

Byrd Cites Foreign Aid Squandering

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Byrd (D-Va.) said today American foreign aid funds had been used to reduce British taxes and help pay off Denmark's debt.

The Virginian cited these as examples of ways he said "billions of dollars have been squandered in foreign economic aid." He demanded such practices be stopped.

Byrd's blast apparently signaled some strong opposition in Congress to the Eisenhower administration's plan to boost economic aid spending by about 200 million dollars in the next fiscal year beginning July 1.

Byrd, a strong advocate of economy in government, said in an interview he wants economic aid

ended, but that he will go along with foreign military assistance at the level the administration proposes—about three billion. Under administration plans, economic aid funds next year would rise to \$1,200,000,000.

"While I was in Europe this fall, I confirmed through the officials concerned that we gave Denmark 100 million dollars to help pay off her debt," Byrd said.

He added that he had obtained from Harold E. Stassen, former foreign aid chief, confirmation that 200 million dollars in economic aid funds had been given Britain to finance a tax cut before the last British general elections.

Secretary of State Dulles disclosed yesterday that the administration will ask Congress for \$4,900,000,000 in foreign aid appropriations for next year. Byrd said he will oppose any part of this which is designed to build up a reserve fund for foreign aid spending in years ahead.

Dulles said actual foreign aid outlays in the next fiscal year will

run about 200 million dollars above the present annual level of about \$4,200,000,000.

Thus if Congress made available \$4,920,000,000 in new appropriations, 5 millions of this would go into the reserve fund. Byrd said this reserve ought to be cut down, not increased.

Secretary of Defense Wilson told a news conference yesterday there should be a "substantial" increase in reserve funds for foreign military aid. He said these reserves had shrunk from a peak of \$3,580,000,000 on June 30, 1953, to about \$4,500,000,000 now.

Wilson said some military items require a long time to make and that money should be available for them in advance so firm contracts can be let.

Byrd said he is not raising objection to any "reasonable" expenditures in that field. But he insisted that contracts could be let under advance congressional authorization without actual appropriation of the money until it is needed.

Woman, Two Children Slain

NEW YORK (AP)—A woman and her two children were found brutally stabbed to death in a furnished Staten Island apartment last night. The bodies were discovered by detectives who wanted to tell her that her husband was found shot and critically wounded in his car.

Police said the three-room apartment in a two-story frame house was covered with blood and debris, indicating that a struggle preceded the slaying.

The dead were identified as Mrs. Shirley Palin, 25; her daughter Charlene, 4, and son Kedwick, 2. Mrs. Palin was found in the kitchen with three stab wounds. The boy lay on a bed, with two stab wounds in his back and one in his arm. The girl, apparently the last killed of the three, was stabbed three times in the front of her body.

It could not be immediately determined what weapon was used. Detectives said Mrs. Palin was a white woman and her husband, Milton, 27, a Negro. Palin was shot once in the chest and once in the roof of his mouth. Authorities said they could not question him for at least 48 hours.

Police said the Palins had quarreled Saturday and apparently shortly afterward Mrs. Palin moved out with the children.
