the night and strong winds caused considerable drifting. Nearly one inch of snow fell in one hour in Aberdeen, S.D.
A cold wave was forecast for North Dakota and Minnesota with sub-zero readings, snow and strong winds.

20th Annual Jenkins Potato Award To Be Given Thursday

The 20th annual Frank Jenkins Potato Award will be presented to the winner of the third annual Kiwanis 4-H potato growing project at a special Kiwanis banquet at 6:30 p. m. Thursday at the Pine Grove room in the Willard Hotel.
The name of the winner will not be announced until the banquet.
Special guests at the affair will be 4-H members and leaders, and the parents of 4-H members.
Jenkins, publisher of the Herald and News, initiated the award as a private venture in 1933. The award was offered annually until 1952. In 1953, it was taken over by the Klamath Falls Kiwanis Club and integrated with the 4-H Club potato project.
This year's 33 participants in the project marks the largest group to ever vie for the prize, according to Kiwanis officials.
In addition to the grand prize, prizes will be presented to winners in each club. Overall prizes also will be offered for the largest yield of U.S. No. 1's per acre, the largest percentage of No. 1's and the best record books. The record books are the special 4-H record kept by each club member on his project.
In an effort to build the Kiwanis 4-H Club potato awards into a national event, the Klamath Falls club issued challenges to clubs in other potato growing areas, but received only one answer. This was from the Tulelake club, which recently presented its potato project awards.
