Even during Lent and the humid dog days, even when Congress adjourned and most officials had left town, the partying continued full-speed.

Formality was the keynote. The engraved invitation, the white tie, ball gown and 18-button glove; the sit-down dinner followed by a musicale or dancing, to late-day reception—all are signs of a new era of sophistication and elegance that ranks our town with the capitals of Europe.

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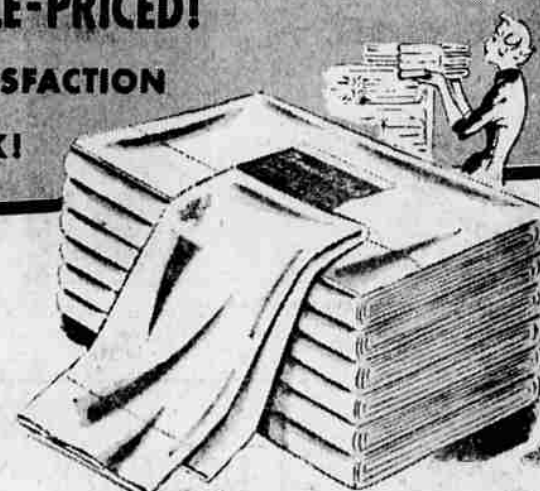
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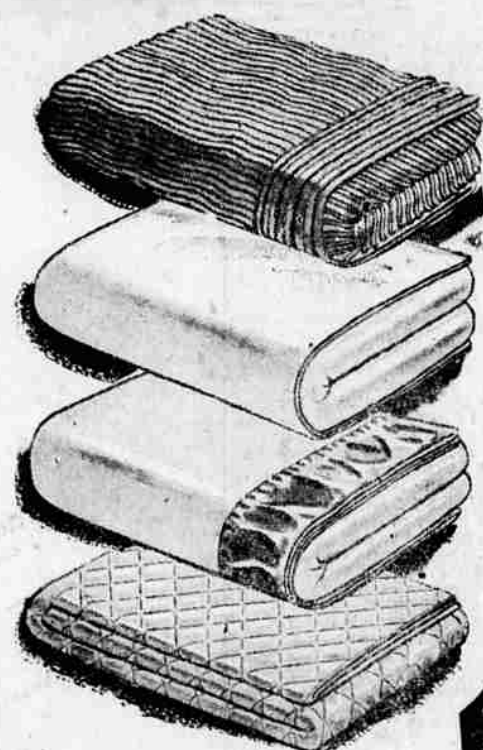
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
