ATHLETIC TRANSFERS WERE IN the spotlight of the Oregon Collegiate Conference representatives' meeting this past week in Portland...

The proposal was made that all transfers to OCC schools be required to "sit out" an 18-week waiting period before being eligible for athletic clearance...

If the Oregon Collegiate Conference was a unit of all four-year colleges, then we would say fine, but with OTI only a two-year school in a four-year circuit, the move would be disastrous to the Mile High School's athletic program.

Classified as a junior college, OTI relies upon JC material for their athletic program. Freshmen and sophomores are the sole source of Tech's system...

While for the other four schools, Oregon College of Education, Southern Oregon, Eastern Oregon and Portland State Junior College, transfers would have at least two seasons remaining and possibly three.

In the six years OTI has been a member of the OCC, the Owl athletic teams have been trying to keep at the .500 mark with junior college material in a league comprised of four-year teams.

Portland State is fast becoming a "big" school with the addition of the school's degree program. It won't be too long before the PSC athletes squads are over-

powering the OCC members, and the transfer rule comes into effect, then OTI could be driven from the conference picture, and this would hurt the other four schools.

One thing for sure is the fact that the present program with "no waiting" helps the larger conference members more than Tech. More JC athletes move up, than from one junior college to another.

A solution to the problem would be for the other member schools to adopt the transfer rule in as much as their outside competition includes members of the NAIB, which asks such a rule. But Oregon Tech should remain free from such a clause because their outside opposition in the junior college ranks, which does not abide by any transfer ruling in regard to freshman athletes, OTI is a member of the National Junior College Athletic Assn.

A NEWS RELEASE FROM THE University of Washington proves that the new 12-foot free throw lane in college basketball isn't going to make too much of a change in this year's game play. The big man is still going to roll in the high point corners, even though they may not score as often as they have in past seasons.

Bogle Sparks OTI In Saturday Night Game

OLYMPIA, Washington (Special) - Oregon Technical Institute's Owls from Klamath Falls repaid the compliments to the homesteading St. Martin's College Rangers here Saturday night, and with added vigor.

After blowing Friday night's series opener to the Rangers, coach Wally Palmberg's cagers from the Mile High Campus in Southern Oregon rebounded to whip their hosts 77-65. St. Martin's won Friday's clash 80-76.

Led by the high-scoring talents of 6-9 Charlie Bogle, who also proved to be the vital link in the Owl's backboard success story, the visitors took command of the game on the opening tip and from the first second of play never took a back seat to the Rangers.

Ted Fischer opened the Owls' scoring party with a push shot on the opening play of the game to give the invaders a 2-0 margin. For the next 16 minutes the Owls and Rangers played cautious basketball, and the Owls enlarged their lead to a ten point 38-28 margin.

The halftime score gave the Owls an 11-point spread (48-35) over the four-year basketball power of the Evergreen Conference, and OTI was on the way to Tech's first basketball triumph over a St. Martin's quintet in five outings.

Using their fast break to the best advantage, Oregon Tech began to pull farther away from the Rangers. Bogle's commanding touch at both backboards, and the deadly marksmanship of Fischer proved to be more than St. Martin's had expected from the Owls. When the Ranger defense moved out to meet the "outside" shooting of Fischer, Bogle began to chip in the points. In the second half Bogle's 13 points combined, with added help from Fischer and Richie Perkins, molded the visitors into red-hot clear something they weren't in Friday night's outing.

Bogle's output of 29 points topped the individual efforts for the night, while Fischer's 18 was second best. Perkins and Johnny Foster followed in double figures with 14 and 10 points respectively. For the losers, Richard Kennedy and Bill Snell paced the point ledger with 17 and 13 points.

REBOUNDS Besides the 29 counters tallied by Tech's 6-9 center, a grand total of 31 rebounds were taken by Bogle, whose point average is ringing close to the 25 points per game level.

Friday night, Tech "blew" what should have been a sure win like the brisk March winds. Leading at halftime by a 43-35 margin, Tech's second half assault was ice cold, while Snell, connecting with jumps shots from far out, and Len Wisz, splitting the corners from the corners, were as hot as fire crackers on the Fourth of July. It wasn't long in the second half before the Rangers were able to pass the Owls with Snell and Wisz pacing the attack.

In the first section of Friday evening's fracas, St. Martin's pushed off to a 5-0 lead before the Owls were able to hit. Then, without too deliberate steps, OTI began to pull away from their more experienced foes.

Bogle again led the point makers in Friday night's contest, as he whistled 26 points through the hoop. Richie Perkins, hitting from far out with his set shots collected 22 points for Tech and Foster hit for 15. Snell sank 23 points to lead the visitors, while Wisz accounted for 19 more. St. Martin's George Expose tallied 12 points in reserve roll for the Rangers.

This week, Tech travels South for Tuesday and Wednesday games with Shasta Junior College of Redding. The Shasta series will be the final action of the year for the Owls, who will be off until January 6.

Committee May Ban California Wrestling

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) - The possibility that wrestling might be banned in California was spoken of Saturday by the chairman of an Assembly subcommittee which is probing the sport.

"We know that the matches are pre-determined and yet we close our eyes to it," said Assemblyman Frank G. Bonelli, who headed the subcommittee. "We are going to have to take some corrective steps in wrestling in California or the governor is going to take over," he said at a hearing held by his governmental efficiency and economy subcommittee on wrestling and boxing.

Bonelli, a Democrat, also said consideration will be given to recommending that wrestling be taken from the control of the State Athletic Commission.

The surest way to kill wrestling, said commission Chairman Norman O. Houston of Los Angeles, is to require wrestlers to be "fair." Requiring scientific matches instead of pseudo matches would kill wrestling, agreed Dr. Dan O. Kilroy of Sacramento, another commissioner.

Kilroy protested against taking the sport from commission control. "Some semblance of decency must be enforced," he contended, to prevent wrestlers from mixing it up in fish, ice or mud, as he said they do in some states.

"Kilroy said a watch must be kept on what wrestlers wear and that the audience participation they sometimes encourage during matches does not become a riot. Their physical condition must also be considered," he added.

"It's true we haven't got full control over wrestling," said Commissioner Joseph J. Phillips of San Francisco, "but we have some control." He said it would be foolish to abolish wrestling because "thousands of people enjoy it."

Phillips said everyone knows wrestling matches are "exhibitions" but claimed "some are on the square."

He said more wrestlers than boxers require medical attention. Kilroy said wrestling has changed slowly through the years to become "shows" instead of true matches.

Referee Joe Woods and Al Billings of Los Angeles, who told the committee in October that bouts are fixed, asked the subcommittee to return to Los Angeles and continue its inquiry. They stuck to their previous testimony.

Woods said: "I have lost a lot of work since that hearing and a lot of money." He asked that a determination be made whether three other referees who told the committee they knew nothing of fixed bouts were lying.
