# Wednesday's Winter Hits Early, Plasters Wide US Areas With Snow, Storms

Winter, officially due on Wednesday, staged a coast-to-coast preview today with gales on the Pacific Coast and Arctic-born winds whipping snow eastward from the Rockies.

Weather forecasters said no relief from the cold, which blanketed most of the Midwest and plains states today, was in sight and would become more intense tonight and tomorrow. The Arctic air was expected to reach into Western Pennsylvania today.

At 7:30 a.m. EST the mercury was 43 degrees below at Bemidji, Minn., the coldest spot in the nation.

At least 24 deaths during the weekend were attributed to the weather.

Twenty persons were trapped in a wooden apartment building at San Francisco near the Cow Palace when wind ripped the roof from the building. They were rescued by firemen and none was reported seriously injured.

Wind gusts in the San Francisco Bay Area reached 63 mph during an intense storm that swept the Pacific Coast northward. An inland fog in Southern California was blamed for three traffic accidents that killed five persons.

Heavy rains fell in Northern California and heavy snows covered areas of the Siskiyou and Sierra Nevada mountains.

South of San Francisco at Linda Mar a school roof was blown off. Several stores with windows in San Francisco were shattered by the wind and some areas were darkened by power failures when lines were snapped. Three television stations were blacked out.

The northern tier of states from Wyoming east to the Great Lakes suffered with falling temperatures and snow.

Light snow fell over Wyoming and the higher mountains of Northern Colorado. The mercury fell to 3 below zero at Sheridan, Wyo., and 13 degrees above at Akron, Colo., at noon yesterday.

More than 80 inches of snow has fallen at Houghton, Mich. This season for a new record. There was 36 inches of snow on the ground yesterday. Parts of Northern Minnesota measured 25 inches of snow on the ground.

To close, all six grades will join in a medley of three well known carols.

Everyone is invited to attend.

ROCKAWAY — A Warm Springs Indian and his wife were shot to death at this resort town early Sunday and Police Chief Delbert Walpole said the dead woman's brother-in-law had admitted the double slaying.

Dead are Donald Peccard, 24, and his wife, Doris, 25. Grant Bailey, at whose home the Peccards had been guests, said the shooting started the fight after Bailey had asked the Peccards to leave.

Bailey is the father of four children and his wife is in a hospital expecting a fifth. The Peccards are survived by three small children.

Walpole said that all seven youngsters had been awakened by the fight between Bailey and Peccard and that they had witnessed the shooting.

Bailey said he had ordered the pair out of the house because Peccard had been beating his wife. Walpole quoted Bailey as saying that he had armed himself with two rifles before he directed the Peccards to leave. He said Peccard tried to grab one of the guns, that the other discharged and that the woman was shot as she tried to grab the rifle.

Bailey said that Peccard had been released from jail at Klamath Falls only a few days ago and that he had come here for a job.

The others will be stationed at Sheppard's Air Force Base near Wichita Falls, Texas, where they will attend technical school.

The hospital, which had been inactive since early summer, was recently purchased by six Siskiyou County doctors. Dr. H. L. Vidrick, son of Weed, is acting chairman and patients will not be admitted. Bed patients will not be admitted at the Weed Hospital after January 1, but clinical offices will be maintained at the Weed Hospital.

Other doctors in the forming corporation are Dr. James McGuire, Dr. W. B. Strickland and Dr. F. Martin of Mount Shasta; Dr. D. D. Todorovic of Dunsmuir and Dr. V. J. Thompson of Weed.

Business administrator for the hospital is William Everett Smith of Yreka.

# Reds Concentrate On Hot Spot For US Sympathizers

WASHINGTON (AP)—Russia is apparently trying to put nations friendly to the United States in the spot, wherever possible.

The purpose presumably is to try to demonstrate that for countries vulnerable to Soviet power an alliance with the United States is a hazardous association.

This strategy is one of the problems of cold war planning with which Secretary of State Dulles and other U.S. leaders must deal in the months ahead.

Dulles late yesterday returned to Washington from Paris for four days he had conferred there with leaders of the North Atlantic Alliance about major new cold war fronts which, he said, Russia's rulers have opened in the Middle East and Asia.

Secretary of Defense Wilson and Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey returned together a few hours earlier.

Dulles said the NATO session

has led the free nations of Europe to feel "more than ever secure." He did not explain why he thought that was true, but the Paris meeting reaffirmed Western unity and made plans for a more effective West European radar warning network.

Dulles had no comment on the disclosure Saturday that the administration has developed a new five-billion-dollar foreign aid program to present to Congress next month for the year beginning July 1. He said he did not know what the "final budget decisions were."

One reason for the increased foreign aid undoubtedly is that the Soviet government, despite hopeful hints at the summit conference in July, now gives every evidence of carrying on unrelentingly the cold war.

The last few days brought a further development of Russia's plans and strategy along these lines:

1. At Kabul, Afghanistan, Soviet Premier Bulganin endorsed an Af-

ghanistan demand that five million tribesmen in Western Pakistan be given an opportunity to set up a new state.

That would take away almost half of Western Pakistan's territory. Pakistan is an ally of the United States and a key nation in the chain of alliances across Southeast Asia and the Middle East.

2. Moscow finally agreed to admit 18 countries to the United Nations, including a dozen it had vetoed when Nationalist China vetoed Outer Mongolia. But the Soviets vetoed all efforts to admit

Japan, an ally of the United States and an anchor of the American defense system in the Western Pacific.

3. In the Middle East, the Soviets condemned Israel for a raid on Syrian military positions a week ago. The Soviet position was parallel to that of some Western Powers, including Britain. But beyond that it was clearly part of a Russian policy of doing everything possible to win the support of the Arab nations and to embarrass Israel, long a friend of the United States.

# Probe Of Hunting Death Set

An investigation into the accidental shooting of a Shasta Valley, California, hunter near the Oregon border Sunday has been launched by the California Department of Fish and Game.

The victim, Edgar Goerlitz, 33-year-old ranch worker, was shot in the back on Slatelone Road early Sunday morning. He died two hours later in Klamath Valley Hospital.

Dr. George H. Adler, Klamath County coroner, said Harvey Tretry, 32, lumber worker, was holding the gun that fatally wounded Goerlitz. Dr. Adler explained that his investigation showed that Goerlitz bumped into Tretry and the shotgun accidentally discharged.

The wounded man was brought to Klamath Falls in a Kaler ambulance.

Robert Lucas, California game warden, said at Dorris Monday he will make a report on the shooting to District Attorney Floyd Merrill of Siskiyou County.

"It will be up to the district attorney to decide whether a California law will be invoked under which Tretry's hunting license could be permanently revoked," Lucas said. Our investigation has not been completed.

Dr. Adler Monday released the body and it was transferred from Ward's Klamath Funeral Home here to a Yreka mortuary.
