OSC Specialist Asks Seed Ban

A seed and grain marketing specialist at Oregon State College says that any proposed soil fertility bank should carry a ban against the harvesting of seed from returned lands.

The specialist is Ray H. Teal. He points out that as the proposed soil bank plans have been stated, all seem to need safeguards for the seed industry.

As the plan now is projected, Teal points out that it would require uncultivated land from cultivation but plant it to perennial grasses, legumes or trees.

Teal points out that regular seed producers will be seriously and adversely affected if seed is harvested from the perennial plantings on these set-aside lands.

Grassland areas in three California counties are being surveyed to find out what is growing on the rangeland and how much more forage the land can produce.

The study is expected eventually to include all the grassland ranges in the state. It now is being carried on in Glenn, Humboldt and Tehama counties by junior agronomy specialist Raymond Evans on the University of California campus at Davis.

Evans samples the grasslands to find out what grasses, legumes and other plants are growing on the unimproved range areas. And he takes soil samples back to the greenhouses at Davis to test fertility.

Evans uses soft chess as an indicator plant and applies various combinations of nitrogen, phosphorus and sulfur to the soils in plots to find out which levels produce the most forage.

At the same time, he sets up test plots on the range. Evans uses the same plant nutrients to find out what produces the most forage under field conditions.
