Defense Summons Friends Of Abbott To Witness Stand

OAKLAND (UP) — The defense called friends and relatives yesterday in an attempt to undermine the circumstantial evidence linking Burton W. Abbott to the kidnaping and murder of Stephanie Bryan.

Called to the stand were Abbott's classmate and drinking companion, Thomas W. Daly; Abbott's brother-in-law and his stepson, and Abbott's sister-in-law.

Daly, a former philosophy student at the University of California, told of drinking with Abbott last April 29 at the Wildwood Inn in Trinity County. Abbott's cabin, near which Stephanie's body was found, is located near Wildwood. Daly is presently employed as a carpenter in the Wildwood lumber mill.

He said Abbott appeared calm and unbothered while they engaged in a nine-hour drinking bout, and the day after the 14-year-old Berkeley school girl disappeared. Daly said one of the prosecution's major witnesses, Delbert Cox, the bartender, was often engrossed in television and that other members of Cox's family tended bar. Cox had testified earlier that Abbott was not in the bar on April 28. Under cross-examination, Daly admitted that Cox greeted Abbott on April 29 as if he had not seen him for some time. Abbott claims he stopped at the bar on the previous day for a quick drink. Abbott's brother-in-law, Edwin G. Jeppesen, a bus driver from Corte Madera, testified that he, Abbott and Jeppesen's stepson, George Ford, 17, had a target practice with Abbott on the slope behind Abbott's cabin, some 200 feet below Stephanie's grave.

Mrs. Mary Abbott, wife of the defendant's brother, Mark, was called to substantiate Abbott's visit to the mountain cabin. Under cross-examination she admitted she never saw Abbott's car the entire time she was there. She also said she thought he was wearing a pair of faded blue jeans, although she earlier told police she had seen him wearing a pair of blue denims.

Jeppesen was followed to the stand by his stepson. Their testimony was believed to be aimed at discounting the testimony of a prosecution expert who said soil fragments found on Abbott's boots came from Stephanie's grave.
