Shareholders Vote Split

TACOMA — Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. shareholders voted to split the company's common stock on a 4-for-1 basis in a special meeting Thursday in Tacoma, J. P. Weyerhaeuser, president, announced.

The firm's present issue of 6,250,000 shares, with a \$35 par value per share, will be changed to 25 million shares with a par share value of \$7.50, he said.

The stock split becomes effective Dec. 30, and shareholders on record at the close of business that day will be entitled to receive three additional shares for each share then held.

Rogue Areas OK'd By Board

In one sweeping move, the Oregon Game Commission at its regular meeting recently, approved seven access projects on the Rogue River.

The access sites include Tepper, Shady Cove, Conway, Laurelhurst, McLeod, Lost Creek, and Robertson bridge. All of the sites are located in the vicinity of Medford with the exception of Robertson bridge which is located below Grants Pass. The sites when completed will provide angler access to some of the most popular fishing waters along the middle section of the Rogue River.

Only two of the sites involve land acquisition, the Shady Cove and Conway sites, where a total of 10.4 acres of land will be purchased by the commission. The remaining sites involve easements and agreements with the Highway Department and Bureau of Land Management.

Total expenditures including land acquisition and development of the areas will be approximately \$17,900.

At the same time the commission approved a 10-year easement on the Raley pond in Umatilla County. According to agreements with the landowner, Raley pond will be chemically treated with rotenone and restocked with warm-water fish—bass and crappie. The pond will then be open to the public for fishing.

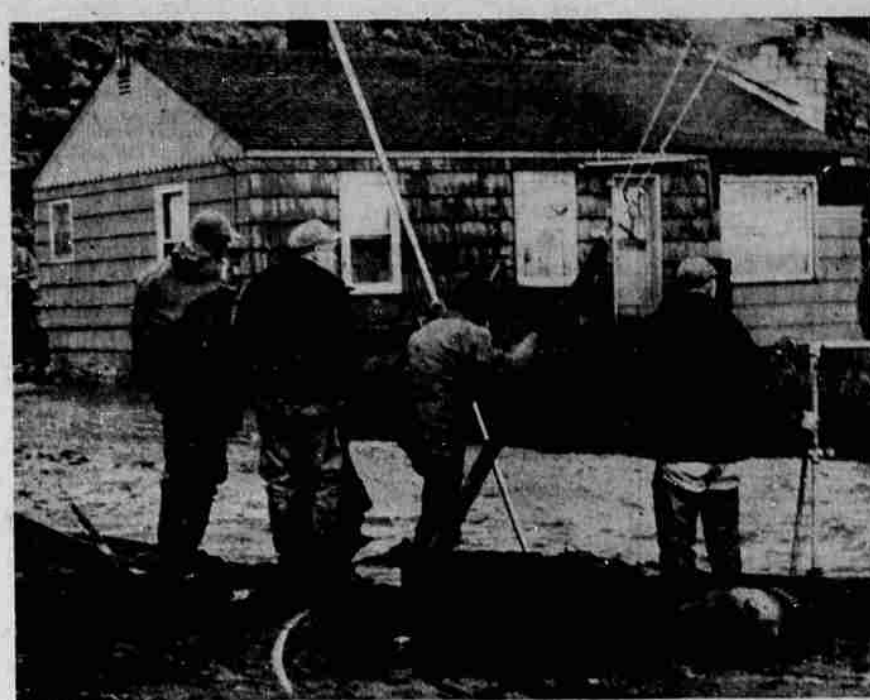
Nimrods Tell 'Good Success'

Field surveys conducted by game commission personnel during the hunting seasons indicate that nimrods enjoyed good success during 1955.

Spot checks of elk hunters show that success was normal throughout the state, with excellent elk hunting reported in some sections of eastern Oregon. Deer hunters too experienced a good year with normal or above normal success indicated. The Tillamook burn area was considered the hot spot for western Oregon while excellent results in eastern Oregon were reported in the Blue and Willows mountains.

About the only hunting which was not up to standard was during the pheasant season where hunter surveys indicated that success on a state-wide basis was below that of last year. This trend was also indicated during the mid-summer brood surveys when game agents found that pheasant counts were below that of last year. However, good hunting was experienced in southwest Oregon and along the north coast where hunter success was up over previous years.

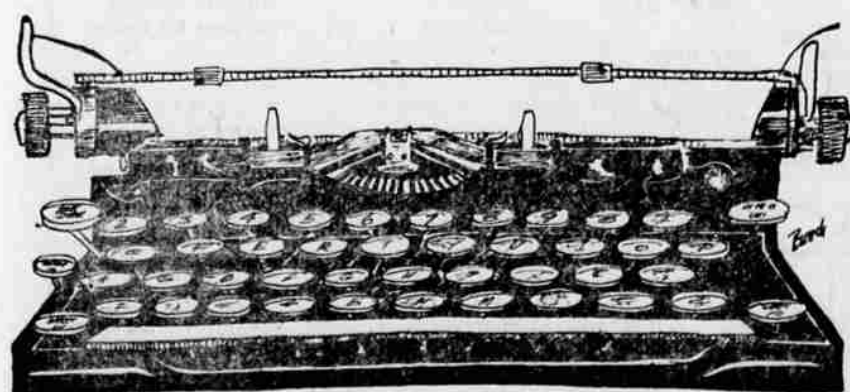

Nehru To Ask New Meeting

LONDON (UPI)—Indian Premier Jawaharlal Nehru is preparing to sound out the Western powers of the possibility of a new East-West conference to discuss disarmament and specifically a ban on nuclear test blasts, informed sources disclosed today.

The sources said he is armed with a fresh Russian go-ahead for his plan.

They said Nehru would like to see the talks organized in the spring, possibly during the visit to Britain of Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev and Soviet Communist party chief Nikita S. Khrushchev.

But the sources added that Nehru is not now seeking to pin down a definite date or place. He does not want to sit in on the conference or act as a mediator, they said.

Neither does he insist that the talks be held on any certain level, the sources said. But they added that he envisages a high-powered conference on a loftier level than the ambassadorial plane of the regular U.N. Disarmament Commission.

Whether it would be a meeting at the summit, or at the foreign ministers' level, or even held at all, depends on the outcome of impending Indian explorations of the sentiment among Western governments and Russian approval of the plans, the sources said.

Lutheran Church Begins Campaign

NEW YORK — The United Lutheran Church has launched a two-year evangelism campaign designed to approach the Jewish people as well as other groups.

"There is only one redeemer for Jew and gentile alike," Dr. Robert W. Stacker, director of the church's program of special missions, said yesterday. The program includes "lovingly in its outreach God's ancient people, the race from which our Savior sprang," he added.

Pupils Give Up Usual Traditional Christmas

EVANSVILLE, Ind. (AP)—Thirty-five pupils wanted a Christmas tree in their third-grade room in Plaza Park School here, but there was a problem—the scent of evergreens makes the 36th pupil, Linda Hartman, ill.

Mrs. Hattie Alexander, their teacher, said the pupils voted unanimously to give up a traditional Christmas tree because of Linda's allergy. The teacher found a small leafless birch tree, and the children decorated it with decorations to make it look like the real thing.
