For a good start—demonstrative interest in the proceedings will put him in-the-know—and a few little extra courtesies here and there will soon endear him not only to the bride—but to all her friends and family. Pride will replace pathos—and the abject solitary wretch will walk in an aura of approval as the most popular of bridegrooms.

To stay that way on the trek to the altar—an intelligent general knowledge of the wedding plans—and a specific perception of his own responsibilities and the enthusiastic assumption of them will carry him smoothly to and through the "I do's."

Financially his obligations include (according to several authorities on wedding procedure)—paying for the license, the wedding ring, the bride's bouquet, corsages for the mothers and grandmothers and boutonnières for all the men.

The clergyman's fee is also his responsibility (ten dollars is minimum) and so are the bachelor dinner and wedding trip.

Ushers should receive suitable gifts—and the best man rates an extra-special remembrance.

For the bride—his heart and pocket book dictate the choice of gift. Articles of clothing are considered taboo by the etiquette experts—traditionally he gives the bride something of lasting value—usually jewelry—from a modest strand of expensive pearls to costly precious stones—but never in ostentatious settings.

His best man is usually his own brother—a favorite fraternity brother, cousin—and recently there is a marked trend toward fathers in

appointed a head usher to direct the other ushers.

So—thanks to your acquired (nobody's born with it) know-how—your best man has been your supporting staff, stand-in, stooge, valet and porter—and you are fresh as a daisy. Now that he has you tucked into your traveling clothes and has spirited you and your newly wedded wife away from the pranks — wave him a fond "roadby"—because you're on your "Happy Honeymoon."
