LOS ANGELES (UP)—The Western Division champion Los Angeles Rams and the runnerup Chicago Bears each placed seven men on the West squad for the sixth annual All-Star Pro Bowl football game here Jan. 15.

Olson Wins In Court Tiff

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Carl (Bobo) Olson, dethroned last week as middleweight boxing champion, today appeared to have won his "money fight" in federal court against a \$500,000 damage suit.

At the end of the opening round yesterday Federal Judge Louis E. Goodman indicated strongly that he would vote for Olson and Manager Sid Flaherty, sued for a half million by Hawaiian dairyman Herbert Campos.

Campes, formerly the manager of Olson when he fought in the Hawaiian Islands, has asked \$500,000 damages from the boxer for breach of contract and the same amount from Flaherty for inducing Olson to breach the pact.

Both sides finished presenting their cases yesterday and the judge said:

"My own view of the matter at this moment is there was no breach of contract and Olson could fight (for anyone) until Campos made specific demands on him."

He gave Campos 20 days to present a supplemental brief, another 20 days for Olson and Flaherty to answer and then 10 days for the plaintiff to answer additional testimony—making 50 days before he would take the case under submission.

The judge said that since there was no evidence so far of any communication between Campos and Olson from the end of June, 1951, when Olson went to the Territorial Boxing Commission to ask permission to fight on the mainland, until the date of the present suit, it appeared Campos "acted by and did nothing and acquiesced" to Olson's fighting for Flaherty.

Flaherty did not take the stand to testify in his own behalf and Olson went on only briefly to relate the circumstances of the 1951 commission meeting at which he asked permission to come to the mainland to fight "because my family needed money."

The defense case rested mainly on the testimony of four persons and the deposition of another who were present at the meeting. All said that Campos was willing to let Olson go to the mainland to fight.

Finals Open In All-Star Kegling Meet

CHICAGO (AP)—Bowlers in the 15th annual All-Star individual match game championships began head-to-head play Thursday.

The four-day finals opened with 16 shooters in each of the two divisions seeking the crowns won by Tom Hennessey, of Detroit, and Sylvia Wene, of Philadelphia.

Among the men were three former champions, including Dick Hoover, of Akron, Ohio, who tied Tom Hennessey, of Detroit, for the 36-game qualifying honors. Each had 7,461 pins.

The other former winners are veteran Joe Wilman, of Berwyn, Ill., who had to qualify like Hoover, finishing seventh with 7,323, and Don Carter, of St. Louis, who was seeded into the finals.

A comparative unknown, Robbie Frey, of San Antonio, Tex., won the women's qualifying scoring honors with a 24-game total of 4,895. She edged Dolores Wroblewski, one of three Detroiters in this division, by one pin.

It was a four-player race for women's scoring honors Wednesday, especially when Phyllis Notaro of Angola, N.Y., hit a four-game morning round of 876 but then slipped Wednesday night for a 4,578, enabling Miss Wroblewski, Vicki Vukovich of Milwaukee, and Mrs. Frey to move past her. Miss Notaro took fourth.

Tempo Hot As Feller, Roberts Air Feelings

NEW YORK (UP)—Major league club owners "who are afraid of everybody else" faced trouble from a new source today—their own ball players.

The players, who are taking their problems to Commissioner Ford Frick in a momentous meeting, made it plain that they are tired of being turned down on "every reasonable request."

Bob Feller of Cleveland and Robin Roberts of Philadelphia, the players' representatives for the two leagues, will go to see Frick in the company of their lawyer and they were given instructions by the other 14 players to insist on better treatment—or else.

"We cannot continue to go along with the rejection by the club owners of what we consider to be our reasonable requests," the players stated Wednesday after a full dress meeting.

Feller suggested it was time for the club owners to become fearful of the players.

"They're afraid of everybody else," he said. "The Federal Communications Commission, the radio and television broadcasters, the whole U. S. government, they're even afraid of themselves. What there is to be afraid of, I don't know. If they are operating legitimately they have nothing to worry about. I respect the federal government, but I'm not afraid of it. Well, we respect the club owners too, but we're not afraid of them, either."

The players specifically were angry over refusal of the owners to permit them a voice in the negotiation of a new World Series radio and television contract.

Snead Said Man To Beat In Golf Open

SANFORD, Fla. (UP)—Sam Snead's golf game remained red-hot today as he took on a field of 131 shotmakers in the first annual \$15,000 Mayfair Open tournament.

The veteran West Virginian, who won the Miami Open with a sensational finish last week, posted a hot 66 in a pro-amateur event Wednesday to add to his favoritism as the man to beat.

However, Lionel Hebert, pudgy Erie, Pa., club pro, got hotter to match the course record of 65, five strokes under par, and beat Snead in the one-day affair.

The short but tricky Mayfair-Seminole Country Club course proved to be only interesting to the touring pros and three others matched Snead's 66 in the runner-up spot. They were Mike Delts of Lake Orion, Mich., Buddy Weaver of Houston, Tex., and Frank Stranahan of Toledo, Ohio.

Dick Mayer of St. Petersburg, Fla., and Paul Harney of Bolton, Mass., carded 68.

The pro-am honors were shared by two teams with a best-ball 62. They were Arnold Palmer of LaBonte, Pa., teamed with Dr. Joe Handley and John Weitzel of Hershey, Pa., playing with Dex Daniels. Palmer shot a 70 and Weitzel a 71.

The tournament is being staged by Horace Stoneham, president of the New York Giants, and the list of 20 amateurs includes Giant's Captain Alvin Dark, the team's new manager, Bill Rigney, and Carl Hubbel, the former great pitching star.

The ranks of 112 pro entries contained most of the top touring golf stars, including big money-winners Mike Souchak of Grossinger, N.Y., Doug Ford of Yonkers, N.Y., and Tommy Bolt of Chattanooga, Tenn.

The week's layoff will also give Peterson a chance to get a better look and his cagers as he endeavors to pick a "first five" from the turnover.

Klu Not Fancy, But Sets Major League Glove Mark

NEW YORK (UP)—Ted Kluszewski is no "Fancy Dan" but his sharpest critics must admit he gets the job done.

That was the testimony of the National League's official fielding statistics. They revealed today that the Cincinnati Redlegs' 235-pound slugger set a major league record by leading the circuit's first basemen in fielding for the fifth consecutive season.

Kluszewski handled 1,482 chances and committed only eight errors this year in compiling a .993 average that beat out Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals by .002 points. Over the last five years Kluszewski has handled a total of 6,844 chances and made only 33 errors for a .995 percentage.

Kluszewski previously shared the record for leading first basemen in fielding four straight seasons with Dan McGann, Chick Gandil, Joe Judge and Charley Grimm. Grimm led the N.L. in fielding nine times for an all-time mark now within Kluszewski's range.

Kluszewski, who developed his muscles by loading 120-pound bags of corn as a youth in Argo, Ill., previously led N.L. first basemen

Medford Backed By NL Directors

MEDFORD, Ore. (AP)—Medford's campaign to field a team in the Northwest Baseball League has the full backing of N.W.L. directors, Jim Fleishman, the league president, said Wednesday.

Fleishman said Eugene and Salem are "extremely anxious" for Medford to become the league's eighth team because of need for increased competition in Oregon. Other directors are "very favorable," he said.
