Merrill Moose Start Carlift

Merrill Moose Lodge No. 306, will cooperate in a nationwide "Operation Christmas Carlift," inaugurated by the National Moose Civic Affairs Department, on Christmas Day, according to Tommy M. Slaughter, civic affairs chairman of the Merrill lodge.

"Operation Christmas Carlift" is being offered by the Moose to all persons who, through illness, disability or similar cause, might be unable to attend the church of their choice on Christmas because of lack of transportation.

National headquarters of the Moose at Mooseheart, Ill., the fraternity's Child City, estimate that more than 40,000 automobiles will be placed at the disposal of these persons in the more than 1,700 communities where there are Moose lodges.

Civic affairs chairman, Slaughter, with the help of his committee, is now contacting every clergyman in the community to determine how many parishioners might require transportation. If any local residents desire a ride to and from church on Christmas, they are urged to contact Charley Brightman in the Mallin area, O. L. Thompson in the Merrill area, and Tommy Slaughter in the Tulelake area.

"We believe many more persons will attend the church of their choice this Christmas if only they have transportation," said Carl A. Weis, national director of civic affairs for the Moose. "This opinion was confirmed last April when Moose lodges throughout the entire country conducted a tremendously successful Operation Easter Carlift."

He explained that the Moose fraternity, whose precepts are based on the "Brotherhood of God, and the Brotherhood of Man," wants to see the North American people brought closer to God during these troublesome times. "If we Moose can help, in a small way, to bring about Operation Christmas Carlift, it will be well worth the effort," he said.

TV Christmas Shows Become Repeats Of Old Favorites

HOLLYWOOD (UP)—Christmas shows on television, like old carols and last year's tree decorations, are becoming repeats of well-worn favorites.

Many TV producers can win themselves a few days vacation by dusting off last year's show for another performance. Audiences, according to the fan mail, get sentimental and like to watch the programs again.

Jack Webb, hero of "Dragnet," appears tonight for the third Christmas in a filmed story about the theft of a statue from a church.

"People asked for it again so we used it," Webb explained. "We think the story is appropriate for a Christmas police show. There's no definite crime, but it has the 'Dragnet' flavor."

Webb is also proud of the fact that the 1953 airing of the show marked the first time color television was seen on coast-to-coast television. That first year the faces came out green and the scenery red, but by now the color transmission has improved.

"We make a new color print of the film every year to keep up with new developments in color TV transmission," Webb adds.

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UAL Announces Flight Record

SAN FRANCISCO (U)—A new Honolulu to San Francisco speed record of 8 hours, 11 minutes, was reported Tuesday night by United Air Lines.

The record was set by a United DC-7 Mainliner piloted by Capt. William Kennedy of Saratoga, Calif. The big plane, carrying 15 passengers and a crew of five, covered the 2,430 miles at an average speed of 293 miles per hour. It landed at San Francisco International Airport at 8:18 p. m.

White Merchant Acquitted In Death Of Negro Laborer

HEATHSVILLE, Va. (P—A 44-year-old white storekeeper was acquitted yesterday of a charge he murdered a young Negro laborer.

The all-white jury returned its verdict in Northumberland County Circuit Court after 24 minutes deliberation.

Ira D. Hinton Jr. had been charged with the pistol slaying of Howard Bromley the night of Nov. 5 after an argument in Hinton's country store.

The prosecution contended the 33-year-old Bromley was gunned down as he fled the store, located on the Northumberland-Lancaster County line in the Northern Neck area of Virginia. Prosecution attorneys placed emphasis on early testimony that each of three bullets that struck Bromley entered his body from the rear.

The defense maintained Bromley died of a pistol shot fired accidentally as he and Hinton fought over the weapon.

Jury Foreman Robert M. Reamy

a real estate man, told a reporter there was no disagreement among the jurors over the verdict, which came after two days of trial.

Hinton testified yesterday he asked Bromley to leave the store because he was using "vile and abusive language."

Hinton said he picked up the .32-caliber pistol when Bromley began advancing toward him. He said he fired a warning shot into the floor but Bromley kept coming and in a moment they were struggling over the weapon.

William W. Hinton, brother of the defendant, had testified Tuesday Bromley had been drinking when he entered the store and grappled with a third brother, Mead Hinton.

According to his testimony, it was at this point Ira stepped in and ordered Bromley from the store.

But two Negro prosecution witnesses told different stories.

James Tracy, who accompanied Bromley to the store, said there was no struggle, just a "friendly"

conversation that turned into an argument.

Camright King said he saw Bromley pitch forward after the shots and Hinton was two or three feet away.

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
